

Student Petition Sways Board Policy

'Conflict' Causes Change in School Negotiators

A possible "conflict in interest" has caused a change in the makeup of the Lowell Area School Board team negotiating a master agreement with teachers for the 1969-70 term.

In an opinion from school attorney George Cook, board member Gould Rivette was advised that a possible conflict might exist in view of the fact that Rivette's wife is a member of the school faculty.

The board decided at Monday's meeting to accept Rivette's resignation from the committee and appointed Dr. Robert Reagan, board president, to fill the vacancy.

William Jones, who disqualified himself from serving with the board negotiators for the same reason as Rivette, urged that the board assume legal fees of \$35 even though Rivette had sought the opinion independently.

The board took formal action to appoint Carl J. Hagen as superintendent for a three-year term. Hagen's salary, negotiable in each of the two succeeding years of the contract, was pegged at \$16,000 for 1969-70. He also is to receive an additional \$300 for the remainder of the present year as successor to James C. Pace, whose term as superintendent ends June 30. Hagen replaced Pace on May 1.

Donald Kelly, assistant principal and athletic director, was named acting principal for the remainder of the year to fill out Hagen's unexpired term in that office.

The board heard a report from the new superintendent that at least \$200,000 will have to be borrowed in two equal parts on July 1, and early September to meet operating expenses.

The loans will be repaid from taxes collected, starting in mid-December, from the recently approved operating levy.

Hagen advised the board that the June 9 election will call for a special ballot, available to property owners only, calling for the districts of Alton, Mapes, Moseley and Talbot to assume debt obligations of the district.

"Even though this was a consideration of the 1966 county reorganization plan," Hagen explained, "it must be officially approved by property owners of the district."

The new superintendent, filling the chair for the first time since his appointment in April, called for resumption of citizen's committees to assist the board in administering the system.

In other action, it was announced that Royce Ford (\$3,711.56 per unit) and Burch Body (\$4,250 per unit) were awarded bids on two new school buses scheduled for early fall delivery.

Exchange Mayor Busy; Cancel 'Day'

Mayor's Exchange Day, traditionally a highlight of Michigan Week activities in Lowell, will not be observed this year.

The planned exchange between Lowell and Morenci, located on the Michigan-Ohio border near Hilldale, failed to materialize when Mayor Charles Fink of Morenci advised local officials that business pressures would prevent his visiting Lowell next Monday.

Morenci has no plans, as a result of Fink's withdrawal, to conduct a Mayor's Exchange program, it was reported. This leaves Arnold Wittenbach of Lowell literally as a "mayor without a city" for the 16th celebration of Michigan Week.

Mrs. Virginia Myers, serving as chairman for Michigan Week in Lowell, indicated that no special plans were being made for a program to replace Mayor's Exchange activities.

"I'm rather disappointed that Mayor Fink will be unable to visit Lowell," said Mrs. Myers. "I think communities like Lowell can benefit by such visits."

Morenci was not originally scheduled to be paired with Lowell. When the first list

Metternick Unopposed Four Seek FH Term

Four candidates will seek to fill a "short term" seat on the Forest Hills Board of Education in the June 9 annual election.

However, incumbents James Banta and William Colvin will run unchallenged for two four-year terms on the board. In Lowell, Harold Metternick will be unopposed for the one seat open with the announced withdrawal of David Miller, who had turned in his petitions before Monday's deadline.

Miller, a leading spokesman on behalf of operating millage in Lowell's recent special elections, explained his withdrawal: "I feel that Harold Metternick has done and will continue to do a good job for Lowell schools and that, with his help, the board will accomplish goals I have in mind. For this reason, I am withdrawing as a candidate in the June 9 election."

Candidates filing to fill the remaining three years of John Wardrop's term on the Forest Hills board include Ken Klein-

stra, Roger Mathews, Gerrit Lemain and Mrs. Sarah Hamp.

Wardrop resigned recently following a decision to relocate in New Jersey.

Cascade School Hosts Carnival

A nautical theme has been selected by the members of the Cascade-Thornapple PTO for their annual Spring Carnival to be held on Saturday, May 17, from 3 to 7 p.m. at the Cascade School.

Area businessmen have donated prizes for the games and door prizes which include such old standards as the fish pond and cake walk, skill games and many new attractions.

A baby sitting service will be available. A home cooked meal as well as all kinds of goodies and refreshments will keep hunger away.

Lowell Area School board members, confronted by a petition bearing 132 student signatures, reversed board policy on the matter of married students participating in some school activities.

The vote was by a 6-1 count with Board President Dr. Robert Reagan dissenting.

Specifically, the board voted to allow several married students to attend the upcoming Junior-Senior Prom. Considered the top social event on the school calendar, the prom has been open only to qualified students and guests.

