Letter to Editor Goldwater chairman writes

Dear Mr. Goldwater:
A balanced budget is as necessary for government as it is for the taxpayer. The Republican administration of Governor George Romney pulled Michigan out of the red and advanced it solidly into the black. The Republican administration of President Eisenhower balanced the federal budget in 1960. But what has happened to the budget under Presidents Kennedy

and Johnson? Congressman Jerry Ford states in his Washington Review of July 29, 1964, that in the last four years the deficit has climbed 24 billion dollars. Under President Johnson it took the biggest jump, 8.3 billion dollars and now stands at \$312 billion.
The Democrats say that we have not yet reached the panic stage on national debt and point to their platform which boasts of "the longest and strongest peacetime prosperity in modern history." But, when? Or do we just print paper money faster? Why do their candidates ignore this major issue?

Catholic clothing collection set

The 16th annual Thanksgiving Clothing Collection, conducted by the Catholic Bishops of the United States in behalf of the destitute and driven of other lands, has been set for the week of November 15-22. All 130 parishes in the Grand Rapids diocese, including those in this area, will participate.

Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph C. Walen, diocesan director of Catholic Charities and editor of The Western Michigan Catholic, has been appointed by Bishop Allen J. Babcock to head up the diocesan appeal.

Monsignor Walen said an all-time high was set last year when 88 tons of clothing were collected in the 29-county diocese. He said: "It is our hope to continue the record of success of this annual appeal."

National figures show, Monsignor Walen said, that approximately 17 1/2 million pounds of clothing, blankets, bedding and shoes were amassed in the Thanksgiving Clothing Collection of 1963. These materials are valued at over 21 million dollars.

The clothing collected by the individual parishes in the Grand Rapids diocese eventually will be shipped to Catholic Relief Services, National Catholic Welfare Conference, in New York City for distribution to millions of needy persons, regardless of race, creed, or color. Distribution centers are set up in over 70 countries of Europe, Africa, Asia and Latin America, staffed by Catholic Relief Services. Emergency relief is also given to victims of natural disasters throughout the world.

'Modern Math' highlight of P. T. A. meeting
