terms ever administered to a medical "con man" was given to Roy Wright DeWelles of Pass Christian, Mississippi, who made an estimated \$1.5 million peddling a worthless "oxygen therdevice known as Detoxacolon. DeWelles was arrested after sending out 10,000 postal cards promoting the quack scheme

"It should be emphasized" Postmaster Hein added, "that most businesses doing business by mail are reputable firms. including many that may not be familiar to the prospective purchaser. However, if there is any doubt, it is best to get information from reliable sources, such as the Better Business Bureau. In cases where there is a genuine basis for suspicion of fraud, we would like to have prompt information from the public and we will see that appropriate action is taken.



Chance to boost local economics

Michigan has a bargain-priced opportunity to lay the groundwork for greater wood use and economic growth in local areas under a three-year survey to be started by the U.S. Forest Service early in 1964. The forest inventory, originally planned to provide information on a statewide scale, can be intensified with state funds to yeild much-needed facts and figures on a county-bycounty basis. Such a detailed survey would answer questions to promote better industrial planning by communities, and show the way for development of new and existing wood-using firms. The Forest Service will contribute \$321,000 toward the study, reducing Michigan's share of the cost to \$146,000. Conservation Department foresters look upon this figure as a very small investment compared with its potential returns to an industry that already adds more than \$700 million a year to the state's economy. The Department is seeking a legislative appropration of \$52,000 to launch the Mich. Dept. of Conservation first year of this work.

CASCADE TOWNSHIP ZONING NOTICE

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Cascade Township Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on Monday, May 11, 1964, at 8:00 PM on said date, at the Cascade Township Hall, in the Village of Cascade in said Township, upon the following proposed Amendments to the Cascade Township Zoning Ordinance and Land Use Map,

Chapter 7, add the following: After "'A'' Agricultural District" add: "R-1" Residential

After "R-2" Residential District" add: "R-3" Residential

Add new chapter on "R-3" Residential District, as follows:

CHAPTER 25

RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT In any "R-3" Residential District, no building or structure or part thereof shall be erected, altered, moved upon any lot or other piece or parcel of land, or used on any lot or other parcel of land in whole or in part used for other than any one or more of the following specified uses:

1. All uses permitted in "R-1" and "R-2" Residential

Districts. 2. Mobile Home Parks.

3. In each and every Mobile Home Park established under this Ordinance, the following conditions shall apply:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS When used in this Ordinance, unless a different meaning appears from the context:

a) Automobile, trailer, trailer coach, mobile home, or trailer means any vehicle or structure so designed and constructed in such a manner as will permit occupancy thereof as living quarters for one or more persons, or the conduct of any business or profession, occupation or trade (or use as a selling or advertising devise), and so designed that it is or may be mounted on wheels, or upon another conveyance and moved from one location to another, specifically including and not by way of limitation, prefabricated type dwellings which are completely built in one place and moved and erected at another place, still retaining their mov-

able characteristic after being located and used for living, business, or other uses.

b) Mobile Home Park means any park, tourist park, tourist court, camp site, lot, field. parcel or tract of land designed, maintained, intended or used for the purpose of supplying the location or accommodations for any of the items mentioned in the preceding paragraph, and upon which any of same are parked and-or occupied at any time, and shall include all buildings used or intended to be used as part of the equipment thereof, but not including trailer sales lots or warehousing facilities on which unoccupied trailers are parked for the purpose of storage or inspection and sale, and not including an area where trailers are used temporarily in a camping or recreational site approved for such use by the Township Board.

c) Unit means a parcel of ground designated as the lot or location for only one mobile

home and one automobile. d) Person shall be construed to include persons, partnerships, firms, companies, corporations, tenants, owners, lessees, licensees, or their agents, heirs or assigns.

SECTION 2. LICENSED MOBILE HOME PARKS

All Mobile Home Parks having space for two or more mobile homes must be licensed and operated under the provisions of Act 243 of the Public Acts of 1959, (MSA 5.278(31)) as amended.

SECTION 3. APPROVAL BY TOWNSHIP PLANNING COMMISSION

Even though it is proposed to locate a mobile home park in an area of Cascade Township in which such uses are permitted under the Cascade Township Zoning Ordinance, the approval of such use shall be required by the Cascade Township Planning Commission. In considering the granting or rejection of such application, the Planning Commission shall use the following standards in acting upon such application:

a) Whether or not the proposed use is detrimental to the surrounding property by reason concentration of population. b) Whether or not the pro-

posed use will endanger the public health because of in-adequate sanitation facilities.

lic safety will be endangered c) Whether or not the pub-

because of a concentration of population in a given area with insufficient police and fire protection facilities being available.

