## **Board Hits Back** at Millage Foe

embers of the Lowell Area School Board of Education and recently-rasigned Superin-tendent James C. Pace struck out at opponents of school mill-age at Monday night's month-ly meeting.

Referring several times to an article carried in the Feb-ruary 6 edition of the Ledgerburban Life, Pace said that certain inaccuracies need clarification."

The article contained mater-ial offered by William Doyle, who spoke against the need for seven additional mills for operating expenses in a meet-ing in Lowell on February 2.

District voters will go to the polls for the third time since August to vote on the board's appeal for extra millage on Monday, March 17.

"It is rather easy to make figures work to your advan-tage," Pace told the board and a turnout of 20 interested resi-dents. "But certain points that were brought out by Mr. Doyle are not accurate."

Pace noted that Doyle had indicated Lowell was fifth highest in the Kent County in the rate of taxes.

"I presume he meant the city...not the school district ...was fifth highest," said Pace. "The school tax in this district is 24.6 mills compared to the 24.58 average for all districts in the nine counties that make up Region 9 of the Michigan Education Associa-

Pace also noted that the student-teacher ratio in Low-ell was 25.1 to 1 in 1967-68,

The outgoing superintendent, whose resignation takes ef-fect June 30, also said that Lowell's per-pupil expense for 1968-60 is \$505, almost identical with Cedar Springs' \$5.02. High in the county is East Grand Rapids at \$711 and low is Caledonia at \$430.

"But even these figures don't always tell the story," said Pace. "It is up to each dis-trict to establish its own ed-ucational standards. We should be offering more ... much more ... to the average stu-

Board President Dr. Robert Reagan also took exception to the article, declaring:

"I don't believe you can compare school districts any-more than you can compare skowboats."

The latter was in obvious reference to Doyle's position as president of Showboat, inc.

Dr. Reagan noted that the 1968 production of Lowell Shows boat showed a net profit of \$5,835 on a gross of \$54,000 while Chesaning's showboat production netted \$12,075 in 1968 on a gross of \$39,998.


"I've recited these figures," he added, "but that doesn't mean that our showboat was any better or any worse than Chesaning's."

"These are just examples of what an austerity budget has meant to our district," de-clared Dr. Reagan. "We have jeopardized our standing throughout the state."
