Building Permits On the Rise in Cascade Twp.

The continuing growth of Cascade Township was reflected in the report of building inspector Stuart Bradley at the regular monthly meeting of the township board.

Building permits issued during the month of May totaled \$325,850 in valuation. According to Supervisor Al Heemstra, the township expects to surpass the \$2,000,000 mark in new construction for the year by the month of June.

Due to the press of business, Ron Reitsma, a former electrical inspector, tendered his resignation. The appointment of David J. VerMuelen to the office by the board was a move to coordinate increasing growth problems.

"Internal considerations regarding utilities extensions, township takeover of the Cascade Dam, air, water and land pollution and improved enforcement of the zoning ordinances require the cooperation of all divisions," said Heemstra.

The terms of three members of the Planning Commission having expired, Heemstra requested the board to reappoint Donnal Palmer and to appoint Ronald J. Cole and Jack R. Lyons.

Palmer had been appointed in 1967 to replace Everett Thompson. The others will begin three year terms being vacated by Richard Seppanen and Robert Martin.

Cascade and Lowell Townships will join in a petition to the Kent County Drain Commission to hold a public hearing on the question of the McCords Drain.

The drain, which serves both townships, and requires a special assessment district be formed for its improvement. It was first established in 1927.

Mobile home action on the current ordinance as recommended by the township attorney will bring it more closely into line with the master zoning ordinance.

Mr. and Mrs. Julius Boersma have received word that their son, Sgt. James Boersma, is on his way to Peru aboard the ship U.S.S. Guam.

He called home that his ship passed through the Panama Canal last week with medical supplies destined for survivors of recent earthquakes in Peru.

He said his was one of the first ships ordered by President Nixon for the relief mission.

Sgt. Boersma, who was promoted only last week, was on a training exercise in the Caribbean when orders to Peru were issued. He recently returned from Vietnam.

The glint of sun touching a glass fragment in an Indiana field plus the inquisitive and persistent personality of Dr. Ruth Herrick of Lowell culminated in her becoming an internationally-known authority on pattern glass.

Her book, "Greentown Glass," in the short time since publication has become a handbook for antique dealers and glass collectors throughout the United States and Canada.

It deals specifically with a type of pattern glass manufactured in Greentown, Indiana, around the turn of the century," Dr. Herrick related with her customary enthusiasm.

"Pattern glass," she says "was widely produced in the Midwest at this time. It is made by pouring liquid glass into molds... pressed instead of blown. Almost all glass sold today is made in this manner."

A chance visit to Greentown in 1949 sparked Dr. Herrick's interest in the glass. She found that the factory where the glass had been manufactured had disappeared... totally destroyed in a fire in 1903. Never rebuilt, there were almost no traces in Greentown, about the size of Lowell, that this industry had ever existed.

She asked many questions about town and finally an old man directed her to the factory dumping ground. A glass fragment large enough to show its beautiful pattern,

The decision of two Alto residents to vote in favor of a controversial 1.5 mill levy for the Lowell Area Schools caused the measure to pass, 365-358, in Monday's voting.

Voters in Precinct 1 (Lowell) voted down the request 465 against to 454 for. But the tally in precinct 2 (Alto) 89 against and 98 for passed the measure for the district.

For the first time, voters in both precincts used voting machines. When members of the Board of Education meeting at Lowell High School heard the results, an audible sigh of relief went up.

The board had been keeping its collective fingers crossed, hoping for voter approval of the measure, which will provide about \$90,000 in the next two years to be used for building and site acquisition.

The proposal on the ballot after the board heard a report last month that the school district's growth is greater than anticipated and that the situation was not likely to change soon.

Voter approval paves the way for purchase of land now owned by St. Mary's School in Lowell—subject to agreement of officials of the Diocese of Grand Rapids.

caught her eye and she knew she had come upon a collector's paradise.

It became her custom to dig in this dumping ground as often as she could find the time, often four or five times each summer. While nothing but fragments were found, she was able to authenticate collectors pieces by using them. She has since made a large collection of Greentown glass of her own and these pieces plus the fragments provided the foundation for her book.

