## **Diabetes testing** here March 3, 4

A diabetes detection mobile testing bus will be at Rogers Plaza on February 28 through March 2; at the Forest Hill's Shop-rite on March 3 and 4 and at Christiansen Drug Store in Lowell on March 1 and 2.

The bus is one of two used in 21 different city and county locations during a month-long diabetes detection screening program in Grand Rapids and Kent County beginning February 28.

The purpose of the screening program is to find an estimated 1,700 persons in Kent County who have diabetes and don't

Persons most susceptible to diabetes are those over 30 years of age, have a history of diabees in the family, overweight, tire easily, or who are the parents of babies weighing over nine pounds at birth. Diabetes can be controlled and the sooner it is detected, the better chance for a normal life. The test itself takes only a few min-

The program is being sponsored by the Kent-County Health Department, Kent County Medical Society, and the Kent County Lay Diabetes Association in cooperation with other state health agencies. Anyone desiring further information may call Health Department at GL 6-6566 or GL 6-6544.

## Deane Baker runs for GOP nomination

Deane Baker, 40 year-old vice president of Sommerville Construction Company of Grand Rapids and Ada, announced Wednesday he will run for the GOP Senate nomination.

Mr. Baker, a native of Marquette is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and Harvard Business School.

Mr. Baker was an Air Force pilot during World War II and the Korean conflict. He and his wife Marylin and 4 children life at 2111 Buttrick Road, Ada. They attend Westminister Presbyterian Church.

Mr. Baker, has asked to speak Saturday before GOP leaders in Lansing. His political experience to date is that of precinct delegate. He sent a telegram to Mrs. Elly Peterson, chairman of the Republican State Central Committee, making his property. ing his request.

He also asked in his telegram Mrs. Peterson's support in seeking an open primary election in which each Republican candidate would argue his own merits without party endorse-Mr. Baker said he would en-

terested in hearing what I have to say, I'll be available." He said he had made plans to attend a few other Republican functions but left Sunday for London, England for a week on business. Demands of this project, Baker said, was the reason his announcement as Senate candidate was so long delayed.

Mr. Baker, who has a multi-engine commercial pilot license and who often flys himself on business trips, is an avid skier and an amateur water color

He said his decision to seek high political office has been something he's thought about for years. The "compulsion" as he described it, has become too strong to be denied.

The re-action of the community to Mr. Baker's joining the race has been very favorable, and everyone contacted is more than pleased to have Deane running, and the re-frain heard is, "he'll sure have my vote.

Lots of luck Deane, the area is behind you in this worthwhile endeavor.

Mr. Baker said Saturday he will enter the Republican senatorial primary in spite of the fact that a meeting of party leaders voted overwhelmingly to support U. S. Rep. Robert P. Griffin of Traverse City. "I have interrupted a steamroller,"

Mr. Baker was not one of the top senatorial prospects from which the party leaders planned to pick a preferred Senate candidate, but he was allowed to make an appeal for support at the Saturday meeting in Lansing. At least he has won the right to be considered as a candidate.

In order to enter the primary Mr. Baker will have to get 21,000 persons from throughout the state to sign petitions on his behalf before the petition deadline in early June.

AN ORDINANCE TO PRO-VIDE FOR THE CONNECTION NOW OR HEREAFTER OF PREMISES TO THE ADA SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM IN THE TOWNSHIP OF ADA, KENT COUNTY, MICHIGAN; TO PROVIDE FOR THE IM-POSITION, COLLECTION AND ENFORCEMENT OF FEES AND CHARGES FOR CON-NECTION THERETO AND AVAILABILITY THEREOF AND FOR CHARGES FOR SEWAGE DISPOSAL SERV-ICES THEREFROM; TO RE-QUIRE SEWERS AND SEW-ERAGE FOR PREMISES HEREAFTER OCCUPIED OR PLATTED; AND TO PROVIDE FOR OTHER MATTERS REL-ATIVE TO SAID SYSTEM AND TO THE USE THEREOF FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY AND CONVENIENCE.

THE TOWNSHIP OF ADA.

Section 1.01 Whenever used in this ordinance, except when otherwise indicated by the con-

(a) The term "Township" shall be construed to mean the Township of Ada and the term "County" shall be construed to mean the County of Kent, both in the State of Michigan.

(b) The term "Board" shall be construed to mean the Township Board of said Township of Ada, the legislative and governing body thereof.

(c) The term "sewage disposal system" and "system" shall be construed to mean the Ada Sewage Disposal System established and constructed by the County pursuant to resolution adopted November 3, 1965, and under Contract dated December 1, 1965 between the County and the Township and shall consist of the sewers and facilities now existing in the area of the unincorporated Village of Ada, herein called "existing facilities" and also of the new sewers and facilities to be acquired and constructed by the County pursuant to said Contract, herein called "new construction"

(d) The term "sewage disposal services" shall be deemed to refer to the collection, transportation, treatment and disposal of sanitary sewage emanating from premises now or hereafter.

