Sharp-Eyed Rookie Nabs Two Suspects

ber of the Lowell police force was credited today with the arrest of two Grand Rapids men sought in connection with a brutal beating and robbery.

Donald L. Fry, 35, and John R. Martin, 30, both of Grand Rapids, demanded examination when arraigned in Grand Rapids Municipal Court on a charge of robbery unarmed.

They were charged with the beating of Ralph Dyer of Ionia and robbing him of cash and personal belongings.

Grand Rapids police oroadcast a description of Dyer's car, which allegedly had been stolen by the suspects. Patrol-man Al Eckman, who joined the force just a few months ago, spotted the car on M-21 in Lowell and stopped it.

Failure of the driver, Fry. to properly identify himself led to his arrest, according to the report.

Fry eportedly also was sought on a felony warrant in East Lansing and for parole

wo Die in Bowne Mishap

Two Bowne Township residents are dead following the first fatal fire in the vicinity for over 35 years.

According to Alto fire chief Harold Metternick Gilbert Porritt, aged 60, died New Year's night when he was trapped in a second-floor bedroom of a house located at 11744 84th St.,

Porritt's brother-in-law, Howard Heacock, aged 63, who was sleeping in a downstairs bedroom, escaped from the burning house and rolled in the snow to extinguish flames

He suffered severe burns and died the following afternoon at Butterworth Hospital in Grand

The men were alone in the house at the time of the fire. Mrs. Heacock spent the evening visiting a daughter in Caledonia.

The Alto fire department alerted by a call from a neighbor, Mrs. Ella Flynn, were joined on the scene by units-from Caledonia and Cascade. Weather gave the firemen a hard time in fighting the blaze which was out of control when they arrived.

Subsequent investigation cit-ed an overheated coal stove in the dining room as the cause of the fire. Metternick estimated that the farm house. which burned to the ground, was an \$8,000 loss

Opposes New Bid on Land

A long-simmering feud be-tween Mrs. Virginia Myers and fellow members of the Lowell city council breke into the open again Monday night.

Mrs. Myers took exception to a proposal that council accept a new offer from John Gerhart to sell approximately 39 acres located in Vergennes Township at a reduced price of \$20,000.

The offer, originally set at \$21,000, was amended when surveyors discovered that a little-used lane was now owned by Gerhart.

The lane, in effect, offers a buffer between the Gerhart property and city-owned land-used for the local airport,

"If there was to be a change in the contract," declared Mrs. Myers, "it should have been brought to the council table

After verbally jousting with Councilman Herb Reynolds, a proponent of the purchase, Mrs. Myers moved that the council hold a joint meeting with the planning commission to discuss the new bid.

The motion died for lack of support.

Council, following much discussion, voted to accept the new bid by a 41 vote with Mrs. Myers casting the dissenting ballot.

Much of the discussion centered on whether the lane would prevent the city from utilizing a portion of its new acquisition for airport expan-

Primary intent of the purchase, as outlined in a recommendation to the council by planning commission last April, was to establish a new

Ralph Townsend, planning commission chairman who attended the council session as a spectator, told council it was his understanding that possible airport expansion had not been a major factor in the com-

"I assume," Mrs. Myers said, "that you are paying for this land."

"Your assumption is in error," Jackson replied,

Jackson explained that people interested in the airport have offered to raise monies for purchase or condemnation proceedings, if the latter is necessary, but that nothing concrete had been done pend-ing council disposition of the amended contract.

Councilman Carlen Anderson said he was not in favor of the city underwriting any additional expense on the airport and concurred, with Townsend, that the original purchase in-

Pace has submitted his resignation, effective June 30, to the Lowell Area School Board of Education.

The board is expected to accept the resignation when it meets next Monday night at 7:30 at the senior high school.

Pace announced his decision to resign following an execu-tive session of the board last Monday night.

The move was not totally unexpected in view of the district's continuing financial dif-ficulties following successive defeats in August and Novem-ber of special operating mill-age votes.

In his letter to Board President Dr. Robert Reagan, Pace said:

"I herewith submit my resignation as superintendent of schools, effective June 30, 1969.