Under board policy, married students were not considered qualified for any extra-curricular activities, including athletics. During discussion at Monday night's meeting, it was also revealed that extensive drinking has been a problem at school-sponsored dances throughout the year.

Superintendent Carl J. Hagen told the board that special screening was necessary to exclude persons who had not followed rules and regulations in prior instances, whether at Lowell or other nearby schools.

Hagen said it was not uncommon that school officials check with each other during screening procedures.

"I don't want it to appear that this is a condition that can't be controlled," he pointed out. "What we do want to emphasize is that guest permits are restricted for several reasons... and drinking is one of them."

The latter was in reference to a student request that school administrators look more benignly on past records of certain offenders.

Dr. Reagan, in registering a negative vote on a change in board policy, said he thought the board was making a mistake to change at this time. New policies, if needed, should be placed in effect next September, he said.

Steve Lessens, who served as spokesman for eight students in attendance, said he felt the board should make an exception because of the importance of the occasion. "The prom is the last get-together for the seniors," he declared. "It just doesn't seem fair that students should go this far in school and then be refused guest passes for a husband or wife... and, in effect, be refused admission to the event."

Board member William Jones concurred and authored the motion that resolved the difficulty.

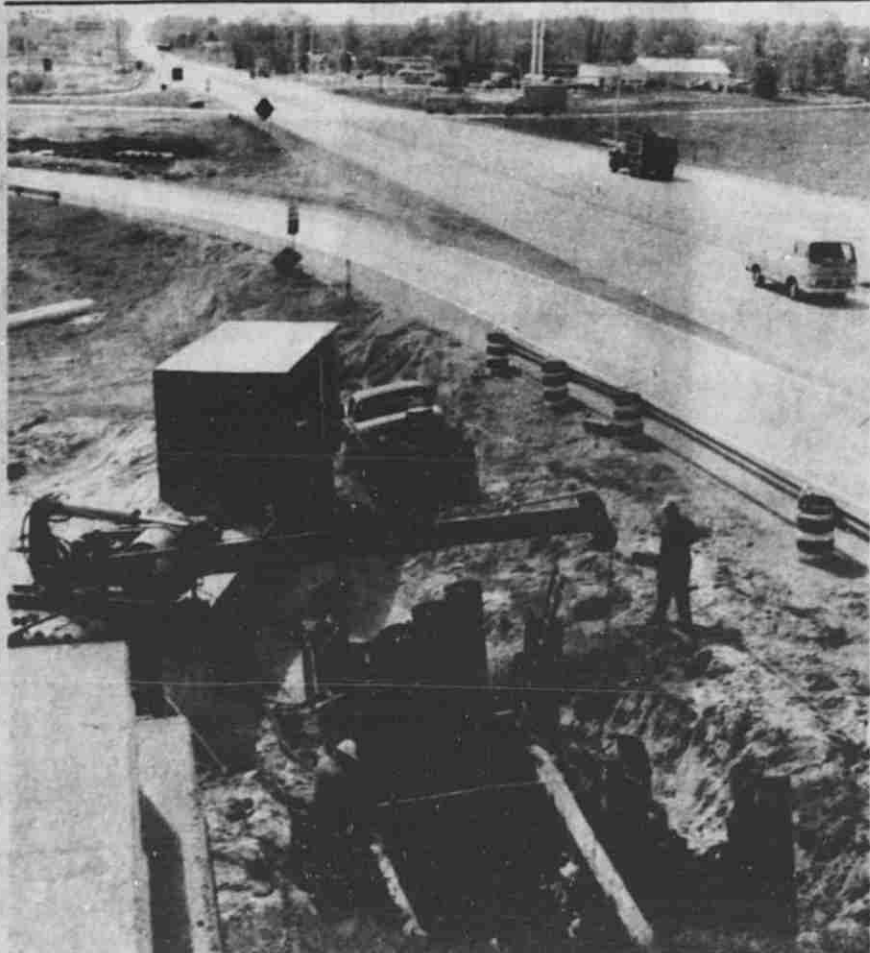
Set Car Wash to Aid Team

Disclose Plans for FH Schools

Qualified electors of the Forest Hills School District will be asked on June 9 to authorize the school board to sell \$2.9 million in bonds to underwrite the cost of three projects.

Included is an addition to the junior high school at an estimated cost of \$413,000. A pod of 14 classrooms will be added to the east side of the present school.

Project Two is the remodeling of the present high school into a unit to house 9th and 10th grade students. All classrooms are to be closed in. An intercommunication system, a new gym floor, improvement of the electrical system, and small renovations are planned. Cost of the rehabilitation is estimated at \$173,000.

