Seek Man Involved in Free-for-All

Lowell police today are searching for an unknown assailant who beat up two men in a free-for-all fight Friday night in an alley between Monroe and Lafayette streets.

Upon arriving at the scene officers found Boyd Arnett, 52, of Rt. 2, Lowell, and William Rose, 23, of Rt. 2, Lakeview, bleeding from face lacerations. Both were taken to Butterworth Hospital for treatment.

Witnesses said they had observed a young man drive off in a brown car. Police, however, were unable to get the assailant's name.

In another disturbance, police were called Sunday night to a roadside lot on M-21 beyond Vista Valley Drive where officers found angry neighbors had wrestled a young motorist to the ground and sat on him, waiting police arrival.

The residents told police that Kenneth Taylor, 21, 544 Cottrell, Detroit, had been seen driving in a reckless manner in the neighborhood.

When approached, officers said, Taylor became abusive. Police ticketed him for reckless driving and using profane language. He was taken to Kent County jail to await appearance on the charges in 63rd district court.

FH Teachers OK Three-Year Pact

Ratification of a three-year master agreement was approved by members of the Forest Hills Education Association by an overwhelming vote of 143 to 12 Tuesday.

The long-term contract was expected to win endorsement by the Forest Hills Board of Education in a meeting Tuesday night.

Superintendent Robert R. Masten said that the history-making document . . . first for more than one year since the district was organized in 1956 . . . calls for salary adjustments in each of the final two years based on the national cost-of-living index established by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Masten points out that the contract calls for a \$100 increase plus the cost-of-living adjustment, not to exceed six percent for any one year.

"If the cost-of-living index is higher than six percent," Masten said, "the additional increase would be reflected in later years."

Teachers with a bachelor's degree will have a starting base of \$7,000 under the new agreement with the 10-step schedule producing a salary of \$10,360 for tenure teachers with 10 or more years of experience. The range for teachers with masters degrees is from \$7,700 to \$11,480.

The contract further stipulates that the starting base for BA degreed teachers for

the 1970-71 school year will be no less than \$7,450.

Teachers participating in the summer program will be paid on an hourly basis, ac-

ording to the contract, and will be assigned in accordance with curriculum needs and prior summer program experience.

An important fringe benefit calls for school participation of 90 percent for health and medical insurance for employees and dependents.

The new agreement also calls for establishment of an agency shop, which requires enrollment in or payment of a service fee to the Forest Hills Education Association.

Masten said that an advance salary placement clause is included in the contract. In essence, this permits a teacher wishing an increase in classification to apply for such change. A special committee will be formed to study the applications and teachers will be rated "good" or "better" or "best."

Ratings would be based on teachers self-evaluation plus evaluations from principals, students and parents.

To augment the plan, the agreement calls for a maximum expenditure of \$15,000 to those who successfully meet the requirements in the first year and a maximum of \$20,000 expenditure in the second year.

Bells Sound Return to Classrooms

An estimated 9,255 students headed for their respective classes as schools opened Wednesday in Eastern Kent County.

As expected, this represents the largest enrollment in local school history.

A breakdown of the enrollment in Lowell area schools shows Alto Elementary with 348; Bushnell Elementary 326; Intermediate School 136; Runciman Elementary 445; Lowell Junior High 615; and Lowell Senior High 755 for a total of 2,625.

St. Mary's School in Lowell expected an enrollment of about 100 students at the beginning of the 1969-70 school year.

Some 4,050 students . . . an increase of about 200 . . . have enrolled in the Forest Hills School system. Of these, more than 1,200 will attend high school; 680 are in the junior high; while 2,100 students are attending classes in the system's six elementary schools.

In Ada, the Ada Christian School expects to enroll 200 students for the coming school year.

The Caledonia School system enrollment as of the Wednesday opening stood at 2,100 according to the latest count. Some of these students, however, are from outside of Kent County.

The privately-owned buses, run by interested parents, no longer will transport students from Grattan and Cannonsburg to Parnell St. Patrick's School. As a result, attendance may be below the attendance level of 200 for the 1968-69 school term.

Cyclist Injured

A nine-year-old Lowell girl suffered facial lacerations Sunday as the result of a bicycle mishap.

The girl, Cindy Labine, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Labine of 725 Lafayette, while riding on Grindle Drive apparently lost control of her bike and toppled over into the street.

She was taken by ambulance to Butterworth Hospital where she is reported in satisfactory condition.

Suggests Formation of River Authority

Backwaters of the Cascade Dam, threatened by a decision by Consumers Power Company to abandon operation of the facility, should be maintained by some form of river management authority.