"I have enjoyed my three years in Lowell and sincerely appreciate the cooperation I have received from the board, staff members and community

"I am using this early method of notification in order to give the board an opportunity to find a replacement prior to my leaving.

"Any assistance that I am able to give in finding a re-placement will be gladly giv-

"I do appreciate your sup-port during the trying period of debt and millage defeats and wish you only the best for the future."

Pace's three-year term as top administrator of the growsystem has been one of stormiest in the school's

Many of the district's problems boiled to a head last June when the board announced that the system was con-fronted with an accrued defi-

cit of \$114,000. Plans were drawn up at that time to seek additional operating miliage to offsat the defi-cit. Subsequent miliage elec-tions in August and November were turned down by district

Many opponents of the millage requests reportedly were openly critical of Pace's ad-



Petition Lagging

A special citizens advisory commitee, through chairman David R. Miller, has indicated it will request the Lowell Area School Board of Education to call for a new operating millage vote in March despite apparent failure to secure sufficient signatures in a monthlong petition drive.

"Unless many people sign up in the next few days, it doesn't appear we will get the 1,500 signatures requested by the board in December," Miller declared.

"However, our committee believes, after considerably study that the only logical solution to our present problem is to request another miliage vote at the earliest possible date."

The board had indicated in December, following two earlier millage election defeats, that no move would be made to seek additional operating cent of the registered voters offered assurance of passage.

Miller said that a March vote "is almost mandatory" if the board is to establish fiscal guidelines for 1969-70.

"The need for millage will continue to exist no matter how many times it may be turned down," Miller explained "The alternative is cheap education

"We owe the young people of our community a good education. Refusal to pay for this education will do nothing to correct injustices of the present tax structure."

Miller said the committee, calling itself Citizens for Better Education, expects to work directly with representatives in the state legislature in an effort to bring about legislation that would overhaul the school financing structure.

"This may take a long time, however, and time is not on our side," he added.

The petition drive, initiated a month ago, had secured only 800 signatures early this week.

Drive chairman Terry Bambrick said that petitions have been placed in most Lowell stores and at the YMCA office in an effort to meet the required 1,500 signatures by next Monday night's deadline.

"Whether our petition drive is successful or not," said Bambrick, "our committee hopes to keep open the lines of communication on such matters as school budget, curriculum study, future building needs and other subjects of interest to the voter.'

Lack of sufficient voter interest in the millage problem may cause the board to take steps at next Monday night's meeting to establish plans for a complete austerity budget for 1989-70.

The board indicated in December that half-day sessions are a strong possibility, perhaps as early as the second semester of the present school




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

children's birth certificates, insurance policies, wills? If you answered "Yes," fine. Now for the second part of this

quiz: Where are these documents kept? If they are stored helter skelter in a drawer, you fail on this section. If they are all kept in your safe deposit box, Laws affecting the use of bank safe deposit boxes often call for the box being sealed should the box holder die.

The box then can be opened only after involved legal procedures, causing delays when quick entry is needed. Wills should be deposited with your family lawyer. If desired, a copy may be placed in a fire resistant strong box at home. In this era of applications and records, it is suggested by experts on family finance that assets be audited periodically. The simplest method is to list all pertinent data in an easily kept notebook or tablet. The more detailed the audit, the more useful it will be. List stocks and bonds by date of purchase along with

identification numbers, maturity dates and other data. Give each issue a separate page, leaving room for stock dividends or splits that might affect future tax payments. All insurance policies should be listed separately with brief summaries of what they cover. Include the name of the issuing companies, policy numbers, premium dates, and telephone numbers and addresses of your brokers. Birth certificates, passports, college transcripts, military discharge papers also should be listed for easy reference when they might be needed for jobs, passports, voter registration. Each listing should carry a notation of where the document has been placed for safekeeping. Every care then should be taken to replace all documents

after they have been used. The notebook itself should be placed in your home strongbox, and for added safety you might keep a duplicate notebook in your office or with your attorney.




