## Cascade Loses Veteran Leader

In the death last week of Harold S. Chambers, the Cascade community lost a dedicated citizen, educator and spiritual leader.

Mr. Chambers, at age 71, passed away at his home, 1641 Loralee St. N.E. With the Rev. Raymond Gaylord officiating, services were held at the Zaagman Funeral Home, followed by interment in Chapel Hill Memorial Gardens.

A native of Carson City, he attended school in that community. Following graduation from college, he entered the teaching profession, and served in different school systems in Kent County.

Mr. Chambers was the first superintendent of the Forest Hills School system.

An ordained minister of the Church of the Brethren, he served as part-time pastor of the Cascade Christian in 1946-47.

As a lasting tribute to him, the Cascade Church at its last board meeting voted to send \$50 to C.R.O.P. Mr. Chambers had been a supervisor for C.R.O.P. in a five-county area.

## Michigan Week Chairman Named

Mark Mulder, a direct distributor for Amway, has been named Michigan Week regional chairman for this area of the state, which includes Allegan, Barry, Kent, Montcalm and Ottawa counties.

## Donor's Gift Helps Create Marine Unit

Emergency marine rescue equipment has been added to the Lowell Police Department.

It consists of two speedboats, both of which will be equipped with emergency apparatus.

One boat, a 15-ft. outboard with steering wheel and transmission, is owned by Police Chief Barry Emmons, who has placed his boat at the disposal of police and other rescue squads.

The other boat is a gift to the city by an anonymous donor. It is a 12-ft. aluminum boat with a 5 1/2 h.p. motor, and a trailer.

Attwood Corporation of Lowell has offered to equip both boats with marine accessories, which the firm manufactures.

Responsibility for keeping both rescue boats ready for instant action on the Flat and Grand Rivers has been accepted by the Lowell Police Reserves.

Formal acceptance of the new marine rescue was approved by the Lowell City Council at its session on Monday.

## Search Efforts for Drowning Victim Praised

An intensive search for a Lowell man missing since November 8 resulted in recovery of his body four days later from the Grand River near the point where he had been last seen.

Sgt. James Hutson of the Lowell Police Department located the body of Edward Minard, 83, while dragging the river Wednesday last week. A Kent County Medical Examiner was called to the scene and pronounced Minard dead due to accidental drowning.

The diligent efforts of area agencies and citizens brought official commendation from the Lowell city council at its meeting Monday night.

In a special resolution, the council cited the work of the Lowell police and fire departments, Kent County Sheriff's Department Marine Division, the special emergency rescue unit of Grand Rapids, Belding police and fire departments, Lowell police reserves and Leonard Jackson, William Ellison and Mrs. Elizabeth Wierenga, among others, for participating in the search for the drowning victim.

## First Time Hunters Bag Deer

Increasingly poor weather early this week led to diminishing reports of deer kills in Eastern Kent County after numerous hunting successes on the weekend.

Snows late last week that continued into Saturday produced near-ideal conditions for tracking throughout the area.

The earliest kill reported to the Ledger-Suburban Life was a four-point buck brought down by first-time hunter Marty Koepke, 14, an eighth grade student at Forest Hills Junior High.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Koepke of Spaulding Avenue, he bagged the trophy not far from home at 6:45 a.m. Saturday only moments after the season opened.

Another first-time hunter who reported success on opening day was Barbara Merklinger of 13528 Grand River Drive, who brought down a 150-pound eight-pointer on her second shot while hunting at 8:30 a.m. near 36th Street and Kissing Rock Rd. southwest of Lowell.

Two other area men reported their first kills, though neither is a novice hunter.