This was the opinion expressed by Al Heemstra, supervisor for Cascade Township, in remarks before the Cascade-Thornapple River Association and members of the township board in a special meeting last week that drew 100 interested residents to Cascade School.

Heemstra set forth several proposals that could lead to an authority to run both the Cascade and Ada dams, claiming that a river management authority would "protect the river as a common area resource as relates to future public water requirements."

Heemstra's comments referred to the possibility of utilizing impounded waters for municipal water systems . . . an idea that both township have considered at one time or another without concrete action.

Ada township officials recently went on record as declining any participation to maintain the Ada Dam . . . and, in effect, closed the door to becoming a party to a river management authority.

Under Act 253, two units of government must act in concert to maintain the flow of a river under the River Management Act.

The Ada Dam currently is being operated by the Kent County Drain Commission with funds provided by a special assessment district made up of property owners whose lands abut the backwaters of the dam.

Estimated cost of maintaining the Ada Dam has been pegged at \$12,000 annually, according to Heemstra, who figures that it would cost about \$18,000 yearly to manage both dams.

Ada Man Dead in Cycle Crash

An Ada man was fatally injured Thursday afternoon (August 28) when his motorcycle collided with a car driven by Mrs. Frances Taylor, age 58, of 2517 Timpson Road, Lowell. The accident occurred at the East Beltline and Cascade Road SE.

Donald DeVogel, age 33, of 5855 Grand River Drive, Ada, died in the emergency room at Blodgett Memorial Hospital of head injuries.

According to Kent County Sheriff's deputies, DeVogel was heading north on the Beltline when he was struck by the car driven by Mrs. Taylor who was attempting to make a left turn onto Cascade Road.

Mrs. Taylor told the deputies she did not see the motorcycle as she entered the intersection.

Feature Lowell Teacher-Artist in Horse Mag

Avery, who specializes in the painting of riding horses amidst western mountain backgrounds, has done several colored covers for Western Horseman.

The magazine has many interesting photos of Avery's ranch, including a picture of his home, the Spear K ranch, located on Alden Nash, southwest of Lowell.

Also featured in the magazine is a lengthy story of how he became an artist and also of his induction into the field of horsemanship.

Avery is a science instructor in the Lowell High School, and his wife, Carol, teaches English in the same school.

They are the parents of two boys and a daughter. The eldest son, Cla, a 1969 Lowell High School graduate, hopes to enter Highland University; he is a south-paw first baseman.

The other son, David, 14, is said to be a good call roper, while daughter, Jane Ellen, 12, also is interested in the ranch activities.

Six Injured Slightly as Car Hits Tree

An 18-year-old driver and five of his passengers were injured in an auto mishap late Sunday night on Montcalm Road, about a mile north of M-21.

All were taken to Blodgett Hospital for treatment of cuts and bruises and released.

According to Kent Sheriff Deputies and Lowell police, the driver, Joseph Cesar Jeluso, 18, Grand Rapids, lost control of his car and struck a tree.

He was ticketed for excessive speed on a gravel road.

Cave-In Deaths Stir Officials

Ada Township officials, stunned by a tragedy that cost the lives of two young residents, are scheduled to consider possible legislation to remove the hazard of open sand pits from the township.

Supervisor Fred Clancy said that commercial operation of sand pits is regulated by township ordinance, but there is no provision for regulating private residential operations.

Clancy and fellow board members will discuss the matter next Monday night at the semi-monthly meeting of the board following a cave-in of sand that resulted in the deaths of Timothy Scott Robidoux, 12, and his cousin, Shawn Thomet, 6, last Wednesday.

The accident occurred at the rear of property owned by Shawn's father, Richard Thomet, at 5921 Two Mile Road NE.

Shawn's brothers, Rick and Randy, also were buried when a dirt "tunnel" the four boys were digging collapsed, but they were rescued.

Clancy said that investigation revealed there was no open sand pit operation as originally believed.

"Actually," he said, "the sand had been loosened because Mr. Thomet was leveling a hill."

Clancy said that township attorney Eugene Alkama had been contacted regarding a possible change in the ordinance. "We feel the township should safeguard its residents by watching that excavations are left in a condition that would not jeopardize anyone," he said.

Wednesday's mishap buried the boys under five to 10 feet of sand and clay.

Sheriff's Deputies Sgt. Donald Harrington and Gerald Pluger rushed to the scene.

According to Sgt. Harrington the "boys apparently had finished shoveling out the tunnel when one of the group, Scott Thomet, went to his home."

"When Scott returned he saw that the tunnel had caved in and one boy's head was sticking out of the sand."

It was then that Gail Cobb, 32, of 5880 Two Mile Rd. drove up. Cobb grabbed a shovel and dug Rick and Randy out of the heap, saving their lives by his quick action.

