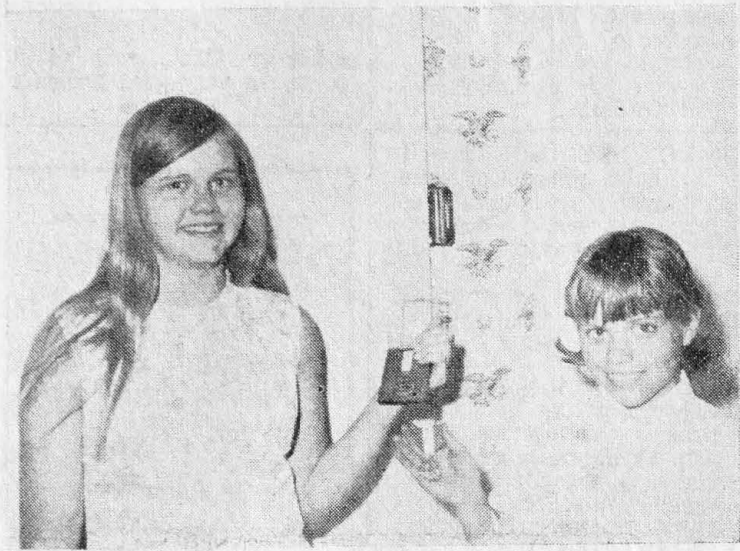

Holdup man still at large

Residents of the area were shocked to find crime on their doorsteps last Wednesday night when a holdup attempt and assault took place at the Ada Shoppers Square. Mrs. Lila Schenk, victim of the attack, is reported to be recovering from injuries incurred during the holdup.

The holdup occurred when Mrs. Schenk, an employee of the Ada Debonnaire Shop for about three weeks, closed the shop for the night. When she entered her car, she found Edward K. Wilder, 27, of Parnell, hidden in the back seat. He hit her on the head and demanded money from her. She threw her purse into the back seat, jumped out of the car and ran away. Wilder began shooting wildly, firing 5 shots at Mrs. Schenk. She was wounded in the arm and finger. The gash in her head took several stitches to close.

A warrant has been issued by Municipal Court Judge Woodrow A. Yard for the arrest of Wilder. The police say he has taken his sister's car and is believed headed for California. An all-points bulletin has been issued for Wilder's apprehension.

UFO sighted here

Nine P. M. Wednesday, April 12. Call received at Kent County Sheriff's Headquarters. Re: UFO sighting. Call came from the Krueer home in Ada.

The officer who received the call said that some of the children were reporting. He talked to several of them and they all related a tale of a UFO which flew near their home, suddenly dropped down near a tree, and quickly rose and moved off.

The officer was impressed with their story and their fear. He wanted an investigation. A cruiser with two officers left Ball Street and headed east on Fulton (M 21). On top of the hill near Alta Dale they spotted the object. Pulling to a stop, they watched it for some time as it moved eastward. They then followed it until they came to Grand River Drive and Fulton. The object had stopped moving. It seemed to stand still for an estimated time of at least five minutes.

As one of the officers explained, "It must have been hovering in one place, there was no change in the value of the lights. It could have been turning, the lights changed colors, but the values, the intensity, didn't change." He remarked that there was an oscillating red light on top as in a bubble as on an official car and two white lights.

"My first thought was that this was a balloon of some sort that must be tethered somewhere in the vicinity. I wanted to find out where. I called another car to join us and we waited for the rendezvous. "While we waited, we tried to figure out just what we were seeing. We began to realize that if it was a balloon, it had to be on a terribly long rope in order for it to have traveled from the south edge of Ada to Alta Dale and M 21, and back to the spot where we were watching it. It had to be a pretty clever trick.

"Just after the second car joined us, the object began to move again. It started north over Grand River Drive. I sent officers in the second car to talk to the children who had reported the sighting and we took off to follow the UFO again."

"This time the first car headed north on Grand River Drive for about a mile. When the UFO suddenly turned around, the officers turned back and then got out for a better view. The UFO was described as making easy, lazy circles, not turning sharp angles or laboring in a bank as a plane would do. The officer said, "It would turn and return as if it was observing the observers. Once it crossed the river and turned back. As it went overhead, the witness tried to make out its shape, but it was black against black and difficult to discern. The lights, however, were in a triangular pattern, one leading and two behind."

