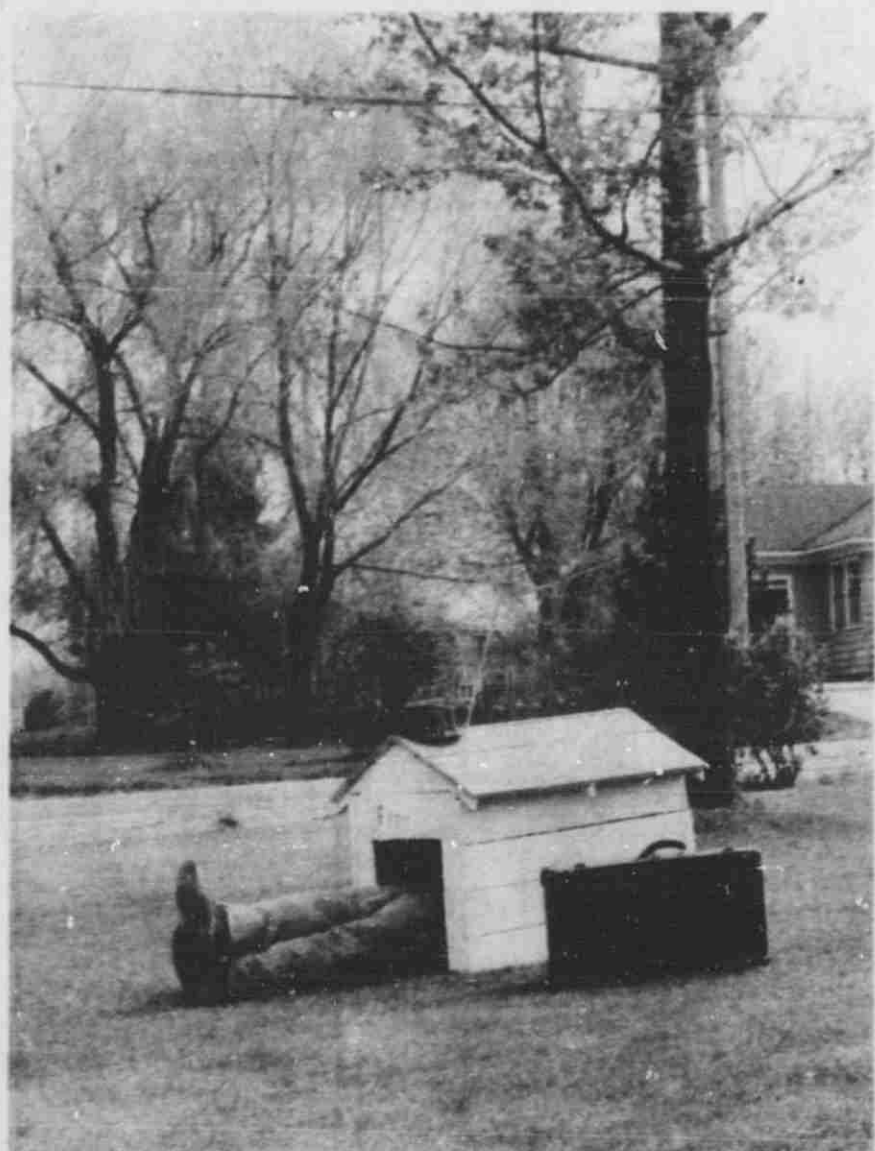

## April 'Boom' for Housing in Cascade

It may be a harbinger of things to come... or just plain impatience at the mortgage interest rates... but Cascade Township recorded its greatest number of new home starts in more than a year during the month of April.

Building Inspector Stuart Bradley reported issuance of 22 permits for the month, including 14 for new residences with a total valuation of \$356,000.

Bradley also reported to the township board at its monthly meeting that permits were issued for three new swimming pools and five remodelings for an additional valuation of \$27,050.

The 14 new home starts topped by four the total such permits issued in the first three months of 1970 and almost doubled the best previous months (June and November) in the preceding 12-month period.

Supervisor Al Heemstra reported that he will have a conference with Grand Rapids' City Engineer, Jack Hornback, township attorney, Walter Freihofer, this Friday to complete arrangements for the adoption of a proposed township water and sewer ordinance.

The new ordinance would establish procedures on placing of liens on the property of water and sewer system users who default in payment and on permitting Cascade residents in areas where sewer and water lines have been laid outside of special assessment districts to connect if they so desire.

The board took action to refer to the Kent County Planning Coordinating Committee a motion regarding D-1 zoning for a mobile home park in Section 17.

