Consider Half-Day Sessions

Preliminary plans for half-day sessions for Lowell Area School students in 1969-70 will be discussed next Monday night when the board of education holds a special meeting at 7:30 p. m. in the high school library.

The board also will review a tentative budget for the next school year.

Meanwhile, board officials have been notified that plans to hold a special millage election on March 17 have been approved by the Kent County Election Commission and that similar approval will be given by Ionia County.

Under a new law passed in 1963, elections held by schools having property in more than one county must receive permission to conduct the election by all concerned counties.

The board has indicated it will continue to seek seven additional mills for operating purposes to help wipe out existing indebtedness of approximately \$100,000 and to maintain "an average" educational system.

Superintendent James C. Pace, who resigned several weeks ago effective June 30, will submit a detailed report to board members at Monday's meeting.

The report was assembled by the administrative staff over the past six weeks following a request by the board for guideline information at its December 13 meeting.

Schedules and curriculum for the 1969-70 school year are key items included in the report.

An adult education course, designed to acquaint area residents with school financing, budgets and curriculum, will be offered free of charge in the high school cafeteria on Tuesday nights starting this evening (January 23) from 7:30 to 9.

A six-week course presently is planned. Local staff members will conduct the sessions and outside speakers will appear as well.

May Start Teen Club in Cascade

Plans to form a "teen club" for interested young people throughout the Forest Hills area were underway today.

A committee of three teenage representatives appeared before the Cascade Township board Monday to seek permission for use of the old township hall on Saturday nights for a three-month period starting February 1.

Township officials expressed great interest in the project and offered use of the hall for organizational meetings of the group until full particulars can be developed.

Sees Home No Council Change; Spurt in Lowell

A sudden spurt in new home buying has prompted developer Doug Dok, representing the Lowell Development Corporation, to seek city approval again of a plan to install a lift station on the west side of Lowell.

The sanitary sewer project had been set aside last fall at Dok's request when new home building prospects sagged sharply.

"We have sold many lots and prospects are good for continued sales," Dok told council members Monday night. "I would like the city to look into the possibility of renewing our offer to get the lift station project going again."

Dok also noted that engineering plans, altered since bids were first asked on the project, indicate that substantial savings are possible due to recent revisions.

Council instructed City Manager Bernard C. Olson to look into the matter and report back with his findings at the next meeting.

Plans for Valley Vista No. 6 will be unveiled before the planning commission next Monday night, Dok noted.

In other matters, council:

Forwarded to the planning commission for study an application from Mrs. Hugh Young for amendment to the zoning ordinance;

Approved an application from Melvin Rogers for a one-year franchise to operate a taxi service pending receipt of a schedule of fares;

Granted a request from the Chamber of Commerce for use of the Exhibition Building for an antique auto show in the spring;

Instructed the city manager to investigate the possibility of installation of a flasher signal at the C & O crossing at Foreman Road near the new Root-Lowell plant;

Heard a report from Olson regarding a summer internship program sponsored, in part, by the City Manager's Association.

No Council Change; Primary Cancelled

There will be no change in the makeup of the Lowell City Council for the 1969-70 term.

This was established at 5 p. m. Monday when only three candidates... all of them incumbent members of the city's governing body... had filed petitions to seek the three available seats on the council.

Petitions were filed by Mayor Arnold Wittenbach and Councilmen Harold F. Jefferies and Herb Reynolds before the deadline.

Wittenbach and Reynolds are completing two-year terms and Jefferies, who first ran for council a year ago, is finishing out his first year in office.

Lack of candidates postponed the need for a primary election on February 17. Seven candidates would have forced a runoff on that date.

The only thing at stake in the April 7 election will be to determine which two candidates will win two-year terms. The No. 3 vote-getter will serve only one year.

The deadline for voters wishing to register for the spring election is 8 p. m. on Friday, March 7. Registrations are accepted now at anytime during business hours at the City Hall.

Cascade Officials OK Pay Raises

The cost of administering to the needs of booming Cascade Township is expected to increase again this year.

Heemstra appointed Stuart Bradley, E. Clifton Parker and Ben Zoodsma to two-year terms on the Board of Review. Bradley until recently had served on the planning commission.

New appointees to the township's water council included Charles Dykhuizen, William Stellin and David Wallace. They replace retired members Neil Vierson, William Bouwman and Sy Dykhouse.

Chairman Charles Burlingham and Benjamin Brinks, Jr., will continue to serve on the council, which will hold its initial meeting of the new year next Monday night (January 28) at 8 p. m. at the Administration Building.

