The Old Testament is full of picture-stories told to help us understand God. This is one of them. It pictures the unbelievably great love of God, His willingness to buy even the worst sinner to be His own again.
We were once God's pride and joy, the masterpiece of His creation. We were meant to live in happy fellowship with Him. But we deserted Him for the pleasures of the world. That is why we are so out of tune and so miserable. We are already "sold" to Satan!
But God bought us back. That is the Atonement. Jesus paid the price. And faith in Him is the first step to tuning all the strings of our life. When the A-string is tuned, the others can be tuned, too!

Kristina becomes naturalized citizen

April 20 was a very special day in the lives of a little adopted Korean girl of Cascade, her mother and grandparents. On that date, little Kristina Jo Friesen, daughter of Mrs. Nancy Friesen of 7990 30th Street, S.E., was naturalized before a Grand Rapids judge.

Kristina Jo was born April 25, 1960. She was found abandoned on the steps of City Hall in Seoul, Korea, on November 11, 1960 and was taken to the Holt Orphanage. At that time, she was 9 months old and weighed only 11 pounds and was 21 inches tall. To this day, she has frostbite on her cheeks as the result of being left in the cold weather on the steps.

In February of 1961, Mr. and Mrs. Friesen of Minnesota decided to adopt a Korean child, and they contacted the Holt family, the founders of the Holt Adoption Agency in Creswell, Oregon. They received many papers and forms inquiring as to what age child they preferred, and whether they wished a boy or a girl. They decided they would like a little girl between the ages of 1 and 3 years.

In March of 1961, a picture of Kris (whose names at that time was Jin Ai Kim) was sent to the Friesens. On April 2, 1961, she was legally adopted by them.

On October 1 of the same year, Kris arrived in Portland, Oregon, by airplane along with 65 other Korean orphans. Mrs. Friesen met the plane and returned with her new daughter to their home in Minnesota, where they lived until the death of Mr. Friesen. He was killed a year ago in an airplane crash in the Florida Everglades.

Mrs. Friesen and Kris then moved to Cascade to be near Mrs. Friesen's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clare W. Behnke of Cascade Springs Drive S. E.

Kris and her mother are sponsoring another three-year-old Korean orphan in Korea, and she enjoys sending gifts to her sister. She also has a great deal of fun playing with her two Siamese cats and two German Shepherd dogs. Next fall, she plans to attend the preschool nursery at the Cascade Christian Church.

Happy birthday, Kris, and your many neighbors and friends in Cascade extend a warm welcome to you and your mother!
