

C & O ordered to improve track crossing

The Michigan Public Service Commission has ordered the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway to upgrade and relocate protective devices at its crossing with Patterson Avenue, SE, at the northwest corner of Kent County Airport.

The order was issued subsequent to an inspection of the crossing at the request of the Kent County Road Commission in connection with the widening of the roadway.

The crossing presently is protected by automatic flashing-light signals and half-roadway gates. Under this order, the protective devices will be relocated and the existing 16-foot gates will be replaced by gates 22 feet in length.

"The existing protective devices were installed in 1964," Peter B. Spivak, Commission Chairman, said, "and there is no reason to believe that this protection is less than adequate today. This order simply provides authority to provide protection devices commensurate new roadway."