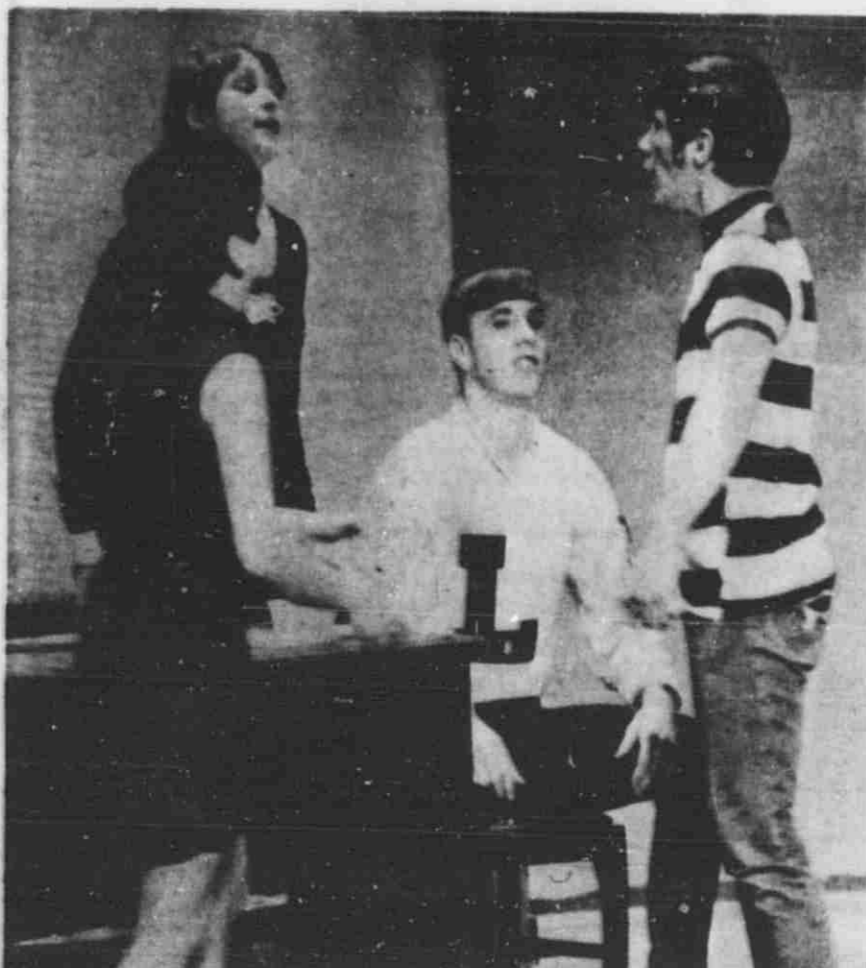
Orie Groenenboom, Jr., of 67 Lincoln Lake in Lowell shot a 175-pound spike-horn near Fallsburg Saturday at 7:30 a.m. and Terry Sinclair of 10019 68th Street near Alto brought down a 190-pound eight-point buck about four miles southwest of Alto Sunday afternoon. It was Sinclair's first deer in 14 years of hunting.

Hunting companions Dave Potter and Dick Beimers, both of Lowell, connected early Saturday on the site of the new Deer Run Golf Course at Platt Road and Old 16 south of Lowell.

Potter's buck was a 180-pounder with 10 points while Beimers bagged an eight-pointer weighing about 175.

Bill Bigler, an Ann Arbor teacher visiting his grandmother, Mrs. Minnie Huffman, brought down a six-point buck Saturday and his mother bagged a doe on Sunday. Both were shot north of Lowell.

Another young hunter, 15-year-old Craig Yeiter, also went north to collect his prize, an eight-point 175-pounder

## Multi-Million Expansion Program for Amway

Amway Corporation today had started the first phase of a multi-million dollar building expansion program at its plant in Ada and at company facilities at the Kent County Airport in Cascade.

The rapid growth of the 10-year-old direct-selling firm has necessitated a continual expansion and rebuilding program in a total of 47 projects since the firm's founding in 1959.

The newest buildings, totaling in excess of 100,000 square feet, are in addition to a 144,000 square-foot distribution center nearing completion at this time, according to Board Chairman Jay Van Andel and President Richard DeVos.

Replacement of a 14,400 square foot raw materials warehouse destroyed by fire in July is completed and includes a new 1,600 square-foot addition. A 4,000 square-foot aerosol mixing building and a 440 square-foot gassing house for the aerosol department will incorporate the most advanced safety devices.

Another 36,000 square-foot building, enclosing a former parking area, will house the graphic arts and printing departments.

The liquid building, in the northwest section of the industrial complex, is being expanded by a 33,000 square foot addition incorporating quality control laboratories, distribution division offices and engineering department offices.

The hanger housing Amway corporate aircraft at Kent County Airport is being expanded by 7,800 sq. ft. to accommodate a new 10-passenger, four engine Lockheed Jetstar to be used by the company.

A new powdered products production plant is being planned at the western end of the Amway complex.

All building programs are due for completion within a 12-month period bringing

the area under roof at Ada and Cascade to a total of 504,302 square feet. Construction of the additions also entails leveling and blacktopping of a 400-car parking lot.

In addition, many acres are being leveled and ground is being prepared for additional buildings to be announced later, including the Hall of Free Enterprise. Completion of announced programs will bring project total to 55 in less than 10 years.

