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Area families host Cadet exchange visitors from El Salvadore, C. A.

Our area has had the flavor of an international center this month with young visitors from at least two foreign countries. The first week in August the Civil Air Patrol had its 17th annual I.A.C.E. (International Air Cadet Exchange). One hundred forty-five American Cadets were exchanged for an equal number of Cadets from 22 foreign countries. The United States Air Force flies these young people to their destinations, and from then on the local C. A. P. squadrons play hosts.

This year it was the privilege of the Grand Rapids squadron to play hosts to five Cadets and their two escorts from El-Salvadore, Central America.

Two Cadets were guests of American Cadets in this area. Gilberto Currin stayed at the home of Col. James Hart, Carl

Avenue, Ada, where the whole family is in the C. A. P. Dogoberto A. Brigo was the guest of the Robert Smiths of Cascade where Mark is a Cadet.

These young men had spent four days at the World's Fair as guests of the New York Squadron, five days in Detroit and five days in Grand Rapids.

While here, they toured Steelcase, Lears, Rogers Plaza and a TV station. They also enjoyed typical American sports, roller skating and a big barbeque at the Smiths. The last evening a dance was held by the squadron for all the Cadets.

The communication between the young people often became rather hilarious. The Cadets from El Salvadore had at the most two years of high school English (most had much less).

The American Cadets and their families had at most two years of high school Spanish (most of them had much less).

The conservations were held by a combination of English, Spanish and hand gestures. But one could tell that when young people are dancing, swimming and just having fun that laughter is the same and the understanding complete.

A very real, warm link between the people of El Salvadore and Grand Rapids was made this month, and there are already plans to strengthen it.

The Smiths also have a young man from Turkey who is making Cascade his second home.

Delauer Sanli, a geology student from Michigan State College is spending his vacations here. It has been especially interesting because of the current news about Turkey. Delauer's father is soon to be General in the Army of Turkey.

He has been able to give the background of the present crisis much more fully than the newspapers have given. Now one more family has a different picture of Turkey.

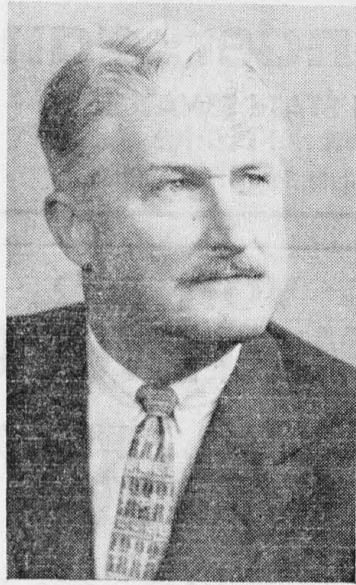

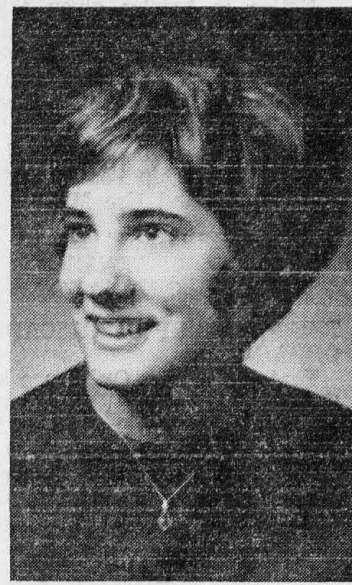
A Peach

My God, how great Thou art!

AMENDMENT TO CASCADE TOWNSHIP ZONING ORDINANCE

THE TOWNSHIP OF CASCADE ORDAINS:

That the Zoning Ordinance of Cascade Township, Kent County, Michigan, of December 1, 1962, as amended, shall be and the same is hereby further amended so as to provide the following additional terms and conditions:

1. Chapter 7, "Zoning Districts," is amended so as to include "R-4" Residential District

2. A new chapter 10-B, entitled "R-4" Residential District is hereby added, reading as follows:

CHAPTER 10-B

"R-4" Residential District
In any "R-4" Residential District, no building or structure or part thereof shall be erected, altered, moved upon any lot or other piece or parcel of land, or used on any lot or other parcel of land in whole or in part used for any one or more of the following specified uses:

1. a. In those areas which were "R-1" before amendment of the master plan use map all uses permitted in "R-1".
b. In all other areas all uses permitted in the "R-1" and "R-2" Residential Districts.

