# Holdup man still at large

Residents of the area were shocked to find crime on their doorsteps last Wednesday night when a holdup attempt and assault took place at the Ada Shoppers Square. Mrs. Lila Schenk, victim of the attack, is reported to be recovering from injuries incurred during the holdup

The holdup occurred when Mrs. Schenk, an employee of the Ada Debonnaire Shop for about three weeks, closed the shop for the night. When she entered her car, she found Edward K. Wilder, 27, of Parnell, hidden in the back seat. He hit her on the head and demanded money from her. She threw her purse into the back seat, jumped out of the car and ran away. Wilder began shooting wildly, firing 5 shots at Mrs. Schenk She was wounded in the arm and finger. The gash in her head took several stitches to close.

A warrant has been issued by Municipal Court Judge Woodrow A. Yard for the arrest of Wilder. The police say he has taken his sister's car and is believed headed for California. An all-points bulletin has been issued for Wilder's apprehension.


#### **Community chorus** to be formed



#### Automation


In the Grand Rapids Press of April 5, 1967, Harry Ferguson wrote about automation in the homes of the 21st century. He predicted that the housewife then will have an automatic maid which "will be shaped like a box, have one large eye on top, several arms and hands and long, narrow pads at her sides for moving about." This automated housemaid "could wash windows, sweep, vacuum and pick up the husband's clothing." He also wrote about automated kitchens: "The shelves will be stocked with foods which will be kept fresh through radiation. The menus will be programmed by a computer. Mechanical arms will serve dinner.

His conclusion was: "Every expert on the subject is agreed that our physical welfare will improve. Where they hesitate in front of a blank wall is when they try to prophesy our mental and spiritual development." It is certain that man will never improve automatically, for there is no automation in spiritual and moral life. In Second Peter 1:5, after speaking about the Savior Jesus Christ and the exceeding great promises of God, Peter wrote: "For this very reason you must do your utmost from your side, and see that your faith carries with it real goodness of life." According to Peter this consists in: knowledge, self-control, endurance, devotion to God, brotherliness, Christian love. What are you doing for your spiritual welfare? -John Guichelaar
