## New Homes Pop Up Along Ada Drive

Sprouting quickly just off Ada Drive are 19 homes on both sides of Cedar Point Ave. They will be occupied in less than 70 days.

Building Inspector Herm Stuuikie of Ada Township was started last week when a representative of Eastbrook Builders appeared in his office and requested 19 permits. Building hasn't been that plentiful lately.

However, all of the homes have already been sold.

According to Sam Sterk of the building firm, the houses have been purchased under the Federal Housing Authority Rule 235. They will be 25' x 44', eight with four bedrooms and the balance with three bedrooms.

Each home will have gas-forced air heat, a well, a septic tank, underground telephone cable and the black dirt for the lawn furnished.

A few of the homes will have an outside door to a lower elevation. All are expected to be valued at approximately \$22,000.

## Ada Citizen's Pollution Complaint Brings Call for Parley by Amway

The Amway Corp. has scheduled a meeting with Ada residents on June 30 to discuss present and future plans to alleviate odors from 3 of the firm's waste treatment ponds.

Alleged air and water pollution from the ponds and noise caused by the machinery used to aerate them was the subject of a complaint to the Ada Township Board last Wednesday.

The complaint was filed with the board by Chris DeVries of Ada who said he was writing for himself and several neighbors.

His letter told of chemical odors that floated over homes, possible defoliation of trees and spoke of possible pollution of the Grand River by Amway.

"Amway is no longer a good neighbor," he wrote. "They care very little about what is happening to the environment—as long as it is profitable to them."

His letter asked the township to call in the state Department of Water Resources. Supervisor Fred Clancy was directed by the board to check the complaints with the Kent County and the State.

Clancy noted that the firm had spent nearly \$100,000 in the last 14 months and that Amway has indicated that it will spend another \$600,000 more to correct the situation.

He said that township and Amway officials were discussing plans to connect the township and the firm's sewage disposal systems but board members objected that the township system could not handle industrial sewage.

"For a time last summer and this spring," he said, while sludge at the bottom of each pond is disturbed by the turbulence caused by the release of oxygen under pressure, a strong odor has occurred. We expect that very soon now the ponds should return to a condition where odors are unnoticeable."

The spokesman made no mention of noise from the aerating pumps DeVries complained about in his letter, but said that the ponds do not empty waste water into the river except at a time designated by the WRC when excess water from the final treatment pond is released.

"Contrary to some of the Ada residents' feelings, the spokesman said, "Amway is most concerned about the problem of properly taking care of wastes. At this time, Amway is planning to invest more than \$650,000 in a completely new, three-stage waste treatment system to be built in accordance with the latest governmental regulations. Amway's processing methods do not create any large amount of industrial waste so this plant should be adequate for many years."

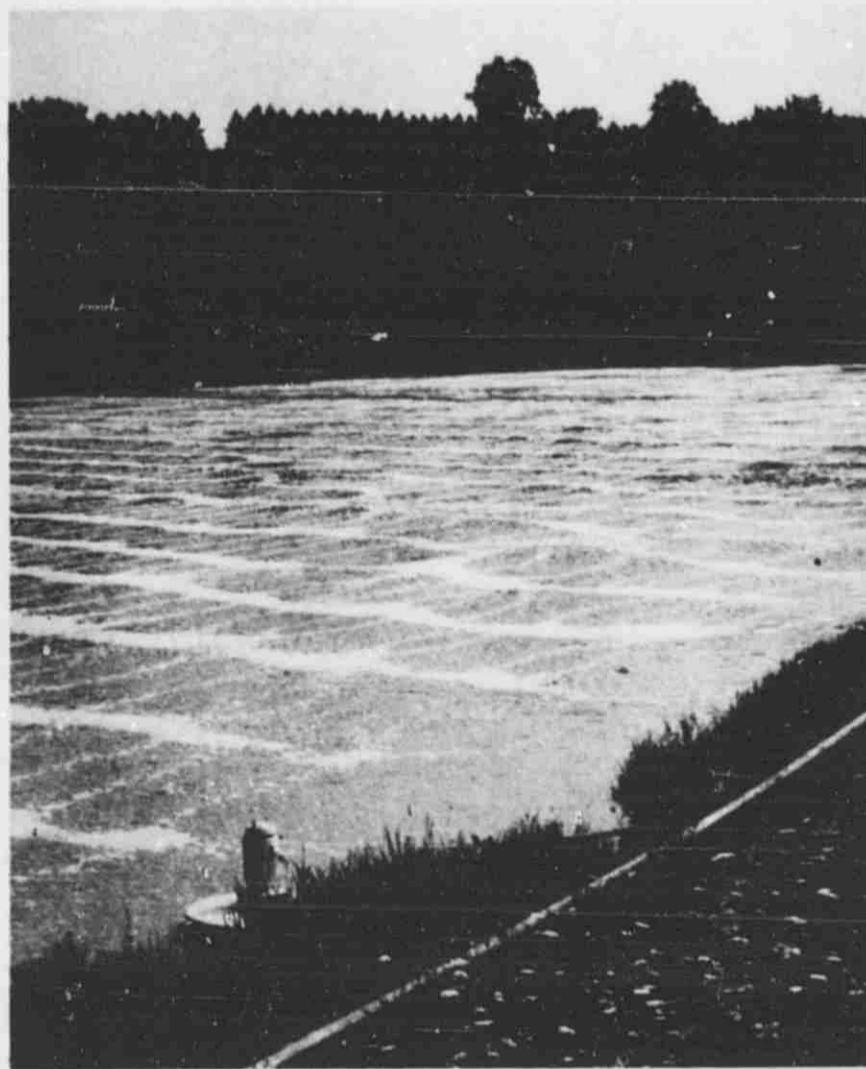
Amway said all interested area residents were invited to attend the meeting at its executive offices on Tuesday, June 30, at 7 p.m.

