Cheery wraps give presents joyous look

Colorful gifts under the tree make Christmas merrier. The many gala wrappings available this year can help give every present, large or small, a joyous holiday look.

"New" trend in wrapping papers, ribbons and bows sees a return of the old-fashioned, cheery red-and-green Christmas spirit, along with many pretty pastels. Traditionally-loved subjects such as bells, Santa, pine cones and Christmas trees, abound on printed papers.

Whatever type of paper is used, it's well to remember the basic rules of wrapping.

Always use non-transparent paper (so no one knows what the box says).

Keep wrappings secure with glue or rubber cement, seals or transparent tape.

Leave at least two inches of paper for a neat squared corner.

Some other hints include: Disguise presents in unusual packages. Use paper towel rolls to hide small presents or flat ones such as scarves or handkerchiefs. Red tissue and cotton tulle this kind of wrap into a "skinny" Santa, or pastel tissue and ribbon make it into a pretty doll.

For larger boxes, create holiday scenes or funny faces on the tops by using greeting cards or cotton, colored tissue ribbon and pompon bows.

Don't stop with the outside. Stuff boxes with candy, confetti or shredded tissue. That also makes it more fun to try and find the present.

In a way it would be a shame to abolish the draft. Those greetings are about the only friendly words a man ever gets from his government.

Ada Post Office open Saturdays

The Ada Post office will be open all day on Saturdays, December 12 and December 19, for the convenience of its patrons.

The postmaster advises when preparing parcels for mailing to use a sturdy container, pack it full using excelsior, shredded paper, etc., around the article to be sent. Print the address clearly on the outside of the container and also on a slip of paper inside, using the zip code on both the address and the return address.

Many people have asked if they may use 4 cent postage on their Christmas cards. You may if they are not sealed and contain no writing other than your signature on the inside. The post office department has issued a special 5 cent Christmas stamp again this year, which will lend more decoration to your envelopes; also assure your cards of receiving first class mail treatment. With card is undeliverable as addressed, it will either be forwarded, or returned to you, provided you have put your return address on it.

The postmaster also suggests when looking up addresses for friends who live in the rural areas, do not use the telephone directory. There are so many people whose mailing addresses are different from their telephone exchanges.

Buy and use Christmas Seals

Some 17 tons of Christmas seals have been dispatched to more than two million Michigan homes to start the 58th campaign to raise funds for the fight against tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases.

Spurred by reports that tuberculosis is on the increase and by plans to counterattack by intensifying control measures, Christmas seal campaigners sought total statewide contributions to \$1,150,000.

The letters soliciting contributions from Michigan residents are signed by Christmas Seal campaign chairmen in counties with affiliated local associations or by Lauren T. Elliott, Flint business man. They emphasize that gifts to the Christmas seal campaign are a means of protecting the gift of life, "breath of life."

"This gift from God is often taken for granted," Elliott says in his letter. "Yet, without breath, there can be no life for you or me."

"Christmas seal work will enable you and your children to breathe better, grow stronger, live longer—and enjoy the breath of life in later years," he added.

What's cookin'

As we all know, Christmas time is here again! And what a glorious season it is too. Since we see so many recipes published covering Cakes, Cookies and Pastries, you might be interested in a very good nutritious family dish or company fare called "Glorified Cabbage."

For the Christmas season, the homely cabbage could be dressed up with a final sprinkling of Paprika... here 'tis.

Glorified Cabbage
4 cups cabbage, coarsely cut
1 cup peanuts, chopped
1 cup medium white sauce
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. white pepper
1/2 tsp. celery salt

Butter a quart size casserole well. Place 1 cup of cabbage in bottom. Sprinkle over it 1/4 cup peanuts. Fill casserole in like manner until all cabbage and peanuts are used. Add seasonings to white sauce. Pour this over cabbage.

Bake in a 350 degree oven, 30 to 40 minutes. Remove from oven. Cover with topping and return to oven to brown.