d) Whether or not sufficient public utilities are available to adequately serve the proposed

e) Whether or not there are school facilities available or planned for the foreseeable future, so as to accommodate the residents of such facility.

f) Whether or not the proposed use is in conformance to the master plan of the town-

SECTION 4. IN ANY MOBILE HOME PARK THE FOLLOWING UNIT REGULATIONS SHALL APPLY

a) Each separate mobile home unit shall have a land area of a minimum of 6000 square feet exclusive of any right-of-way, which shall be a designated lot number on a plot plan substantially similar to a plat of real estate which shall be filed with the Township Building Inspector prior to the time that said premises are used as a mobile home park.

b) The minimum spacing between any part of any trailer and-or any structure permanently or temporarily attached thereto and any other trailer or any structure permanently or temporarily attached thereto shall be 16 feet, and the minimum set back from any right. imum set-back from any right-of-way shall be 10 feet.

c) Every unit shall front upon a public or private street within a mobile home park.

d) All streets within a mobile home park shall be of a blacktop or similar surface.

e) Parking either on street or off street shall be provided in a ratio of 3 cars for each mobile home unit.

SECTION 5. BUFFER STRIP REQUIREMENTS

In any area where a mobile home park is on property which is adjacent to properties owned for agricultural or residential purposes there shall be a buffer strip separating the mobile home park from the adjacent agricultural or residential zoned property of at least 15 feet in width. Said buffer strip is to be landscaped in such manner as prescribed by the Planning Commission and no part of it shall be used for right-of-way or parking pur-

SECTION 6. SIGNS

One sign shall be permitted at each entrance to a mobile home park stating the name thereof, provided such sign is first approved by the Cascade Township Planning Commission and the Building Inspector. Otherwise, any sign or signs erected in connection with any mobile home park shall meet the requirements of signs in "R-1" Residential areas of the Township under the Cascade Township Zoning Ordinance.

SECTION 7.

No persons shall park or occupy a mobile home outside of a licensed mobile home park except as provided in this Ordinance, except in cases where the occupancy of a trailer is permitted in connection with the construction of a permanent residence or building being built on the same premises under the Cascade Township Zoning Ordinance. Furthermore not more than one unoccupied trail-er shall be stored or parked at any one time on any one piece of property except in a licensed mobile home park or a trailer sales lot or in connection with any warehousing business use permitted by the Cascade Township Zoning Ordinance and Zoning and Land Use Maps. Such unoccupied mobile home may be stored either in a garage provided for the same, on private premises, or in the rear yard of a dwelling, provided it is located not less than 10 feet from any other structure or side property line, and is not visible from the street on the front. It shall be unlawful to store any unoccupied trailer on any otherwise unoccupied site, lot, field, parcel or tract of land.

SECTION 8. TEMPORARY OCCUPANCY

The temporary occupancy of any trailer shall be governed by the provisions of Chapter 4, Section 20 of the Cascade Town-ship Zoning Ordinance.

SECTION 9. PERMANENT BUILDINGS

Except for dwellings in the nature of mobile homes as specially provided for in this Chapter 25, all the provisions, conditions, requirements and restrictions applicable to buildings, structures or parts thereof of the "R-2" Residential District shall apply in an "R-3" Residential District except and to the extent the land continues to be used for agricultural purposes. poses.

WARNING YOU MUST HAVE A PERMIT

BEFORE BURNING GRASS OR BRUSH

Grass and brush fires each year are becoming a more serious hazard in this area. They are a costly and needless expense and a threat to property.

The law requires a permit from the Fire Chief in your Township, before burning brush or grass. Whether these fires are set intentionally or accidentally you are in violation of the law if you do not have a permit.

Many such fires result from burning trash, and leaving it untended. Please make sure such bonfires are isolated from dry grass or brush and that coals are wetted down before leaving

When such fires make it necessary to call the fire department, violators of the permit law will be prosecuted. Your cooperation in the prevention of fires and enforcement of this law will be appreciated.

Soil & Water Conservation

Water erosion is a problem

When we walked over the Robert Clark farm in Lowell Twp. last week, Robert pointed out where two grassed waterways had helped to control erosion. He also showed where a variation in soil types required different soil management. Clark made his original conservation plan in 1955. A revised conservation plan is being made to include a new arrangement for the fields and for an added 40 acres.

Five acres of the new land where water erosion is a problem will be kept in hay. Use of minimum tillage and improved alfalfa and other crop yields since 1955 shows much improvement. Cover crops sown at the last corn cultivation will add organic matter and give more erosion protection.

Wesley Johnson, Courtland Twp. plans to use mammoth clover sown in wheat for clover seed and plow down instead of June clover. Johnson finds that he will have to use a flail type chopper to spread his wheat straw more evenly over the new

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
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
