Second 'Regular' Quits City Hall

The number of city hall "regulars" was reduced to one today with the announcement that Mrs. Gladys Alexander has resigned effective May 30.

Her resignation follows on the heels of City Manager Bernard C. Olson's decision to quit his position with the City of Lowell and will leave only Mrs. Laura Shepard to administer to the city's daily needs when Olson vacates his desk in June.

Mrs. Shepard serves as clerk and treasurer, both appointive offices. A year ago, Olson sought to have Mrs. Alexander named as treasurer, but his request was turned down by the city council.

Councilmen expressed concern about Mrs. Alexander's decision at Monday night's meeting, but decided to seek temporary office help during the next few weeks pending appointment of a new city manager.

The latter step was discussed in some detail, but nothing concrete was accomplished. Councilmen Herb Reynolds and Harold Jefferies both volunteered to make numerous inquiries in an effort to line up candidates to screen for the position.

It was not known if any local residents would be considered for the job. City charter prohibits elected officials from filling the post.

One of Olson's last major jobs with the city will be that of presenting the budget to the council. A special meeting, open to the public, is scheduled at City Hall this Friday night at 7 p.m. at which time Olson will go over the document with council members.

The tentative budget, subject to a public hearing Monday, calls for an outlay of

\$270,087... almost \$12,000 more than estimated expenditures for fiscal 1968-69 and approximately \$38,000 more than was budgeted for the present fiscal term.

Olson points out that an adjustment of 12.5 percent in the state equalized valuation of real property in Lowell, plus an increase in the overall tax base due to new construction, will permit the city to continue operating with a 12-mill levy.

Highlights of the tentative budget indicate an across-the-board increase of five percent for employee salaries and capital outlay of \$3,000 for a new sanitation truck.

Also scheduled for possible outlay is \$10,000 as part of the city's share for a flasher safety unit at Foreman Road and

the C & O Railroad. However, Olson reports that early estimates from the railroad indicate the city's share of the project might be in excess of \$17,500 even on a 50-50 participating basis.

Council asked that the city manager contact the Michigan Public Service Commission to request a public hearing on the (Continued on Page 2)

Court Busy Place on Many Cases

A 57-year-old Lowell man was assessed a total of \$150 in fines and costs and placed on probation for six months following his arrest on a charge of driving while under the influence of liquor.

Judge Joseph B. White of the 63rd District Court meted out the sentence Tuesday morning after Herman Ripmaster of 10718 Grand River Drive appeared to answer the complaint of Lowell police.

Ripmaster had been arrested in Lowell Monday.

A 17-year-old Saranac youth is spending 90 days in Kent County Jail following a plea of guilty when brought before Judge White on a charge of simple larceny.

Lowell police report that Christopher Moore was apprehended, along with a juvenile, on a charge of stealing a canoe and boat tarpaulin from a private residence on the Flat River.

Two Wyoming youths also appeared in District Court to answer charges of larceny following the theft of a wheel and tire from a Lowell automotive agency.

Judge White sentenced Leonard Poll, Jr., 19, to 15 days in the county jail and assessed fines and costs of \$53 for the May 11 offense. Hendrik Bouma, also 19, will be brought up for sentencing on June 13 following his graduation from high school.

Pre-sentence investigations were continuing for two area men arrested recently. Both were found guilty after jury trials in District Court. They were Alfred K. Pratt, 36, of 13019 Four Mile, arrested March 21 on a disorderly charge by Lowell police, and Bruce Frazier, 22, of East Main, Lowell, charged with littering on April 7.

Two other men arrested in Lowell appeared in Kent County Circuit Court and were found guilty of different offenses.

Kenneth Gould, 30, of Grand River Drive, Lowell, was sentenced to 283 days in the county jail by Circuit Judge John Letts, who suspended 50 days of the term. Gould was charged with resisting arrest on April 10.

George Shepard of Portland, Indiana, arrested on May 3 on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon, was returned to the custody of his employer in Indiana. He had been detained in the county jail pending appearance in court.

Offer Standby Fire Aid to Saranac Area

Lowell's fire department has been placed on stand-by to assist on calls from Saranac north of the Grand River.