In other action, the board adopted two resolutions concerning water and sewer extensions on 28th Street. These resolutions provide for a special meeting of the township board to be held next Tuesday, May 19, to review the roll and hear any objections. Notices regarding the special meeting have been published and individual notices to each affected property owner concerned have also been sent.

## Middle School Plan Revived; Seek Special Funds for Land

A potential 16 percent increase in student enrollment within the next four years has prompted Lowell Area School officials to give a long, hard look at the district's building needs.

For this reason, the board will ask qualified electors at the June 8 annual election to approve a special 1.5 mill tax levy for

two years to create a building and sites fund.

Though much additional planning and negotiation faces the board, the possibility that a 14-acre tract of land will be available for purchase from St. Mary's Catholic School authorities in the near future prompted the millage request decision.

In all likelihood, the land, if eventually added to the public school system, would be used as a site for the proposed middle school housing grades five through eight.

Based on state equalized valuation of \$30,401,825 for the district, according to most recent figures released by the county, the special millage would produce almost \$92,000 in two years.

No other monies in the system are earmarked for buildings and sites except a small fund remaining in the Runciman Elementary account, according to Superintendent Carl Hagen.

The board indicated during lengthy discussions that it will move ahead on plans for the middle school with a possible early fall bonding proposal election despite the fact this is a heavy year for state and local elections.

Our enrollment projections indicate we are growing at an alarming rate," said Hagen. "Preparations for housing of students should be made before they are, in fact, physically ready to occupy the classrooms."

Plans for a middle school originated late in 1968, but were shelved in view of the district's distressed condition from lack of operating funds.

Board member William Jones said it was obvious that "the year of the pill", referring to oral birth control measures, had not yet brought about a slowdown in the enrollment rate.

"If we keep adding students at the rate expected," he said, "there just won't be enough classrooms to handle a regular program."

In other action, the board: Accepted resignations submitted by Jay Tans, Jr., and Ronald Moore;

Awarded bids for a 48-passenger special education bus to Royce Ford for the chassis (\$3,438.15) and to Hoekstra-Superior for the body (\$5,110);

Authorized use of computer scheduling for senior high students at an expected cost of \$500; and

Approved use of school facilities for various Lowell Showboat functions, but declined a request that the high school gymnasium be used as a back-up site in the event of rain.

He joins incumbent Dr. Robert Reagan, David Miller and David Wingeier in the race for two four-year seats available.

## Showman... and Watchmaker

It's quite a change from the lights and applause of the Showboat stage to the peace and quiet of watch repairman's workshop, but Joe Vezino enjoys both hobbies.

For the past two years Joe has been one of the endmen on the world famous Lowell Showboat. He admits that while he wanted to try out for the "boat" years ago, it

took the urging of a friend to finally talk him into what he now describes as the "two fun weeks of my life." Starring on the Showboat those two years were Dinah Shore and Milton Berle.

His interest in watch repairing goes back much further. What has evolved into a fascinating, pay-as-you-go hobby for Joe began in his teen years as an informal on-the-job apprenticeship in watchmaking at the Meyer Jewelry Company in Detroit.

In 1947, after finishing a hitch in the service, he attended the American Institute of Horology for some advanced training in watch repair. Later Joe owned and operated his own business... the West Park Gift and Jewelry in Wyandotte. Still later, Joe became associated with the chemical business and eventually joined the Amway Corporation in Ada. There he is coordinator in charge of packaging.

"Believe it or not," Joe says, "the tensions of the day just fade away when I get out my tools and immerse myself in the problems of watch repair." Almost anyone can take a watch apart, he went on with a chuckle, but its the putting together again that tells the story.

While most of Joe's watch repairing time is spent on the everyday watches of his friends and neighbors, he also has a collection of antique timepieces. The art of modern watch and clock making dates back to 1395, according to Joe, when the first me-

## Area Soldier Killed in Viet Action

Full military honors will be accorded PFC Jack Alden Noon during services Saturday at 2 p.m. at Roth Funeral Home for the 20-year-old Lowell area soldier killed May 1 in Vietnam.

A special military honor guard is being dispatched to Lowell from Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Ind., to pay tribute to the fallen hero, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cloyd R. Noon of 2375 Marble Road in Keene Township.

The body was scheduled to arrive with military escort late Wednesday and will lie in state at the funeral home Thursday and Friday.

PFC Noon was serving in the northern sector of South Vietnam when his unit, the 3rd Battalion, 21st Infantry Regiment of the Americal Division, reportedly was overrun by enemy troops. He was one of a number of U. S. casualties in the bitter fighting that followed.