"The lights were really very strange. I can't compare them to anything else. There was no beam, they just seemed to glow. "There was absolutely no sound. We stood outside of the cruiser and had three opportunities as it passed to have heard it. It couldn't be that the sound was born away on the wind. We surely would have heard it at one time or another. And I don't see how there could have been that many air currents in every direction. "It passed over at about five

hundred to seven hundred and fifty feet. I have a feeling that it was not a large craft although I never could see a definite outline. There were no particular clouds to make it a reflection.

"I'm sure it was a controlled machine, but unlike any I can imagine. The strangest part was the lack of sound. We were on a quiet country road with no traffic. We could hear a car on the highway behind us, but the UFO was silent."

At this time the officers checked with headquarters and were informed that other reports of sightings had come in from Grand River Drive. Now the craft headed southwest and they left for Eastmont in hopes of catching sight of it again.

In the meantime the second cruiser had stopped at the Krueer home to get the story from those who had witnessed the UFO there.

According to them—Jim DeVol, a neighbor, Jack, Jim, Sue, and Marty Krueer were in the yard when they first sighted the UFO coming over the east hill across Ada Drive from the house. At that time it had a green light on top in a bubble and a wide band of red lights across the middle. But the lights kept changing. Sometimes they were white or red as it flew across the horizon from east to south to northwest. The UFO was oval shaped with one bubble on top and another on the bottom. The most frightening action the craft took was when it suddenly dropped toward earth behind a hill just in back of the house. The children referred to it as though it was "animated" as in a cartoon. As suddenly as it dropped, it flew up again and continued to travel in its circle until it looked as though it would head for Lowell.

It was at this point that they had run indoors to report to the Sheriff's Department. They were told to go outside and continue watching. Mrs. Krueer and David joined them just in time to see the object return to the southwest where it again dipped toward earth as though it would land, but then it continued on over the horizon and disappeared.

When asked about the size of the UFO, Jim Krueer said, "I didn't have anything to compare it to, but if I had to guess, I'd say it was about the size of a medium jet." They all agreed it was below the cloud level and that it was a solid object. They said the lights gave no beam, were not like spot lights, they "just seemed to be there." There was no sound from the craft at all.

"It's pretty crazy to go to school and try to describe that thing," said Jim. "I know I saw it, but it's hard to tell anyone else about it." "I was really frightened," exclaimed Sue. "When we talked about UFOs in my science class I laughed because I didn't believe in them. Now I do." A check of the commercial airlines reveals that on Wednesday at 9:05 P. M. two planes were due from the west, one from Cedar Rapids and one from Chicago. They were on schedule.

The U. S. Weather Bureau reports a high overcast for that date and time. Planes were flying. Stars were blocked out. A witness said, "Most aircraft make noise. Gliders are silent, but don't stand still for five minutes at a time. It couldn't have been a balloon, the lights were too distinctive, it seemed to be controlled, and the strange actions just made it appear to be flatter."

As one observer said, "If it was a hoax, it was a giant one." Jim Krueer put it this way, "You'd have to be pretty rich to rig up something like that." And a Sheriff's man concluded, "If it was a joke, I'd like someone to explain to me how it was managed. Until they do, I'll feel it was truly UNIDENTIFIED."

According to Peter this consists in: knowledge, self-control, endurance, devotion to God, brotherliness, Christian love. What are you doing for your spiritual welfare?

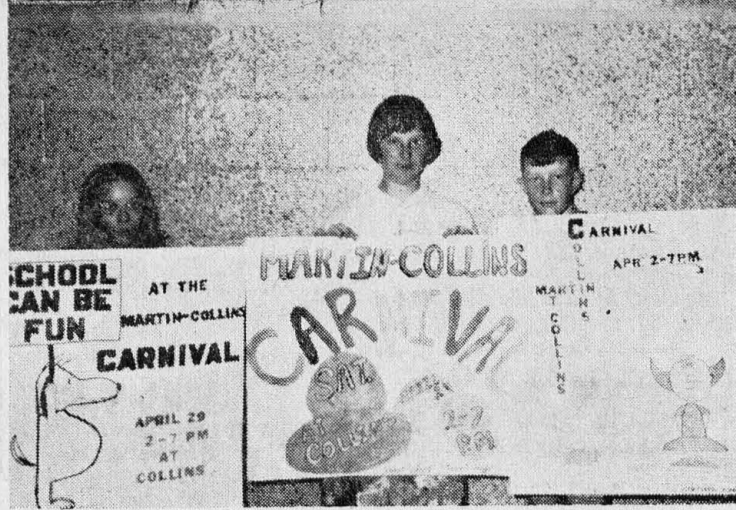