## Santa Parade in Lowell Set for Nov. 29

The Lowell Senior High Band, decked out in new marching uniforms, will lead the parade heralding Santa's arrival in Lowell on Saturday, November 29.

Santa will travel the parade route in a pony cart driven by Marcel Kropf. The parade will start from a super market lot on west Main Street at 2 p.m. and wend its way to the city parking lot, where Santa will dispense candy to the children.

St. Nick's headquarters will be located at Christiansen Drug Store. Most Lowell stores will be open week nights til 9 p.m. starting December 5.

## CALLER IS FINED

Alvin Leroy Miller, 30, of 611 North Jefferson, Lowell, who was arrested by Lowell police on charges of disorderly conduct by reason of making disturbing phone calls, has been sentenced by District Judge Joseph E. White Jr. to pay a fine of \$25 and \$8 court cost. Miller pleaded guilty to the charge.

Judge White also placed Miller on six month's probation.

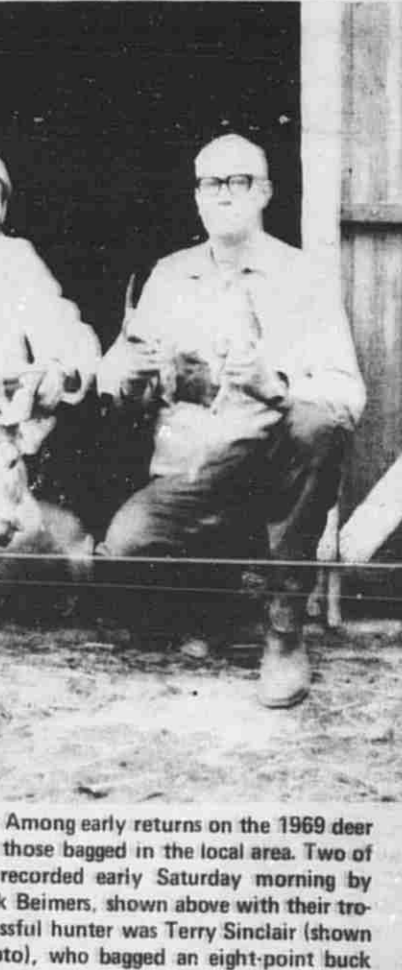
To the caterpillars, squirrels and the MTC I say triple phooey.

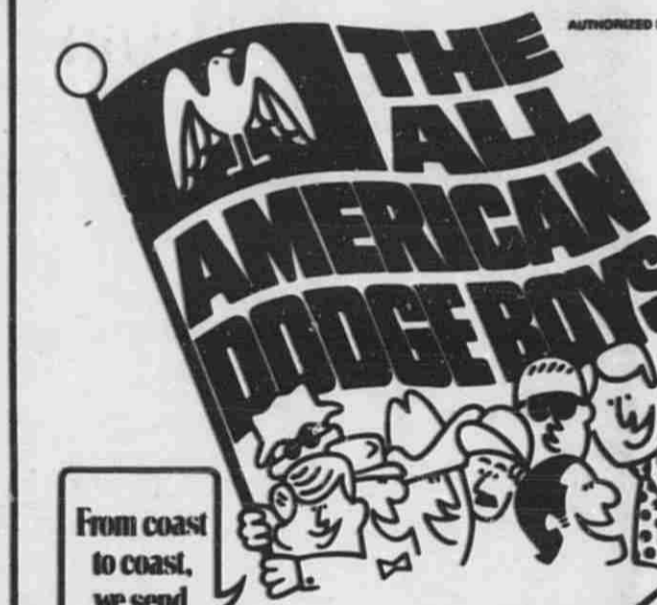

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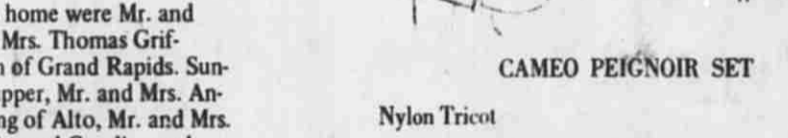

# Arrows Launch Cage Season at Home Next Tuesday

Four returning lettermen and three tonight junior prospects from last year's junior varsity squad will form the nucleus of the 1969-70 Lowell High School basketball team that opens its season at home against traditional rival Ionia next Tuesday night.

Action at the Lowell High gym gets underway with JV teams meeting at 6:30 and the varsity squads clashing at about 8 p.m.

