The public schools of this area will close October 22-23 for the annual Michigan Education Association regional teachers conference. This year the meeting, to be held in Grand Rapids, is expected to draw more than 8,500 teachers and school administrators.

One of 12 inservice training programs being sponsored by the MEA this fall, the Grand Rapids conference will bring the latest in teaching techniques and theory to local educators.

A. R. Gale, president of Weatherhead International, will keynote the conference. His address "The United States' Position in World Trade: A Guided Tour Through a Golden Jungle," is to be given at the general ses-sion, Thursday, October 22.

Other general session speak-ers will be Dr. Lynn M. Bartlett, state superintendent of public instruction, and Russell Jones, MEA president and principal of Grand Rapids' Burton School

Close to 100 group meetings dealing with specialized teaching interest are also scheduled for the conference. Topics will range from astronomy to vocal music, and resource people will be drawn from governmental agencies, local schools, industry and universities.

Local conference planners in-clude: Hilda MacGregor, a teacher at Godwin Heights High School; Genevieve Wilkowski, Student Teacher Education Program consultant for Grand Rapids; and Adele Jardine, a teacher at Muskegon's Nelson Elementary School.
