

April, May and June are the months of maximum tornado danger in Michigan, according to the Michigan Weather Service, which keeps tornado records and plots the paths of expected danger.

Next most dangerous tornado months are March, July and August. No tornadoes have ever been recorded in Michigan in November, December or January according to the weather service, which is operated in conjunction with the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

A highly accurate forecasting system generally gives three to five hours of warning. By tracking winds aloft with radar equipped balloons, the path of tornadoes can be predicted with 90 per cent accuracy.

Tornadoes occur when cold and violent winds of the upper atmosphere, sometimes up to 200 miles per hour or more, cross the path of warm, moisture-laden winds near the earth's surface. Drastic differences of air pressure at the intersection cause a whirling vortex, the tornado funnel.

A house or building near the funnel may literally explode outward, due to the vacuum created as air rushes upward in the core of the tornado fun-

Around the funnel, for as much as a quarter of a mile, swirling winds may reach ground velocities of up to 300 miles per hour. All the while, the funnel skips across the land at speeds upwards of 20 miles per hour.

While modern records seem to indicate a growing frequency of tornadoes, weather service officials point out that this is probably due to better reporting, rather than any great increase in tornado activity.




#### Marriage







You can drownproof your family this summer by teaching them a new floating technique. The method, developed by Professor Fred R. Lanoue, head swimming coach at Georgia Institute of Technology, is simple. According to him, most people drown because they Institute of Technology, is simple. According to him, most people drown because they panic; they exhaust themselves needlessly and soon go down. Object of Lanoue's method is to relax, make use of your built-in floating power without trying to overwork it by keeping the whole head above water. His six-step technique is shown above. In step 1), the student takes a deep breath and plunges in, allowing himself to stay submerged, face down. While exhaling in a normal breathing pattern, he slowly raises his arms 2) and when he needs to inhale, 3) he gently pushes down with his arms, forcing just enough of his head above water to breather. In other (1) he inhales with the set just enough of his head above water to breathe. In step 4) he inhales quickly through the mouth and lets himself sink again. Two common errors are trying to breathe twice during this stroke, and to get the head too far out of water. Both waste energy, In step 5) he will sink because he has just pushed his head above water, a motion which has overcome his natural buoyancy. The less the head is raised when taking a breath, the less the body will sink. In 6) he has once again bobbed to the surface, exhaling as he regains this natural position, and is now ready to start over. In practice, the rhythm of these motions can be timed to a comfortable breathing speed. You should not wait to breathe until absolutely necessary. -- Mich. Dept. of Conservation


