Level Road Hazard on 30th Street

A long-time traffic hazard in Cascade Township is being corrected with funds allocated in this year's road budget.

The scene of thirteen recorded accidents, including a near-tragedy on February 1, the stretch of 30th Street at Colchester is being leveled to wipe out a hump in the road that obstructed driver vision.

For many years, township officials had requested the Vent County Road Commission for aid in the project. By coincidence it was on the evening of the night that a school bus hit a young boy at the corner that a decision was made to go ahead with the leveling as soon as the weather would

The road is being kept open as much as possible to through traffic. No completion date has been designated.

Ford Seeks Views of Constituents

Congressman Gerald R. Ford today announced he is mailing out 1970 questionnaires to nearly 142,000 residences in the Fifth Congressional District to obtain a sampling of local views on current issues.

A new feature of the questionnaire, Ford said, is that both husband and wife will be able to express their opinions on the same questionnaire form.

"I discovered last year that some questionnaires came back with an indication that the husband and wife strongly disagreed on some issues," Ford said. "So my questionnaire this year offers 'his' and 'hers' columns.'

Ford said he has limited the number of questions to 10 so as not to discourage replies. He emphasized that answers to the questionnaire will be helpful to him in deciding how to vote on various matters yet

to be tackled by the Congress this year. Eight of the 10 questions in the 1970 Ford poll require yes or no answers. The other two are multiple choice questions.

The multiple choice questions deal with general farm legislation to be voted on by the Congress this year and a choice of the most important issue of the day.



Consultant Conflict Under Study

The possiblity that Lowell's planning consultant may be involved in a conflict of interest arose Monday night at the end of a brief city council meeting.

Councilman Carlen Anderson, who sits on the city's planning commission as does Mayor Harold Jefferies, said he would like some clarification on the status of John Paul Jones, hired a year ago to serve as planning consultant.

At the time Jones was retained, he was similarly employed with the City of Grand Rapids. However, he recently took on a new assignment with Williams & Works, which services the engineering needs of numerous area communities, including

In addition, Williams & Works handles much of the basic engineering for Lowell Development Corporation, the foremost developer in Lowell.

"I have reasonable doubts about the

matter," said Anderson. City Manager Blaine Bacon said he had discussed the matter with Jones and indicated that the consultant may resign as

consultant for the city. Jefferies said the issue would be discussed at the next meeting of the planning commission, which has full authority to name the city's planner, on May 25.

Also scheduled for May 25 is a special public hearing on revision of the city ordinance governing overhanging canopies. The council received a recommendation from the planning commission that the ordinance be changed to permit 10-foot overhangs instead of the present eight-foot lim-

The change was requested by Chuck Lippert of Christiansen's Drug Store on be alf of store owners planning to remodel fronts with a special southern riverfront motif.

Council also was advised by the city manager that a petition seeking acquisition of a piece of property adjacent to the airport by condemnation has reached Kent County Circuit Court and that a hearing of necessity is scheduled before Judge Roman Snow on September 8.

The city is seeking title to a small strip of land that abuts property purchased last year for airport expansion and cemetery

# Reclaimed 'Pollutants' **Bring Added Dollars**

Many industries have discovered they've been letting some valuable assets literally go up in smoke and have been cleaning up, in a monetary sense, by removing "pollutants" from their systems before they billow into the atmosphere.

A manufacturing company which produces pollution con-trol equipment reports that fly ash removed from exhaust gases at electric power plants is now being used extensively in concrete mixes and asphalt. Utilities, which once had the

headache of disposing of the residue, now are selling part of it. In the rement industry much of the dust collected-in the interest of pollution prevention-from gases before it goes up the stack is returned to the cement-making process. Valuable quantities of copper, silver and gold are being recovered from ore-roasting processes by filtering the "dirty" gases emitted. Salt cake, a chemical essential to the paper-making process, is also recovered through air-cleaning operations at modern pulp

So many profitable uses are being found for "pollutants," in fact, that "waste not, want not" may soon become a famili