2. Multiple Dwellings, in which cases the following requirements shall apply:

a. No Multiple dwelling building shall exceed two (2)

stories in height, exclusive of basement.

b. Off-street parking facilities of hardtop construction shall be provided in the ratio of (2) parking spaces for each family unit in such building.

c. Minimum gross interior living area per family, exclusive of porches, shall be (60) square feet for a 1 bedroom unit, (800) square feet for 2 bedroom units and (1,000) square feet for 3 bedroom units.

d. Minimum lot areas shall be as follows:

1. For 2 or 3 family dwellings, (6,000) square feet per family unit.

2. For 4 family dwellings, (4,500) square feet per family unit.

3. For each 5 family building or more, (3,500) square feet per family unit.

e. The plans and specifications which are to be filed at time application is made for permit to build any multiple family dwelling shall bear the seal and signature of a registered architect.

f. No more than (40 percent) of the lot on which any multiple family dwelling is located shall be occupied by such building.

g. Minimum front yard shall be (35) feet and the minimum side yard shall be (10 percent) of the width of the lot at its widest point but not less than (20) feet on each side, in the case of all multiple family dwellings. No multiple dwelling shall be located less than (25) feet from an adjacent structure.

h. The exterior of all such multiple family dwellings shall be of brick veneer materials or the equivalent.

3. Either the Planning Commission or the Township Board shall have the power to require the posting of a reasonable bond to assure completion and compliance with the terms of a building permit for a multiple dwelling.

4. All construction of multiple dwellings in Cascade Township shall comply with BOCA Code as currently in effect by the City of Grand Rapids together with said City's Heating, Plumbing, Air Conditioning and Electrical Codes until such time as Cascade Township shall adopt

its own code or codes. Any building shall conform to the Building Code in effect at the time the permit therefor is granted.

5. Before a building permit is granted, the Planning Commission or the Township Board shall determine what buffer zone landscaping including screening, fences shall be required as a condition of the grant of the permit.

6. The Cascade Township Land Use Map is hereby amended so as to change the following described property from its present zoning classification to R-4 Residential:

a. Lot No. 1 of Block 1 of Cascade Terrace, Sections 9, 15 and 16; and

b. Lots 7 and 8 of Cascade Riverview Park, Section 16 T6N R10W; and

c. All that part of the South 1/4 Section 9, T6N, R10W, Cascade Township, Kent County, Michigan, described as commencing on the N-S 1/4 line 964.60' South 0 degrees 24' West from the center of said Section 9; thence South 89 degrees 54' West 343.53', thence South 5 degrees 50' East 165.0', thence South 84 degrees 21' West 279.00' to the centerline of Cascade Road, thence South 28 degrees 29' East along said centerline 230.0', thence North 61 degrees 31' East 630' more or less to a line bearing South 28 degrees 29' East, thence North 28 degrees 29' West 115' more or less to the place of beginning. This parcel contains 2.6 Acres more or less including the highway right-of-way.

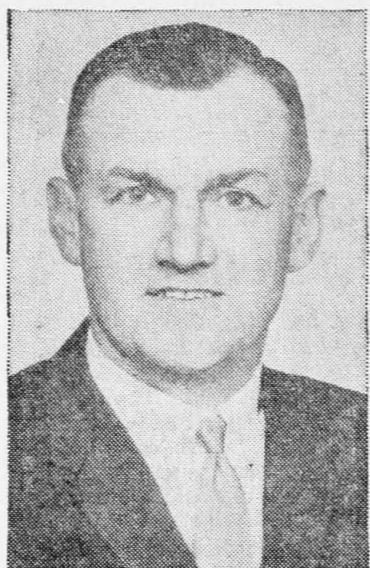

The names that are listed below are some of the taxpayers of Ada Township who have held several meetings and have contributed money to engage the services of an attorney. They have appealed to the State Tax Commission for relief against the unfair and in some instances exorbitant, increase in the assessments on their property.

The State Tax Commission now has their field men in Ada Township and the Commission has indicated that the taxpayers of Ada Township did not get proper hearings before the local authorities and therefore did extend the time for filing appeals. This extension has now expired.

Not all Ada taxpayers were aware of the work that was being done in their interests by the Ada Taxpayers League and of course cannot benefit from this effort at this time. We believe that the permanent answer lies in the election of township officials, especially a supervisor who will take a realistic, impartial and sympathetic attitude toward those who pay the taxes.

At the meetings held many stories were told of actual hardship where the taxpayers were alledged to have been told by the supervisor, "If you can't pay your tax, sell your property," or "If you do not like

the way we do things in Ada, move somewhere else." Widows and pensioners, some living in ancestral homes that once were farms, are threatened with a tax burden they cannot meet. One taxpayer felt obliged to sell his farm at less than the appraisal.

The announcement of the increased assessments was made after the millage on the school bond issue was set. The effect of this is to make Ada taxpayers whose assessments have been raised, pay more on that bond issue and on all County voted millage, than was asked for by the County or Forest Hills School District. The supervisor was quoted as saying that the township will not receive any more income from the increased assessments. In other words Ada taxpayers are being penalized unnecessarily for the bond issues of the county and the school district.

On the ballot for the election on Sept. 1 you will find the following slates of candidates on both the Republican and Democratic tickets. We believe it is high time for a change and suggest that you make your vote count in this primary election by choosing either of these slates of candidates.