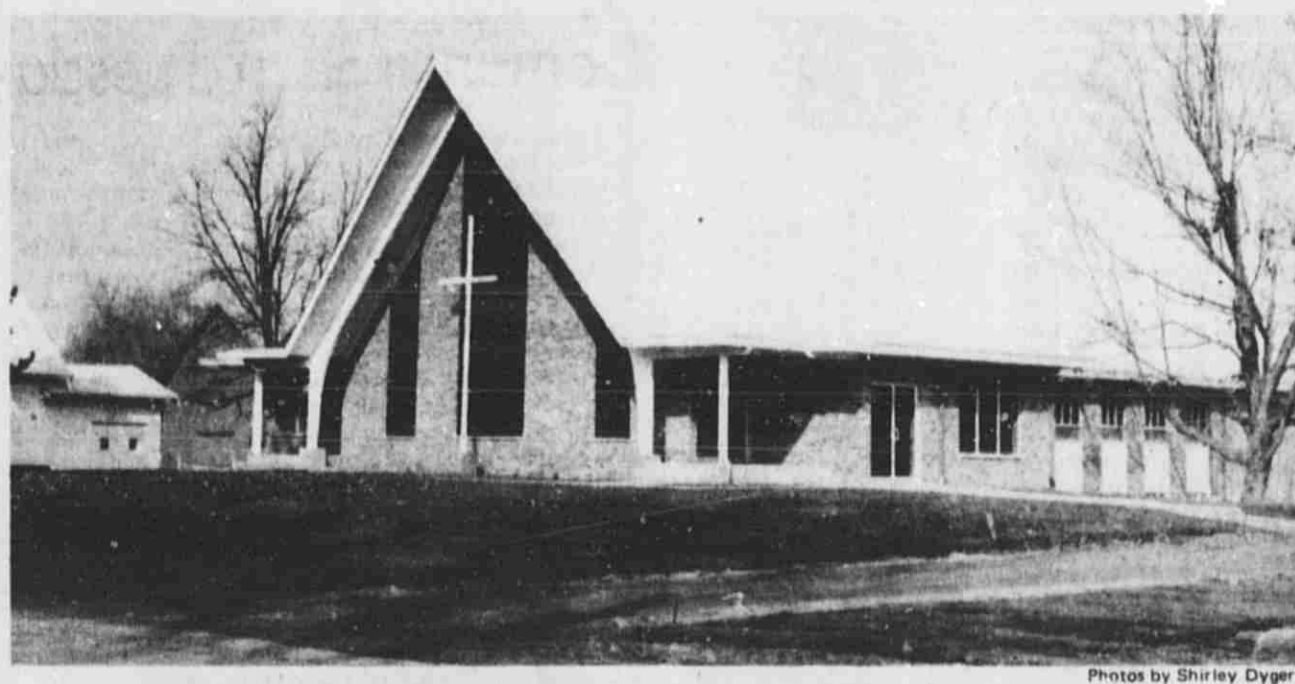

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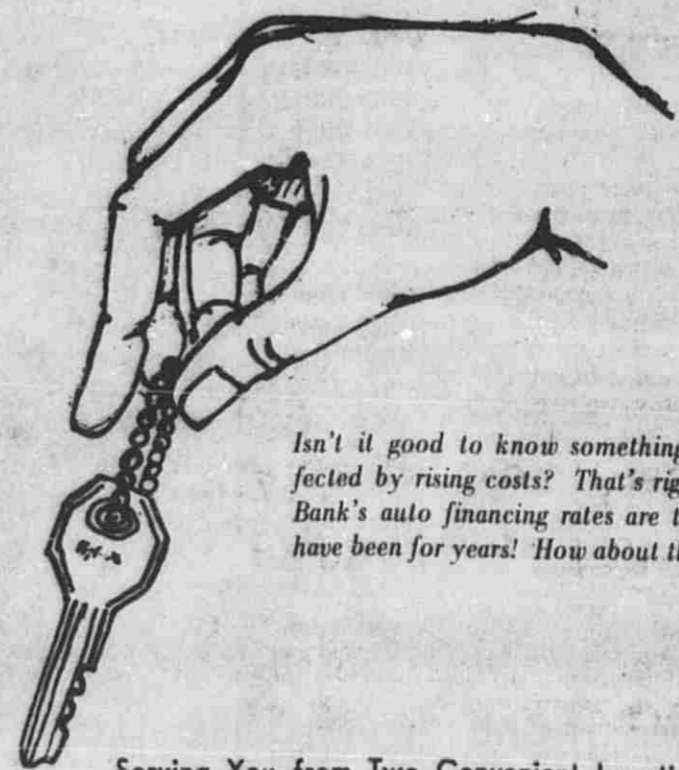
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