Project Three is a new 100,000-square foot building to be constructed adjacent to the present campus. This will house and educate 900 students in the 11th and 12th grades. Estimated cost of this project is \$2,200,000.

An Additional \$94,000 will be requested for acquisition of future school sites and construction of a central storage building.

This would effect an increase in debt millage from the present 6.85 mills to slightly less than 9 mills required when the junior high school was constructed and elementary facilities expanded in 1965.

"To keep our promise to the voters of this district," said Supt. Robert R. Masten, "we will be keeping the millage under the 9 mill range."

At a special meeting of the board Monday night, members discussed the bond series with Fred Sher of Old Kent Bank.

It was decided that if successful passage of the millage occurred on June 9, the bonds would be sold in two issues, the first for \$700,000 and the second for \$2,200,000.

According to Masten, spreading the amounts will give valuation of the district time to catch up following the first issue.

Sherk said that not taking all of the \$2,900,000 out of circulation would aid in the sales of the bonds.

April Permits in Ada Set at \$344,950

A total of 19 building permits, with valuation of \$344,950, were issued during the month of April in Ada Township.

This was the report from building inspector Herman Stukkie at Monday night's bi-monthly meeting of the township board.

Nine of the permits were for new homes, the report indicated. In 1968, 18 permits valued at \$332,865 were issued in April.

In the only other action, the board approved a resolution to grade and gravel Conservation Road from the present black-top area east to McCabe Avenue, approximately one mile.

Special Ed Students Enjoy Week at Camp

A unique experiment in camping programs is sending twenty-four upper elementary special education students from area schools to Camp Manitoulin for five days this week. The students... 16 from Forest Hills and eight from Lowell... left Monday after a year and those in Lowell earned all of their funds by selling ice cream throughout the winter. Objectives of the program, according to Mrs. Maxine Edly, special education teacher at Ada Elementary, have been the group experience of working together for a common goal throughout the year and the final realization of living together at camp. Classes were scheduled in science, gymnastics, arts and crafts, and water and boating safety. The children live in cabins as all campers do, and in the evening gather around camp fires, hold scavenger hunts, & Olympic-type games. Awards are to be given at the end of the week. Camp Manitoulin is a YMCA camp on Barlow Lake. One hundred and twenty such students from the county are enjoying this program which is different than any other for special education students since their own teachers accompany them. They have been working all year outlining their duties such as setting tables, serving food, cleaning cabins and washing floors. In their own cabins they make their beds, straighten shoes, hang up their clothing and even take instruction. College students who are preparing for special education careers are acting as counselors by giving up a week of student assignment elsewhere. One of the most important experiences has been the raising of the money for the camp week. Students earned a portion of their own costs at the Ada School by showing movies and selling ice cream bars all year and those in Lowell earned all of their funds by selling ice cream throughout the winter.

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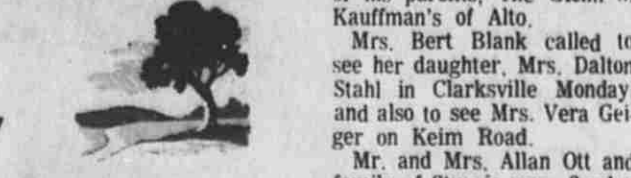

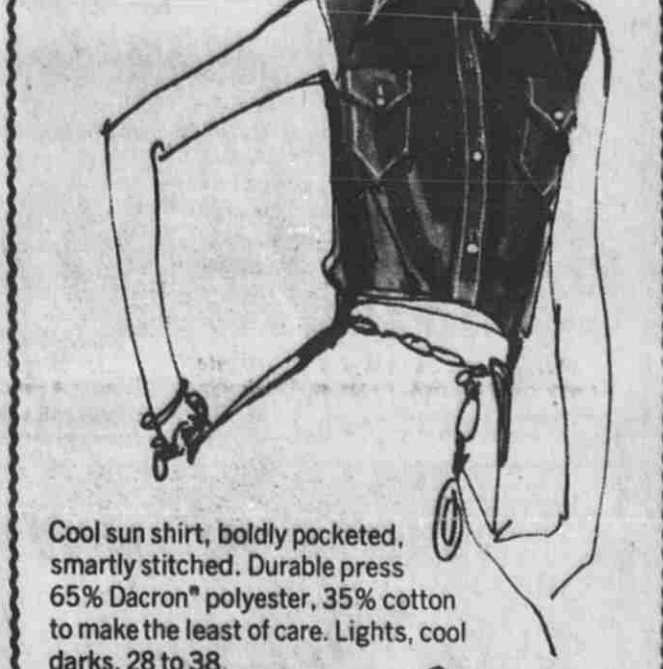