A year ago, township officials voted themselves a \$600 annual increase.

The board took action on two requests for Class C licenses to serve liquor by the glass, giving tentative approval to one if all conditions of the township ordinance are met and rejecting the other on the grounds that the application is in conflict with the ordinance.

Acting upon the application of Arthur J. Stroll, who operates Stroll-Inn at 6900 Cascade Road, the board issued this statement:

"It is the consensus of this legislative body that it would approve application of Arthur J. Stroll for transfer of classification of his 1968 tavern license to a Class C license to be held in conjunction with SDM license, above all others, if the location of the business establishment is moved to a location which meets all of the standards and guidelines set forth by the Michigan Liquor Control Act of 1964 and the zoning and liquor ordinances, as amended, of Cascade Township."

Stroll has indicated that he will establish a restaurant-type operation in the township.

The board turned down the application submitted by Ben Waskiewicz, who owns a tavern at 6815 Cascade Road.

A new system of liquor control inspection also is being developed in conjunction with the Kent County Sheriff's Department, which will take over this duty on May 1. This has long been a township responsibility.

Supervisor Al Heemstra asked for and received authority from the board to establish reciprocity agreements with adjacent townships on mutual-assistance fire protection.

The board also agreed to meet with Kent County Road Commission officials on February 3 at 10 a. m. to discuss current and future road needs for the township.

A request for an additional 25 lots to be included in Cascade Acres No. 2 subdivision was referred to the planning commission for study and recommendation.

A number of appointments were made to township panels,

Nab Two Quickly in B&E

Fast-action teamwork by Lowell police officers last week led to arrest of two youths on a charge of breaking and entering.

Elzie K. Williams, 18, of Lowell waived examination before District Judge Joseph B. White and was bound over to Circuit Court on \$1,000 bond after he appeared on the charge.

A juvenile arrested at the same time was turned over to state authorities. He is a ward of the state.

According to the report, the two were arrested several hours after police had received complaints of break-ins at the Drake Service Station and the King Milling feed mill.

A change box containing a small amount of money had been taken from the station. Entrance was gained by breaking a window. Nothing was missing at the milling company facility, according to police.

Dale L. Green, 25, of Detroit was arrested on a charge of driving while under the influence of liquor and pleaded not guilty before Judge White. Trial will be held at a later date.

Edward Adrianse, 73, of Lowell, arrested on a similar charge on January 16, entered a plea of guilty when arraigned in District Court and was fined a total of \$78, including costs.

Proposed Speed Limit Boost Rouses Council

City officials today expressed alarm at a proposal by the State Highway Department that speed limits on M-21 on the west side of Lowell be increased.

The state submitted a report, read at Monday night's council session, indicating that a survey taken recently showed the present limit of 45 miles per hour to be "ineffective."

"We need a lower speed limit, if any," declared Mayor Arnold Wittenbach, who pointed out that increased development of the area was producing more traffic volume.

Councilman Harold Jefferies said he was confident that city police records would prove that the rate of accidents along the stretch of highway has decreased since the limit was lowered several years ago.

"I don't understand why the state, which stresses lower speeds to reduce accidents, wants to go just the opposite way in our case," exclaimed Jefferies.

City Manager Bernard C. Olson told council he believed the lower limit had served the purpose intended, but added:

"I understand there have been some complaints to the effect that Lowell is a speed trap," said Olson, "and this may have had a bearing on the matter."

Olson is expected to meet with state highway officials next week to outline the city's stand.

Council also learned from the state that its request for a traffic signal at the corner of Main and Monroe had been denied.

Councilman Carlen Anderson noted that the state had conducted at least a portion of its traffic count to determine feasibility for the traffic signal on a Thursday, traditionally a day for businesses in the city to be closed.

Peg Schneider Fund Value at \$1.96 Million

Low-income rental units for qualified residents of Lowell and Lowell Township may be available within the foreseeable future.

This was the report from Phil Schneider, who submitted a detailed accounting of the Schneider Fund to members of the city council at Monday night's meeting.

Schneider disclosed that the fund, as of December 31, stood at \$1,960,000, of which \$146,000 is accumulated income from the trust. The fund is presently earning about \$44,000 annually.

The former city councilman, who is one of a three-member panel charged with administering to the fund, disclosed that plans for Schneider Village are developing rather slowly, but hopes that they will speed up following a meeting with officials from the Farmer's

Home Administration on next Wednesday.

He explained that the meeting is designed to set up possible financing at low interest rates.

The 24-unit project, when completed will cost, about \$300,000.

