



Who is Habakkuk?

Most of us know very little about him. We hardly know how to pronounce his name. He lived some 3000 years ago. And if you search your Bible you will find about three pages of his writings. In those three pages he said something especially interesting.

Habakkuk was burdened with a feeling that things were not going right; life isn't fair; evil seems to triumph over good. He asked God for an explanation. God told him that eventually right will triumph, and that we must live by faith. Then Habakkuk wrote a poem. You'll find it near the end of his writings, chapter 3, especially verses 17 and 18. It is one of the most wonderful expressions of faith found anywhere.

"For though the fig-tree shall not flourish, Neither shall fruit be in the vines; The labor of the olive shall fail. And the fields shall vield no food: The flock shall be cut off from the fold. And there shall be no herd in the stalls.