The book is completely her own creation containing her enthusiasm, her research and writing—even her own photography!

Dr. Herrick chuckled as she recalled how startled she was to find her own name in the various antique magazine advertisements. Finally she realized they were using her book as a guideline for buying and selling glass and she was able to see the true fruit of the time and labor which went into the book.

But glass represents only one of her many interests. For years Dr. Herrick studied the habits and culture of the Michigan Indian tribes and gave lectures about them for schools and clubs. She is also an authority on pioneer life in Michigan.

When it became evident to the good doctor that her collections were threatening to engulf her home, she decided to build her own museum. A short distance

Wingeier has two sons who are graduates of Western Michigan University and a daughter who is enrolled at Illinois State and a son who attends Lowell Junior High.

Lowell residents voted against the 1.5 millage request 358-365 and the results of the two precincts (Lowell and Alto) were 456 in favor; 454 against.

The board approved the purchase of a new 60-inch lawn mower snow-removal tractor valued at \$2,275. It also passed on to its insurance committee four bids on premiums for workman's compensation insurance for the coming fiscal year. Dale Johnson, of the Farm Bureau Insurance Group, submitted the lowest bid (\$4,252.18).

It received the formal resignation of basketball coach Jack Kempker and adjourned when it went into executive session at 8:45 p.m. to certify voting returns.



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


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George Lane Retires After 10 Years with Schools



THE ORDINANCE AMENDING THE MOBILE HOME PARK ORDINANCE FOR THE TOWNSHIP OF CASCADE

An ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to Provide for the Orderly Development of Mobile Home Parks Within the Boundaries of Cascade Township."

That an ordinance entitled as aforesaid be amended by amending Section 3 of said ordinance by deleting therefrom subsection (g).

That an ordinance entitled as aforesaid be amended by amending Section 4 of said ordinance by inserting a new paragraph to be known as Section 4 (4) and which shall read as follows:

"(4) An applicant who desires to satisfy the purpose for any unit regulation of this Section 4 through alternative design or construction methods may request the Township Planning Commission for a special exception. The Township Planning Commission may without proof that the application of the unit regulation of this Section 4 results in practical difficulties or is unfair (as required by Section 22), but after a public hearing, approve special exceptions from the requirements of the Section 4 (4) if the Township Planning Commission finds from the evidence presented that applicant will substantially satisfy the purpose for the unit regulation for which the special exception is requested by some substitute or alternative method, which method will not materially impair the intent or purposes of this Ordinance or the public interest. Such approval shall be submitted to the Township Board which may accept, modify or reject the special exception so approved."

That an ordinance entitled as aforesaid be amended by amending Section 22 of said ordinance to read as follows:

"SECTION 22. VARIANCES INVOLVING PRACTICAL DIFFICULTIES. In the event of the application of any provision of this Ordinance shall result in practical difficulties or be unfair as applied to a particular development plan, the same may be applied to the Township Planning Commission. The Township Planning Commission shall hold a public hearing on such appeal and if it determines that relief from one or more of the requirements of this Ordinance is justified and will not endanger the public health, welfare or safety of the Township, the Township Planning Commission may grant a variance and approve relief from said requirement or requirements and recommend the same to the Township Board which Board may then accept, modify or reject it. The fee for such special shall be that set by the Township Board from time to time."

That an ordinance entitled as aforesaid be amended by adding a new Section 25 of said ordinance which shall read as follows:

SECTION 25. DUTY OF TOWNSHIP BOARD IN CASES INVOLVING SPECIAL EXCEPTIONS UNDER SECTION 4 (4) OR VARIANCES UNDER SECTION 22. If the Township Board, after the effective date of this Ordinance, accepts or accredits with modifications any approval, finding or recommendation heretofore or hereafter made by the Planning Commission for a special exception or variance, the Township Board shall, after an examination of the application, the development plan and the hearing the site and any objections thereto, determine whether the Township Board finds that a proper basis exists in fact for granting a special exception, pursuant to Section 4 (4), or a variance pursuant to Section 22 of this Ordinance.

That an ordinance entitled as aforesaid be amended by amending Section 25 of said ordinance by changing the number of said Section to 26.