The stand-by became necessary when a bridge spanning the river at Saranac collapsed last week.

Chief Frank Baker reported the measure to city council Monday night.

He appeared before council to request that the city contribute to a new truck needed to fight grass fires. Baker said Keene Township had donated \$600 and Bowne Township another \$200 toward paying for the vehicle. Total costs, when equipped, is expected to exceed \$3,000, Baker said.

After council approved payment of \$600 Baker said he hoped this would help him in soliciting similar amounts from Lowell and Vergennes Townships.

Lowell Township had paid \$600 to the city as payment for assistance on fire calls. Vergennes paid a similar amount several months ago.

Though based in Lowell, which pays a portion of the operating costs, the fire department actually is a unit of the Kent County volunteer force.

Will Conduct Annual Poppy Sale in City

Main Street will bloom with poppies Thursday, Friday and Saturday as the women of the American Legion Auxiliary and the VFW Auxiliary join hands to promote the annual Poppy Days.

The poppy, a symbol of sacrifice since the days of World War I, is worn in silent tribute to the men who have given their lives for their country since that time.

Monies collected are used to assist living victims of war and their families. All money is earmarked for child welfare work and the service and rehabilitation of veterans.

On Saturday, Legionnaires will take part in "Operation Old Glory" by presenting American flag decals to city residents without charge.

This American Legion program, in cooperation with the Reader's Digest, has the objective of encouraging the display of the American Flag decals on windows of schoolrooms, business establishments and automobiles.

More than 1.5 million people in the U.S. — most of them women — have diabetes and don't know it. And there are about 2.5 million known diabetics in this country, with a disease for which there is no known cure, but which can be controlled to some extent.

An analysis of U.S. Public Health service records suggests that the type of person most likely to be diabetic is an elderly woman with a weight problem. Nearly six out of 10 known diabetics are women, and on the average, they have more severe cases than men.

Diabetes becomes more common with age, with a peak in the 65-to-74 age group. In most cases, diabetes isn't diagnosed until a person is 45 years or older.

There's a definite relationship between diabetes and obesity. One recent screening showed diabetes occurring seven times more often among overweight people, than among normals.

The most frequently reported symptoms of diabetes are extreme fatigue, leg pain and eye trouble. Other symptoms are sudden weakness, frequent urination, thirst, loss of weight and abnormal appetite.

Diabetes can be detected with a relatively simple, quick and painless test. If caught early, the disease can be controlled with drugs and diet, preventing further complications.

Preparation of Salmon Important
Proper cleaning and cooking can lower the pesticide levels in fish, reports a Michigan State University scientist.
Dr. Norman Leeling, assistant professor of entomology at MSU, says that laboratory tests on coho salmon from Lake Michigan showed that DDT levels in the salmon were 25 to 30 percent lower after the fish had been cleaned and cooked.
"Pesticides are evenly distributed throughout the fatty layers in fish," explains Dr. Leeling. "These fat tissues are located along the belly and back of the fish, and along the lateral line on either side. When these tissues are removed, a substantial portion of the pesticides is also removed."
The MUS entomologist notes that skinning and cooking further reduce the pesticide residues in fish.

'Cycle Death Rate Soars During 1968

Motorcycle accident deaths took a sharp and alarming increase in Michigan in 1968, just one year after a court decision that invalidated a law requiring all motorcyclists to wear crash helmets.

In 1966, some 104 motorcyclists were killed on Michigan highways, impelling the Legislature to enact a comprehensive motorcycle "code" which included a requirement that crash helmets be worn by all riders.

Survey Notes Changes in Purchasing

Americans are changing their buying habits. They're spending more on their cars, more on eating out and more on consumer goods sold in stores offering a general line of merchandise.

This pattern of changing habits emerged from a study

of U. S. retail sales between 1959 and 1968.

For every \$100 of the nearly \$340 billion in U. S. retail sales in 1968, the combined share spent on automobiles, eating out and general merchandise came to \$41.15, the study showed. The figure for this was \$36.68 in 1959. The money spent in stores rose from \$11.44 to \$14.49 per \$100 of sales; on automobiles, from \$18.44 to \$19.22; and in eating and drinking places, from \$6.80 to \$7.44.
