The Department's capital investment will be limited substantially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate



Boating Tips ..



Never step on the gunwale of a small boat (it's pronounced "gunnel" and refers to the top edge of the boat's side). Step as nearly in the center of the craft as possible. Step aboard, don't jump, and use your hands to steady yourself. Never let your fingers come between the gunwale and dock. Don't carry your Mercury outboard or other gear aboard. Place it on the edge of the dock, get aboard, then lift the equipment in after you. If the dock is high and you are alone, consider lowering the motor into the boat with a line while standing on the dock. If the boat is pulled to shore for loading, one person should steady the boat while others climb in over the bow. Those who go aboard first should sit near the stern to raise the bow so it can be easily shoved off by the last person

to climb in.

"Full Faith and Credit," this phrase is the most meaningful and strongest description that can be given to any type of public financing.

There is no more powerful endorsement that can be made when a municipality offers its bonds for sale. When a municipality in addition to this gilt edge credit adds on the tax exemption feature of a bond it is sure to get the best possible rate of interest.

It is these tax exempt municipal bonds that are bought by those who are in high income tax brackets. The exemption of income tax from these bonds, is one of, if not, the highest form of subsidy that the Federal government has given. Billions of dollars of income tax are lost to the government by the sale of this type of bond. The Federal government did

not give up this source of revenue without a fight. As a member of the Advisory Committee of the U.S. Conference of Mayors, the writer has sat in on Senatorial committee hearings with the late Fiorella La Guardia, Mayor of New York City when he battled for this tax exemption on municipal bonds. Mayor La Guardia was president of the U.S. Conference of Mayors for 8 years and all that time he had a running battle with the U. S. Treasury Department to retain this tax exemption. After Mayor La Guardia, Mayor Kelly of Chicato kept up the fight.

The writer succeeded Mayor Kelly and served as president of the Conference for 2 terms. It was during this time that the Sec'y of the Treasury finally admitted that he would give the fight and municipalities across the nation have enjoyed this advantage in the sale of municipal bonds ever since. It was with this background that the writer became interested in the present situation in the Township of Ada when he read a public legal notice that the township of Ada was offering \$525,000 of bonds that carried the "Full Faith & Credit" not only of the town-ship of Ada but the "Full Faith and Credit" of the County of Kent for the purpose-so the notice read-of constructing a sewage disposal system in the township of Ada. The bonds also carried the tax exemption

feature of municipal bonds. On making some inquiry it

was found that the township of SUBURBAN LIFE, JUNE 9, 1966 Ada had been enjoying the benefit of a sewage system that had been built during the days of the great depression under W.P.A. It is said to have cost over \$100,000 but did not have a proper treatment plant and therefor was polluting the Thornapple River. Further inquiry discovered that a treatment plant can be bought as a package deal from at least 6 national firms and that the cost ran from \$20,000 to \$30,000, depending on the size required. It was also learned that Sand Lake is building a complete system of sewers with a treatment plant. The cost of the treatment plant for Sand Lake has been announced as \$23,000. Why then \$525,000 for a treatment plant at Ada?

Nothing in the legal notice said anything other than "sewage disposal" system. Now we find that the major portion of the \$525,000 is to help develop a real estate promotion of some 800 houses by a private promoter. Whereas he has heretofore been paying the going rate of FHA for his money, he is now going to get the benefit of "Full Faith and Credit" and the valuable "tax exempt feature" of a municipal bond.

The bond now becomes in fact a mortgage on every home and farm in the township of Ada. The amount of the bond issue represents approximately 10 percent of the entire valuation of all the taxable property of the township. If one real estate promoter can avail himself of this type of finance at 1/2 the cost of normal rate of interest on financing why should not every other promoter avail himself of this financial bonan-

Some questions that Ada home owners and taxpayers should be asking themselves are; what becomes of the charm that now is Ada's? Are we to become the mecca of every dollar hungry promoter who can get a contract signed by some unsuspecting young couple—then sell his contract to a finance company and then go on to other fields of easy money; what will the influx of hundreds of cheaply built houses for young families do to the school problem of this town-

ship?
The present supervisor sent to St. Louis for someone to reassess the property of Ada township and the homes and farms of the average owner was increased, in some instances as much as three times. Some have been forced to sell; at least one farmer has not been able to pay the increased tax burden and faces the loss