Topping
1/2 cup soft bread crumbs
1/2 tsp. melted butter
one-third cup grated cheese
Mix ingredients well and spread over top of cabbage.

Dan VanderVeen and John Titsworth added 12 points and 8 points respectively to finish second and third behind Jim in team scoring.

This Friday the Rangers travel to Byron Center to take on the league champion Bulldogs.

The game will begin at 8 o'clock, with the reserves starting at 6:30.

Motorists warned to destroy plates

Michigan motorists buying the new 1965 license plates early were cautioned by the Secretary of State to be careful that their old plates are confiscated or kept in a safe place until they are no longer valid, after February 28 of 1965.

Under Michigan law, the motorist is responsible for his license plates. So to protect against possible problems of another person getting the plates and getting into trouble, each new license purchaser is urged to make sure his old plates do not fall into the wrong hands.

Keep them in a safe place or cut them up with a metal cutter. The village dump is no place for them until after February 28.

Flowers brighten holiday season

The holiday season is one time when imagination can do more than decorate dreams. Let the sparkle, brilliance and beauty of the holidays come in to full bloom right at home this year.

There are many special ways to help Christmas spirit shine in the home. Fresh flowers, in both traditional and novel arrangements, should be focal points of all important areas.

Certain spots are perfect for holiday dressing-up. Doorways, for example, set the scene for the entire home. Make them as bright as a holly berry, with a great green wreath, pungent fir and sparkling pine cones tipped with gold. Let a lovely wreath welcome the world at the holiday door.

Homes with a mantle are particularly lucky at Christmas. Not only is there a spot to hang hungry little stockings, but the mantle is a perfect place for a holiday flower arrangement. Evergreens, brightened with juniper and bayberries make a holiday bouquet of real beauty.

If there is a mirror above the mantle—all the better to reflect a glorious arrangement of holiday greens, red-ripe berries and color-splashed pine cones.

Christmas tree law explained

Do not transport Christmas trees, evergreen boughs, or certain decorative native plants without having first received a bill of sale from the seller or giver.

Transportation of even one tree without a bill of sale is illegal. There is one exception to this. During December when most citizens buy trees for the home, two Christmas trees may be transported without any bill of sale.

The purpose of the law, passed in 1962 and superseding a similar previous act, is to prevent theft of Christmas trees and other decorative plant materials. The previous law also was effective in the checking illegal removal of Christmas trees.

Sales tax now levied in all but twelve states

The rise in state and local taxes has left just twelve states without a state sales tax. Noting that Pennsylvania, with the highest sales tax, is up from 4 percent to 5 percent, an article in a current magazine sees continued increase ahead in both state and local taxes showing how the tax burden varies from state to state.

The only states without a tax on sales now are Alaska, Delaware, Idaho, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Oregon and Virginia. A sample increase noted in the report was Alabama's sales tax, up from 3 percent to 4 percent.

Highest tax on each package of cigarettes sold is in Mississippi which is now up to 9 cents per pack. Other increases: Alaska and Florida from 5 cents to 8 cents. New York City taxes cigarettes at 4 cents a pack. The state levies on each gallon of gasoline are from 5 cents to a Hawaii's top ranging from 8½ cents to 11 cents.

Individual income tax is now imposed by more than thirty states, including West Virginia where residents did not pay income tax five years ago.

Among states with increased rates are Idaho, Indiana, Minnesota and New Mexico. City income taxes are noted in Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio, and in Pennsylvania.

Artificial lakes total 5,272 in Michigan

Michigan has about 5,274 artificial bodies of water, according to C. R. Humphreys, professor of resource development, Michigan State University.

Humphreys recently completed a preliminary survey of the state's artificial surface waters and charted many of the locations.

He found that out of the total, nearly 3,861 bodies are artificial ponds. About 252 are natural lakes with dams, and 422 are fish and wildlife floodings.

Natural lakes with dams account for 239,388 acres out of the 482,320 acres of artificial surface waters, Humphreys said