Neighbors joined the digging to rescue Timothy and Shawn but it was too late.

Rushed to Blodgett Memorial Hospital, both boys were pronounced dead on arrival.

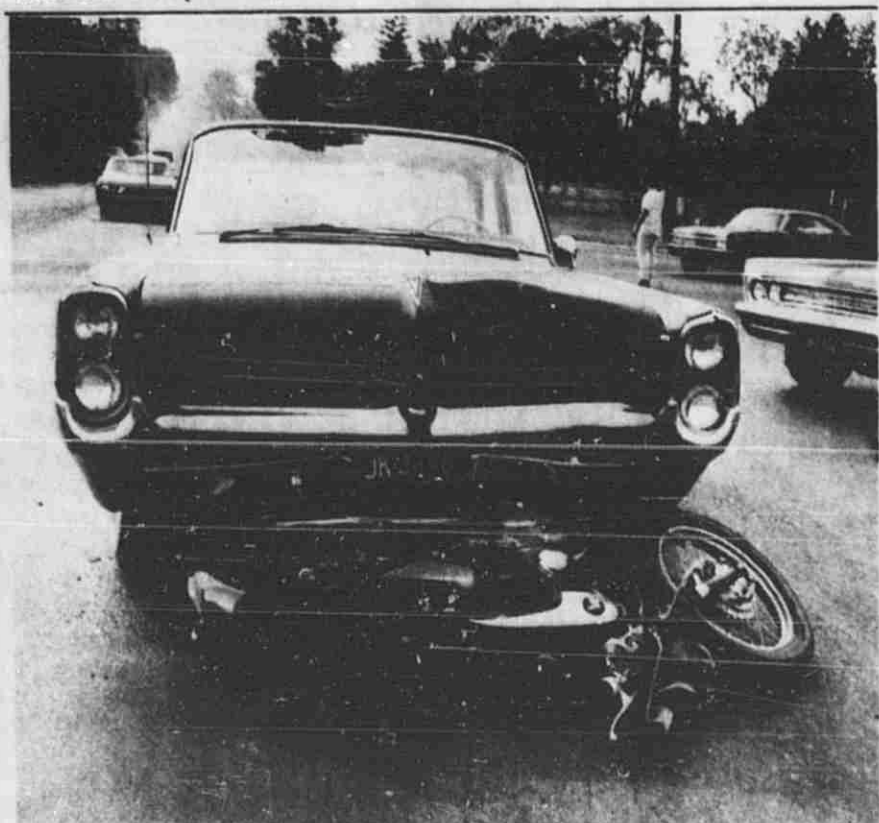
According to Kent Medical Examiner Dr. Henry J. Kreulen death was caused by asphyxiation and possible fractures.

The boys were students of Forest Hills Schools.

Timothy was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl R. Robidoux of 1949 Pettis Ave. NE., and Shawn the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard L. Thomet of 5951 Two Mile Rd.

LHS Driver Ed Program Produces 170 More 'Grads'

The start of another school year brings the annual caution from traffic safety experts to be especially careful when driving near schools.

And from Robert Perry, assistant principal at Lowell High School, comes a word for seasoned drivers to watch for young motorists who recently completed driver training at summer classes.

One hundred and eighty students participated in the three courses offered on a three-week basis during the past summer. Perry, Al Rowe and Jerry Smith served as instructors.

"The main purpose of driver education," explained Perry, is to translate the Golden Rule into the operation of a motor vehicle. The objective is to develop good citizenship in the exercise of the driving privilege."

Michigan has long been a pioneer in driver education and a Lowell resident, Norm Borgerson, is credited with initiating the program during his tenure with the Department of Public Instruction.

Automobile companies and their franchised dealers also have strongly backed driver education, especially in Lowell where new car agencies furnish automobiles at no cost to the program.

Participating dealers in Lowell are Azzarello Chevrolet-Buick, Jackson Motor Sales, McQueen Motor Co., Inc., Royce Ford and Wittenbach Sales and Service.

"The driver education program actually is run at no expense to taxpayers," explained Perry. "In addition to the fact that dealers furnish automobiles, the program is subsidized by a fee which is collected with issuance of a valid driver's license on a statewide basis."

Perry also points out that there is greater need for proper driver training instruction today than ever before, citing the fact that Michigan has recorded 2,000 or more deaths on the highway in each of the last eight years... including 2,388 in 1968.

"There were 305,495 accidents reported last year," says Perry, "of which 100,237 resulted in personal injuries to 160,413 people."

"The economic loss in Michigan alone was \$465,000,000!"
