

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



#### River group asserts policy

To the Editor, Suburban Life: In the edition of Suburban Life of March 16, 1967, there appears the Cascade Township board proceedings.

In this statement is information relative to a communica-tion from the Michigan Conservation Department in connection with the Cascade Dam and back waters and it states in "The Representatives of the Cascade Thornapple Association assured the board that the attending members of this association would form it as soon as a policy decision on the part of its membership is formulated."

This is misleading in the boards report because this policy was decided quite some time ago as to what our interest was and as to how this matter be handled when and if the Consumers Power Company decided to cease power produc-tion at the Cascade Dam. For an answer to that question I refer you to the article in the December 15th issue of the Sub-urban Life under the heading "The power to tax is the power to destroy.

Act No. 146, Public Act 1961, covers the situation and this act makes no provision for township handling, only county and total government in gases of state government in cases of this kind. Therefore we feel the statement outlined above in paragraph 2 is very misleading.

the direction of a special mem- members and those of the orial commission and the Cascade Township Board, the Cook Cemetery was relocated within the Cascade Township Cemetery on 30th Street.

Metcalf Funeral Home supervised the actual removal. Hugh Slater, a member of the com-mission and a life long resident of the township, said that either he or Miner L. Cook, a trustee of the township and chairman of the commission, were in attendance at all times. Miner Cook is the great-grandson of Jesse and Rachel Cook who were buried in Cook Cemetery. Jesse Cook is believed to have been the brother of Lewis Cook who gave the lands from part of his farm to the township to establish the cemetery in 1848.

Mr. Slater gave credit to the men who did the actual digging. He said that they used care and consideration for the remains. "Their skill was outstanding," he remarked. "It was a very delicate operation and I am satisfied that those men who worked used caution not to lose or injure anything." One casket had a glass top which was broken, but rather than wear gloves for protection against the jagged edges, the digger worked barehanded for fear that he might miss a bone or other object that should be removed and preserved.

A number of people thought that nothing would be found because the ground of the old cemetery was sand. However, for this very reason, the bones that were removed had lost their animal matter, but retained all of the mineral mat-

As removal took place each item large or small was taken to the cemetery on 30th Street where a large section of the ground has been put aside to create a cemetery within a cemetery. It is still the Cook Cemetery, laid out just as it was before from the scale drawings by Robert E. Klug. The total outside dimensions are reduced, but everything is placed as it was, including four rocks that were found forming a square near one of the graves.

The only object that has changed location is the iron fence which is now placed across the entrance on the west of the cemetery. You can reach it on a tanbark and stone path from the larger cemetery where it stands close to the woods and knows where it might be found, ial grounds.

There is one marker that has been missing for perhaps twenty years or more. If anyone knows where it migh be found, the commission members would appreciate a call.

A special monument or mark-er to be placed in the spring and dedicated at memorial ceremonies has been furnished by the Lowell Granite Company.
The granite selected for this
memorial is Rock of Ages Blue granite which is quarried in Barre, Vermont, and distinctive lettering was engraved on three sides explaining the old situa-tion of Cook Cemetery and the

Those members who spent so much time relocating the cemetery are in addition to Cook, Slater and Klug, Mrs. Roger (Marjorie) Wykes and Wendell Champion. Al Heemstra, Township Clerk, helped as an ex officio member in the coordination of the project.

One of the most unusual and perhaps unique plans for a township cemetery system belongs to Cascade as explained by Supervisor Gerrit Baker. by Supervisor Gerrit Batter.
All three cemeteries in the township are maintained by the township and any resident may be buried in one of them free of charge if his family desires. No plots are given out until needed and non-residents who wish to use one of the ceme-teries for a burial are charged a minimal fee.

Announcement for the date of the dedication ceremonies will be made in the spring.