In addition to his parents, the dead soldier is survived by three brothers, Harvey of Saranac and Samuel and Randall, both at home; three sisters, Mrs. Terry (Beverly) Fisher of Saranac and Jill and Pamela, both at home; maternal grandmother, Mrs. Emma Blough of Alto, and several aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews.

Services will be conducted by Reverend Daniel Zook of Bowne Mennonite Church with burial in Pinckney Cemetery.

## Tornado 'Season' at Hand

Though April has been the biggest month for tornadoes in Michigan over the past 50 years, the start of the tornado "season" for 1970 is believed to be now at hand.

Most twisters in the state occur between April and July, though they have struck in Michigan as late as October.

Col. Fredrick E. Davis, State Police Director and head of Michigan's Civil Defense unit, has advised citizens to be alert for tornado activity and to report sightings promptly.

"There were eight known tornadoes in Michigan last year," Davis said, "Fortunately no one was killed." He pointed out that early warning and public awareness can do more to protect lives than anything else.

Civil Defense officials advise knowing the difference between an announced tornado "watch" and tornado "warning." A tornado watch is used to alert the public to the possibility that tornadoes may develop over a certain area. A tornado warning means that a tornado has been sighted in the area or its presence is indicated by radar.

When the tornado signal or alarm is sounded, officials advise taking cover immediately. In open country a ravine or ditch affords some protection while basements or underground cellars will afford shelter for those at home or work.