A total of \$11,500 has been spent on the project, excluding land purchase, to pay for architect's fees and survey work, according to Schneider, who assumed many of the responsibilities for steering the project to completion following the death of C. H. Runciman, Sr.

Donald Johnson, trust officer from Old Kent Bank, also attended the meeting and explained to council members that monies from the trust fund have been invested recently in more diversified stocks and bonds.

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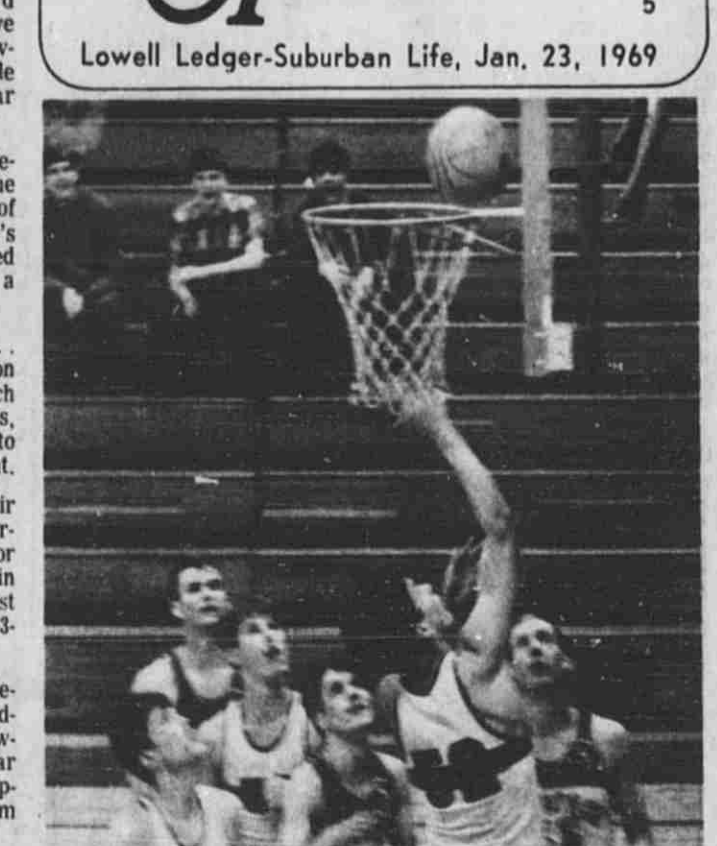

ORDINANCE NO. 39
City of Lowell

An Ordinance governing the design, construction, alteration, enlargement, equipment, repair, demolition, removal, conversion, use or maintenance of all buildings and structures; known as the Building Code, providing for the issuance of permits, collection of fees, making of ordinances; providing penalties for the violation thereof; declaring and establishing fire limits; and repealing Ordinance No. 10, known as the Building Ordinance of the City of Lowell, State of Michigan, and all ordinances or parts thereof in conflict with this Ordinance.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Lowell, Michigan, as follows:

SECTION I. Adoption of Building Code.

That certain documents, three copies of which are on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Lowell, being marked and designated as the Building Code, 1965 Edition and Supplements thereto, as published by the Building Officials, Conference of America, Inc. and are hereby adopted as the Building Code of the City of Lowell, Michigan, the said Code and Supplements thereto are hereby adopted and made a part hereof, as if fully set out in this Ordinance, together with any additions, deletions and changes, if any, prescribed in Section II of this Ordinance.

SECTION II. Additions, Inclusions, Deletions & Changes.

That Supplements for the years 1965 and 1966, as adopted and made a part hereof, as if fully set out in this Ordinance, together with any additions, deletions and changes thereto.

SECTION III. Fire Limits Established.

That the Fire Limits in the City of Lowell as defined and described in the Abridged Building Code are hereby established as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of center line of Main Street, also designated as State Trunkline M-71, and Hudson Street, line 11:21, thence northerly along center line of Hudson Street a distance of 185 feet to the center line of Hudson Street, line 12:12, thence northerly along said center line a distance of 330 feet southwestwardly along a line which is 12 feet southerly and parallel to the south line of Main Street (M-21) to the center line of Hudson Street (M-31) a distance of 185 feet to the place of beginning.

SECTION IV. Inconsistent Ordinances Repealed.

That all ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION V. Saving Clause.

That nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding pending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing under any act or Ordinance hereby repealed; nor shall any changes or legal rights or remedies of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this Ordinance.

SECTION VI. EFFECTIVE DATE.

That the City Clerk shall and he is hereby directed to certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and cause the same to be published, as required by law and this Ordinance shall be effective on February 3, 1969.
