Judge White sentenced Leonard Poll, Jr., 19, to 15 days in the county jail and assessed fines and costs of \$53 for the May 11 offense. Hendrik Bouma, also 19, will be brought up for sentencing on June 13 following his graduation from high school.

Pre-sentence investigations were continuing for two area men arrested recently. Both were found guilty after jury trials in District Court. They were Alfred K. Pratt, 36, of 13019 Four Mile, arrested March 21 on a disorderly charge by Low-ell police, and Bruce Frazier, 22, of East Main, Lowell, charged with littering on

April 7. Two other men arrested in Lowell appeared in Kent County Circuit Court and were found guilty of different offenses.

Kenneth Gould, 30, of Grand River Drive, Lowell, was sentenced to 283 days in the county jail by Circuit Judge John Letts, who suspended 50 days of the term. Gould was charged with resisting arrest on April 10.

George Shepard of Portland, Indiana, arrested on May 3 on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon, was returned to the custody of his employer in Indiana. He had been detained in the county jail pending appearance in court.

Offer Standby Fire Aid to Saranac Area

Lowell's fire department has been placed on stand-by to assist on calls from Sar-anac north of the Grand River.

The stand-by became necessary when a bridge spanning the river at Saranac col-

lapsed last week. Chief Frank Baker reported the measure to city council Monday night.

He appeared before council to request that the city contribute to a new truck needed to fight grass fires. Baker said Keene Township had donated \$600 and Bowne Township another \$200 toward paying for the vehicle. Total costs, when equipped, is expected to exceed \$3,000, Baker said.

After council approved payment of \$600 Baker said he hoped this would help him in soliciting similar amounts from Lowell

and Vergennes Townships. Lowell Township had paid \$600 to the city as payment for assistance on fire calls. Vergennes paid a similar amount

several months ago. Though based in Lowell, which pays a portion of the operating costs, the fire department actually is a unit of the Kent County volunteer force.

Second 'Regular' Quits City Hall

The number of city hall "regulars" was reduced to one today with the announcement that Mrs. Gladys Alexander has resigned effective May 30.

Her resignation follows on the heels of City Manager Bernard C. Olson's decision to quit his position with the City of Lowell and will leave only Mrs. Laura Shepard to administer to the city's daily needs when Olson vacates his desk if June.

Mrs. Shepard serves as clerk and treasurer, both appointive offices. A year ago, Olson sought to have Mrs. Alexander named as treasurer, but his request was turned down by the city council.

Councilmen expressed concern about Mrs. Alexander's decision at Monday night's meeting, but decided to seek temporary office help during the next few weeks pending appointment of a new city manager.

The latter step was discussed in some detail, but nothing concrete was accomplished. Councilmen Herb Reynolds and Harold Jefferies both volunteered to make numerous inquiries in an effort to line up candidates to screen for the position.

It was not known if any local residents would be considered for the job. City charter prohibits elected officials from filling the post.

One of Olson's last major jobs with the city will be that of presenting the budget to the council. A special meeting, open to the public, is scheduled at City Hall this Friday night at 7 p.m. at which time Olson will go over the document with council members.

The petition shall further allege, if true:

(a) That said trailer has a separate water system and

(b) No house trailer shall at any time be parked be tween the established setback line and the front line of any lot or parcel of land. Any trailer parked for over thirty days adjacent to the side of the house shall in all cases observe the residence side yard requirements of the Zoning Ordinance. No house trailer shall be considered as an accessory to a permitted use.

(d) It shall be unlawful to remove tires and/or wheels

ship case is involved, and any violations or wrongful acts were not intentional or wilful.

(f) Failure to observe any of the above requirements shall constitute a violation of this Ordinance.
