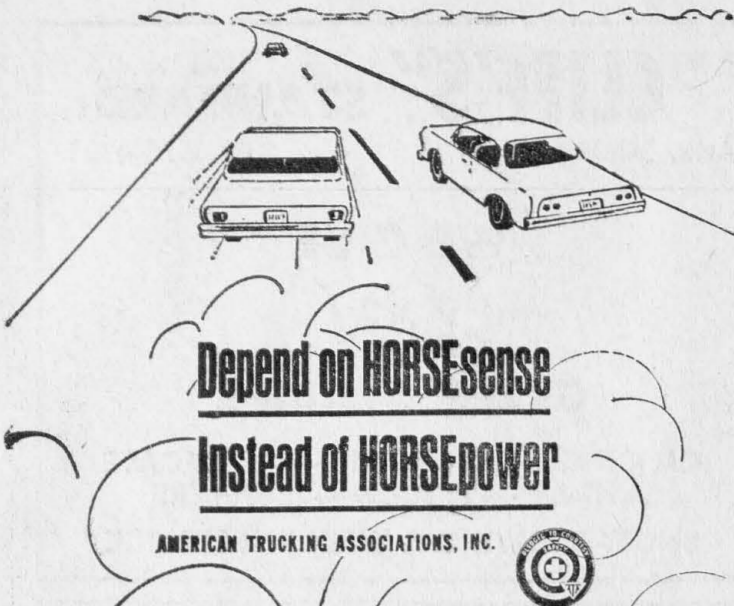

Basketball teams win

Forest Hills Rangers enjoyed their best period of athletic competition in the history of our school last week.

Ranger teams engaged in a total of eight contests and came away victoriously seven of the eight times. In addition to the varsity and junior varsity basketball successes, the frosh team rolled over Lowell by the tremendous margin of 56 to 24.

Ranger wrestlers grappled to a 24-17 triumph over Zeeland Thursday and they soundly defeated West Ottawa 29-11 on Tuesday.

Defense Downs Wyoming

The fine play of center Glenn Collins and a suffocating press kept the Junior Varsity alive until late shooting took effect as Forest Hills outclassed Wyoming at the Viking gym last Friday evening.

With control of the boards, the Rangers were able to get off 48 shots in the first half, but connected on only five of them for a frigid 10 percent. However, Forest Hills' press effectively choked off the Viking scoring attack and kept the Rangers within three points going into the midway break.

The Rangers started the third period without the services of Glenn Collins who had scored 9 of Forest Hills' 20 points and had pulled down 8 Ranger rebounds. Collins picked up 4 fouls and a sore arm in the opening half action.

Steve Grabarek sparked the JV's play in the third period hitting on his first two attempts to put the Rangers ahead 24-23. The Rangers never relinquished the lead. Forest Hills ran to a 3rd quarter edge of 38-31 and hustled through a hard-fought final period to finish the battle at 58 to 38.

The completed statistics showed Forest Hills hitting on 19 of 98 for a startling 19 percent. The Rangers also connected on 20 of 38 at the easy mark. The Vikings, by contrast, hit 16 of 46 from the floor for 35 percent and only 6 of 17 from the foul line.

Grabarek tallied 13 of the Ranger points, Tom Teft dumped in 12, and Glenn Collins ended with 11.

The effectiveness of Forest Hills' press was shown by the fact that not a single Viking broke into double figures.

Hudsonville Next?

The Forest Hills Rangers, victorious over Lowell and Wyoming Park in recent games, will entertain the high flying Hudsonville Eagles Friday night in the local gym.

The Rangers of Coach Don Kemp will attempt to upset the Eagles who recently moved into undisputed possession of 2nd place by dumping the South Christian Sailors.

The young, underclass Rangers have been improving lately with Juniors John Stovall, Steve Russ, and Jim Vanderbaan playing stellar ball. Seniors Randy Ashley and Greg Leach have played consistently in the past two games against Lowell and Wyoming Park. Sophomore Dan Mosher and Scott Wingeier are improving and their presence will be made known as the season progresses.

Game rescheduled

The varsity basketball game with Rogers High School postponed on January 27th because of the recent snowstorm has been rescheduled for Tuesday, February 14th in the Forest Hills gym.

Rogers is the league leader in the Ottawa-Kent Red division, having lost only one league game. The Golden Hawks have a giant front wall consisting of 6'5" Steve Minnema, 6'4" Brian Vossekul, and 6'3" Jerry Hoag. John Lindhout, a diminutive guard, is a speed merchant who directs the Rogers attack from his outcourt post.

The Rangers are a much improved ball-club over the last time the two teams met, and are hoping for a major upset.

Wrestlers Successful

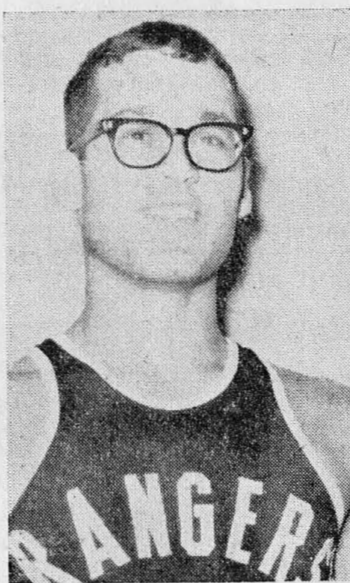

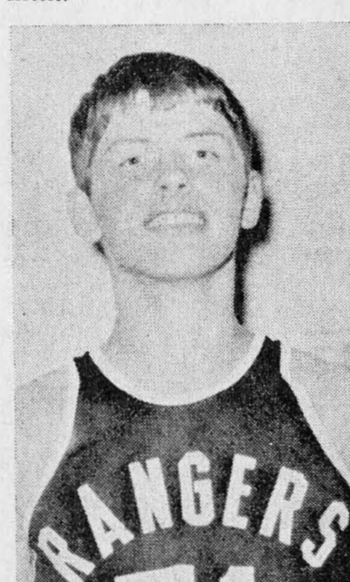


Ryan Ashley, No. 31

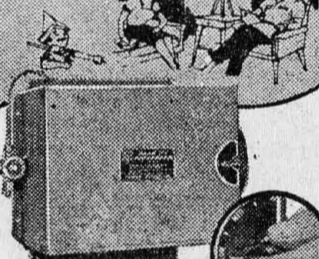
