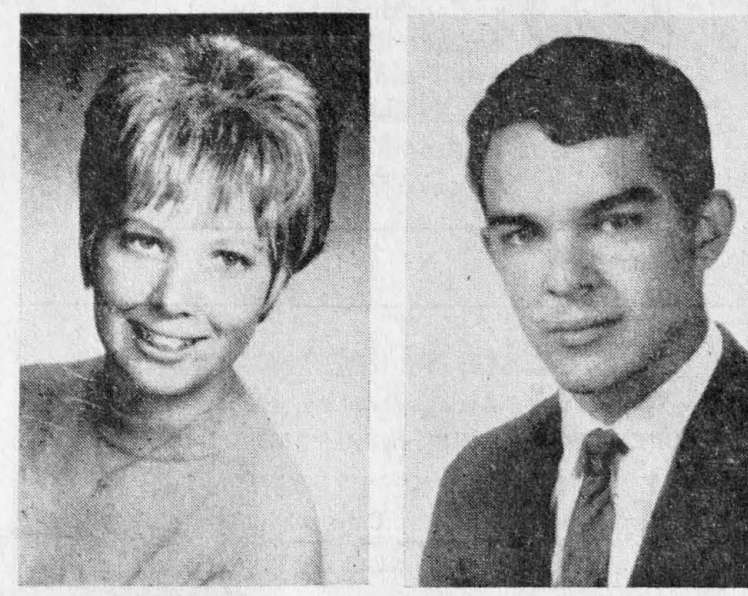

Teachers view Board offer

Recently the Forest Hills School Board published a statement in regard to an offer made relative to the need to adjust the current wage plan and year round employment for those teachers who are the primary wage earner in their family. Other fringe benefits were discussed such as extra sick leave, and extra pay for out-standing service.

The following statement was issued in answer to the Board by Gerald Broekschmidt, Chief Negotiator for the Forest Hills Education Association which represents the teachers and their views.

"We feel that the school board proposal insofar as it offers full year employment to those who desire it is very commendable. It recognizes that the teaching profession is made up of two distinct groups: The primary wage earner who must work the entire year to support his family and others who because of their personal situation need only to work during the regular school year."

"Current teacher shortages make it obvious that both types of teacher are very necessary. We believe that this shortage exists today because many who are trained as teachers do not enter the profession or leave it early in their careers due to inadequate yearly salaries. In the past these primary wage earners have been forced to take whatever non-professional employment they could find during the summer. Needless to say, this yearly summer job hunting is not a very encouraging prospect after one has spent four or five years in college preparing for his profession."

"From the community's standpoint we feel that a very comprehensive summer program could be developed at a very reasonable cost since the physical plant and the administrative structure are already available."

"A preliminary bargaining session brought out that major areas of difference exist with regard to progression, differential for summer employment and fringe benefits. Education has long lagged behind other occupations in the area of fringe benefits and this is very evident at Forest Hills where no medical or life insurance is offered. We are hopeful that an agreement can be reached but the original board offer was unacceptable in the above mentioned areas."

Sharon Marsman passes away after long illness

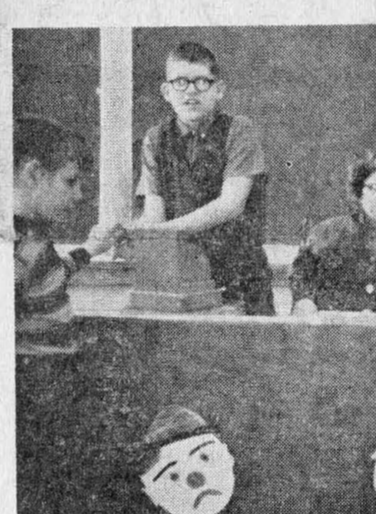

Fire chiefs hold conference

Chief C. Jeff Geldersma of the Kent County Volunteer Fire Department attended the 39th annual Fire Department Instructors Conference in Ellis Auditorium, Memphis, Tennessee, March 21 to 24, for four days of study and discussion of latest fire prevention and fire control methods.

Program subjects this year include problems of controlling concealed fires, fire department public relations, new ICC regulations for identification markings for hazardous materials in transit, handling fire emergencies on super highways and problems of fire department training and administration. There are 45 items on the four day program.

Over 4,000 persons from 50 states, Canada, and 15 other nations are registered at this international fire service gathering. The Conference is attended by key fire department officers, educators from colleges and universities, fire and industrial plant protection engineers, representatives of the armed services and public officials, all who participate only on invitation of the two Conference sponsors, the Fire Prevention Department of Western Actuarial Bureau and the Memphis Fire Department.

The Conference, now in its 39th year, is a clearing house for the exchange of ideas for improvement in fire fighting methods, in firemen's training, and in fire prevention. Presiding officer of the Conference is Emmett T. Cox, director of Western Actuarial Bureau's fire prevention department. Chief E. A. Hamilton, Memphis Fire Department serves as official Conference host.

Buttrick, of Ada, is chairman of this event for both city and rural areas. Chairman Mulder reported that some 8,000 women volunteers will be covering the county on these three nights. The rural workers will canvass the entire month of April. All workers are being briefed in their tasks and are being urged to make a 100 percent canvass of the territories assigned them.

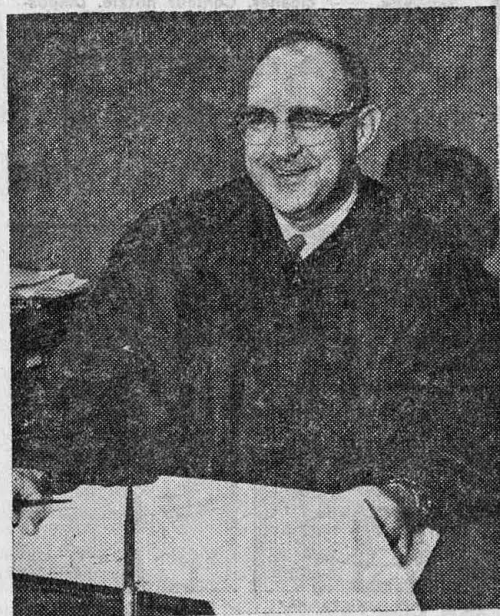
