Start planning for fluoride program here

The Forest Hills Fluoride Commitee in cooperation with the Grand Rapids-Kent County Health Departments and the Michigan Department of Health is beginning to make plans for the topical application of sodium fluoride to the teeth of the children in our community.

The program will be made available to pre-schoolers, 2nd, 5th, and 8th graders since it is at these various growth levels that children have many newly erupted teeth which should be protected against decay. Fluor-ide has been found to be effective in reducing new tooth decay by an average of 40 per-cent. In addition to these benefits the program offers a valu-able dental experience with no discomfort involved and dental health education is given the

child by clinic personnel. McCarthy. Preparations for the dessert smorgasbord are being conducted by Mrs. Leona Van-The entire procedure consists of four visits to the topical fluoride clinic, which will be lofluoride clinic, which will be lo-cated in one of the area schools. At the first visit the teeth are cleansed and the first applica-tion is given. An application of sodium fluoride consists of the teeth being isolated with cotton rolls, then the teeth are dried with compressed air and a 2 percent solution of sodium fluor-ide is applied to the teeth. On the second, third and fourth visits the application of the sodium fluoride is repeated.
