



Looking Down



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

Catholic clothing collection set


The 16th annual Thanksgiving Clothing Collection, conducted by the Catholic Bishops of the United States in behalf of the destitute and driven of other lands, has been set for the week of November 15-22. All 130 parishes in the Grand Rapids diocese, including those in this area, will

Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph C. Wa-len, diocesan director of Catholic Charities and editor of The Western Michigan Catholic, has been appointed by Bishop Allen J. Babcock to head up the diocesan appeal.

Monsignor Walen said an alltime high was set last year when 88 tons of clothing were collected in the 29-county dio-cese. He said: "it is our hope to continue the record of success of this annual appeal."

National figures show, Monsignor Walen said, that approximately 17% million pounds of clothing, blankets, bedding and shoes were amassed in the Thanksgiving Clothing Collection of 1963. These materials a revalued at over 21 million dol-

The clothing collected by the individual parishes in the Grand Rapids diocese eventually will be shipped to Catholic Relief Services, National Catholic Welfare Conference, in New York City for distribution to millions of needy persons, regardless of race, creed, or color. Distribution centers are set up in over 70 countries of Europe, Africa, Asia and Latin America, staffed by Catholic Relief Services. Emergency relief is also given to victims of natural disasters throughout the world.