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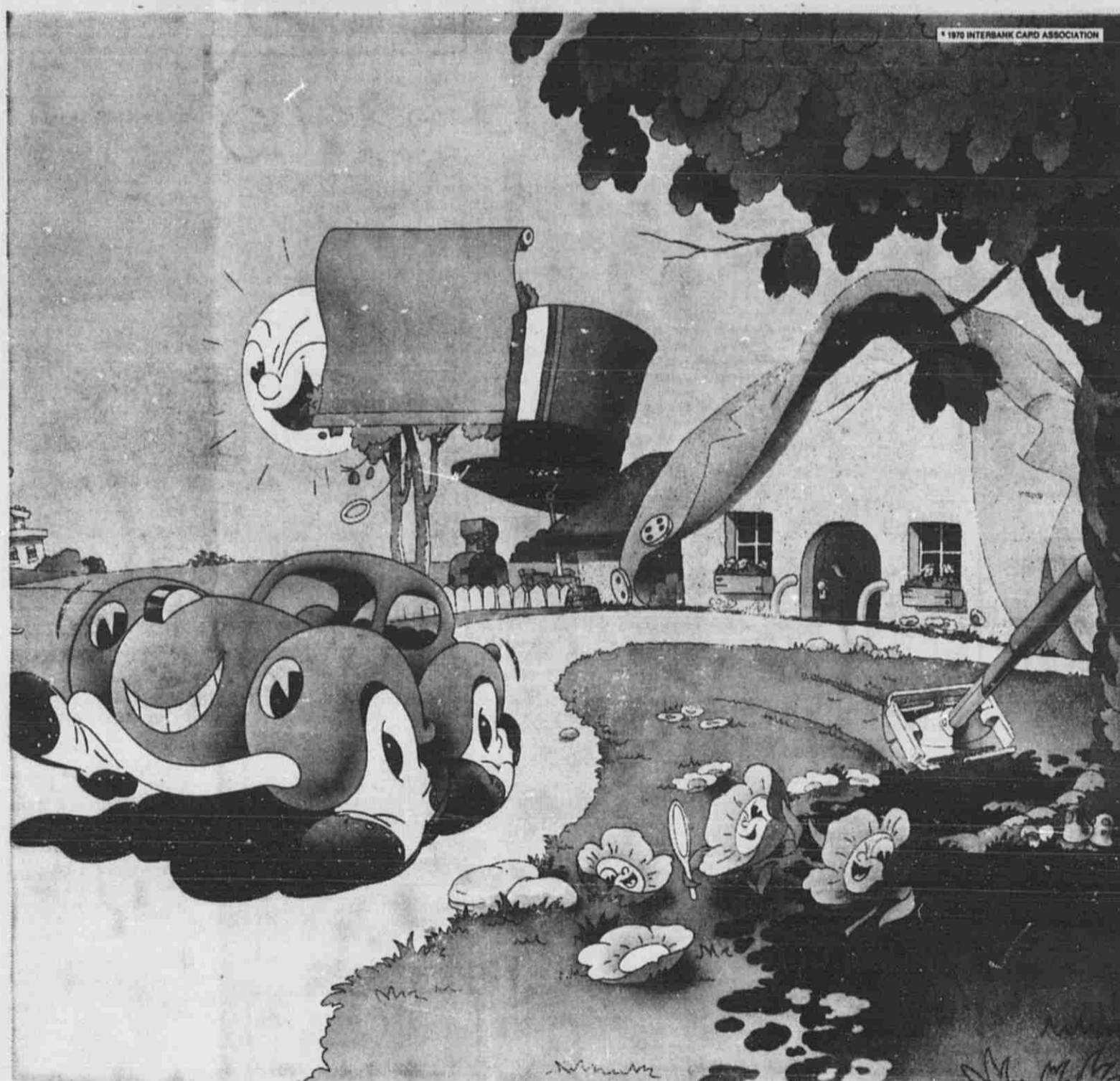
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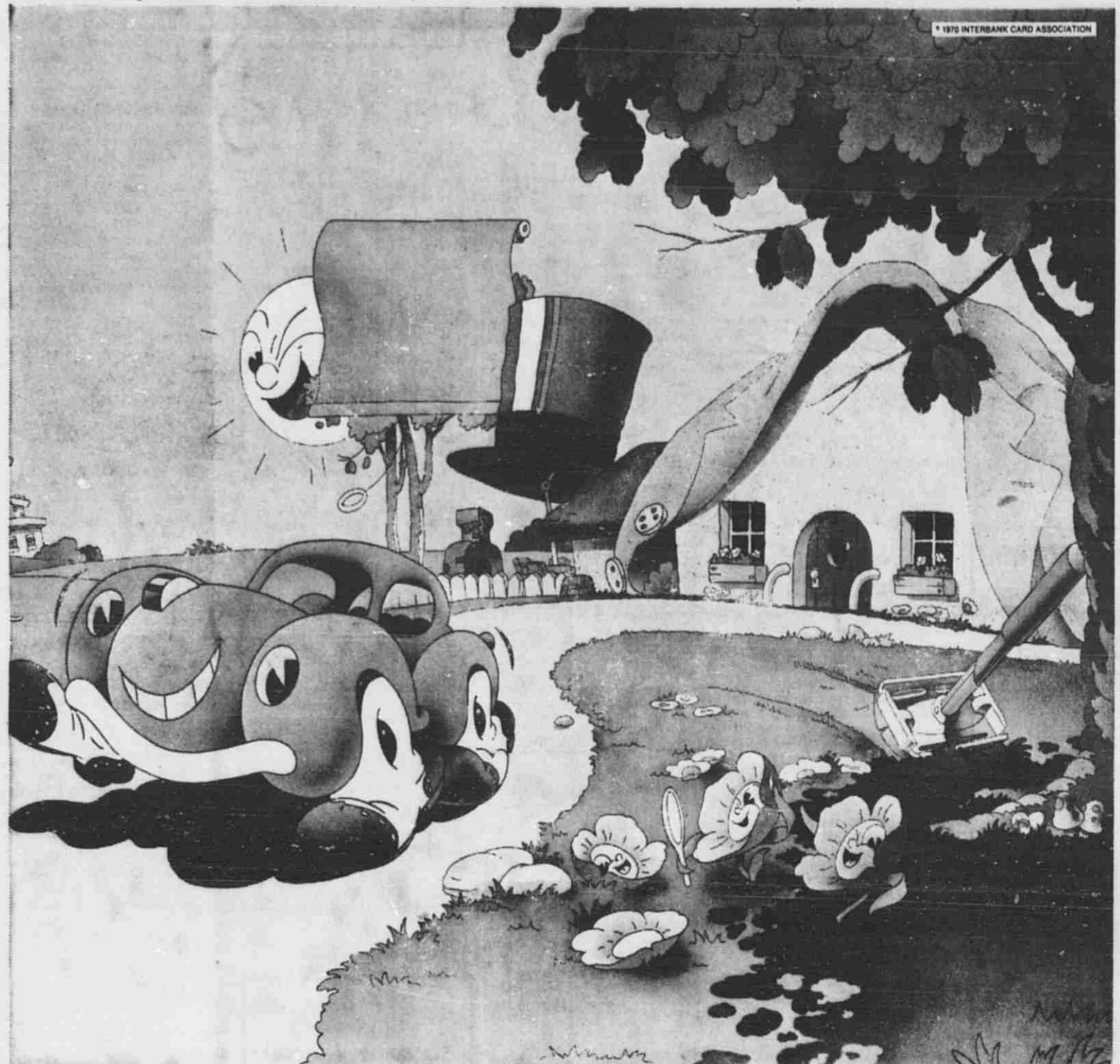
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