(e) The term "unit" or "units" shall be related to the quantity of sanitary sewage ordinarily arising from the occupancy of a residence building by a single family of ordinary size, and shall be defined or determined from time to time by the County through its Department of Public Works. Said determination of units shall be based upon the studies made in the City of Cincinnati, Ohio, & in the Counties of Wayne and Oakland in the State of Michigan and by the U.S. Department of Health, relative to the quantity of sewage generated by different types of use and occupancy of premises and shall be kept up to date and revised as needed as new studies are made and through experience gained by the County of Kent in actual operation.

(f) The term "connection fee" shall be deemed to mean the amount charged at the time and in the amount hereinafter provided, to each premises in the Township for connecting or being connected to the new construction or the existing facilities of the system and represents the proportionate cost allocable to such premises for the trunk and treatment facilities by which sewage disposal services are immediately provided to the premises.

(g) The term "availability fee" shall be deemed to mean the amount charged at the time and in the amount hereinafter provided to each premises in the Township for the availability to directly serve said premises of the new construction facilities of the system and represents the proportionate cost allocable to such premises for the lateral service made directly available to the premises by the new construction. (h) The term "charges for sewage disposal services" or

"charges" shall be deemed to mean the amount charged to each premises in the Township for sewage disposal services which may include a debt service factor.

(i) The term "inspection and approval fee" shall be deemed to mean the amount charged to each applicant by the Township to connect said premises to the system to cover the cost of inspecting and approving the physical connection to the system and the issuance of a connection permit.

(j) The term "service stub charge' shall be deemed to mean the amount charged to each premises in the Township for the actual construction of one or more service stubs from the new construction to the property line of the premises at the time such service stub is constructed. (k) The term "premises"

shall be deemed to mean the lands included within the boundaries of a single description as set forth, from time to time, on the general tax rolls of the Township as a single taxable item in the name of the taxpayer or taxpayers at one address but in the case of platted lots shall be limited to a single platted lot unless an existing building or structure is so located on more than one lot as to make the same a single description for purposes of assessment or conveyance now or hereafter.

Section 2.01 The said system shall be used for the collection and transportation of sanitary sewage only. Downspouts, footing drains, weep tile, or any conduit that carries storm water or ground water, alone or in combination with sanitary sewage, shall not be connected to the system, directly or indirectly. Industrial and commercial waste shall be discharged into the system only in compliance with the standards and regulations of the County

Section 3.01 Premises within the area in the Township served by the system from which sanitary sewage emanates shall not be used or occupied, after the effective date hereof, unless said premises are connected to the sewage disposal system: Provided, that premises within the area in the Township served by the system from which sanitary sewage is emanating on the effective date hereof shall be connected to said system within twelve (12) months after the completion of the system,, but in any event on or before October 1, 1967.

Section 3.02 Plats for premises subdivided into three or more lots or parcels and permits to improve platted or unplatted premises, after the effective date hereof, which premises are within the area in the Township served by the system, shall not be approved or issued on behalf of the Township and none of said premises shall be improved hereafter by the erection thereon of a building or structure for human use or occupancy unless lateral sewers to serve all of said premises, as subdivided or to be improved, and to connect same to the system are available as part of the system or shall be installed at private cost or by special assessment (or a bond furnished or the estimated cost thereof deposited with the Township, as otherwise provided by law) unless the Township Board and the Board of Public Works of the County shall both determine by specific resolution that compliance with this section will work an unreasonable hardship

on the owner of the premises involved. Section 4.01 Owners of premises within the area in the Township served by the system from which sanitary sewage emanates, as of the effective date hereof, which premises are now served by or abut upon the existing facilities shall pay a connection fee for connection to the system in the amount of \$150 per unit, payable in three equal annual installments, with interest on the unpaid balance from time to time from April 1, 1966, payable annually at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, the first installment being payable on or before August 1, 1966, and succeeding installments being payable on or before each August 1st thereafter. Any such owner may discharge the obligation to pay such connection fee by the payment of \$150 without interest in case for each unit on or before April 1, 1966, or may pay any part of such connection fee in cash without interest on or before April 1, 1966, and thereafter prepayment of said connection fee may be made in advance by paying interest on the amount prepaid to the next succeeding August 1st following the date of prepayment. #### POCKET RADIO VALUABLE AID IN TIME OF TROUBLE

The battery-powered pocket -seemingly an appendage of teenagers's ears-had won a gold star for meritorious performance in time of emergency. The Federal Power Commission recently took official and commendatory note of the part the transistor receivers played in keeping the public informd during the Northeast power black out November 9, 1965.

Furthermore, the FPC acknowledged, although it did not endorse a recommendation of broadcasters that a national campaign be waged to persuade the public that battery-powered receivers are "a necessity in every home." Reports immed-iately after the blackout indica-
