SilverStarforGallantry Awarded to Ada GI

An Ada soldier, who was seriously wounded three days later, has been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action on January 17 in Vietnam.

He is Sgt. Daniel Olmsted, a member of Company B, 2nd Battalion, 505th Infantry of the 82nd Auborne Division.

The 20-year-old soldier, a 1966 graduate of Forest Hills High School, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Olmsted of 8761 Baile Drive.

The award to Sgt. Olinsted, authorized by President Nixon, is in recognition for his actions during an enment brainst the 'let Cong in South Vietnam. According to the citation, Sgt. Olmsted was serving as squad leader of Company B on January 17 when his platoon leader was mortally wounded. Sgt. Olmsted immediately assumed leadership of the

platoon, directing return fire on the enemy. Shortly afterward, a comrade was wounded in an attempt to rescue the fallen platoon leader. Sgt. Olmed rushed into the open, in full view of the enemy, and pulled the platoon leader to a protected position. He returned to the area through intense gunfire to rescue the other fallen soldier.



Record Road Bids Seen

A long winter of discontent for Micha gan's highway program ends May 7 when the Department of State Highways takes bids on 42 construction and maintenance projects costing an estimated \$34.1 mil-

Included is a Kent County project with an estimated price tag of \$310,000 calling for construction of a bridge over the Flat River on McPherson Street (extended) north of Lowell.

The estimated dollar volume qualifies the letting as the second largest ever con ducted by the Department. The largest was \$42 million on December 7, 1960. when bids were taken for construction on a half-dozen freeways,

It also exceeds, by nearly \$1 million, the total value of all highway contracts awarded by the Department in the last six months

It is expected that more than 300 bid ders will compete for the May contracts. Interest in the letting is especially keen because of the comparative scarcity of new highway work since last summer. The Department's November and January lettings were cancelled and others have been curtailed sharply because of Federal restrictions on the allocation of Federal aid for highway construction, and to give contractors time to comply with equal employment opportunity pro-visions of the 1968 Federal Highway Act.