An Amway spokesman told the Ledger that the present disposal system was approved by the state Water Resources Commission in 1965 and that several modifications aimed at eliminating odors have been made since.

Among them, the introduction of chemicals to speed up bacterial decomposition and the installation of aeration pumps and an extended aeration grid system under the surface of the lagoons.

In other Ada Township news, Fire Chief Stan Osmolinski reported that the department has purchased more than \$800 worth of fireworks from Nationwide Fireworks Co. of Saginaw. He said that the Ottawa Fireworks Co. of Marne, which has supplied Fourth of July fireworks for the past several years, went out of business this year.

Funds for the fireworks were provided from the annual auction which raised nearly \$1,000. The department will stage a 45-minute fireworks show, one of the biggest in this part of the country, and will climax holiday activities in the Township.

## Lights Blink When Lowell Power Fails

Storm damage in the state caused a few brief power failures in Lowell last Friday.

John Jones of the Lowell Power Company said the blackout affected only part of the city and lasted only a few minutes.

At the time of the failures, the Lowell power system was buying electricity from Wolverine Power Company, a power pool which supplies power to the state's electrical co-ops and to several municipal power companies.

When lightning knocked out one of the Wolverine's transmission lines, power was suspended to Lowell. It took about five minutes for turbines in Lowell to begin producing electricity to meet the city's local power needs.

Jones said it was the first power failure in Lowell since an ice storm last winter.

## Sick Leave, Vacation for City Workers

Improved benefits for city employees were approved by the Lowell City Council Monday night. Under an amendment to a section of the City Charter, employees will earn up to three week's vacation and those with more than six month's service will be eligible for sick leave.

Full time employees with one year's service will receive one week of paid vacation; two year's service, two week's vacation; 10 year's service, three week's vacation.

After six months any full time city employee will be eligible for up to 60 days sick leave, depending on the number of year's of employment. The new benefits take effect July 1.

In other action, the council authorized the hiring of two men to assist in cleaning sanitary and storm sewers in the city through the summer months. It also passed a resolution to establish a municipal park fund.

Mayor Harold Jefferies and the Board acted on appointments to fill vacancies on several city boards and commissions.

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### National Resource Dept. Sets Murray Lake Talks

Residents of the Murray Lake area north of Lowell have been invited to take part in a public discussion of fish management problems to be held at St. Patrick's School at Parnell Friday (June 19th) at 8:30 p.m.

Tests conducted by the State Department of Natural Resources on the lake will provide a basis for the discussion. According to John Trimmerger, district fish biologist for the department, 12 test nets and a shocking survey showed bluegills both stunted and of good size, plus some stunted perch and few pike.

Possibilities to be discussed with property owners and other fishermen are partial chemical treatment to reduce panfish populations or a pike spawning-marsh to increase panfish control by predation.

A program of chemical treatment, conducted over the past several years on the north end of nearby Big Crooked Lake, has been successful in general in increasing the size of the fish according to local fishermen.

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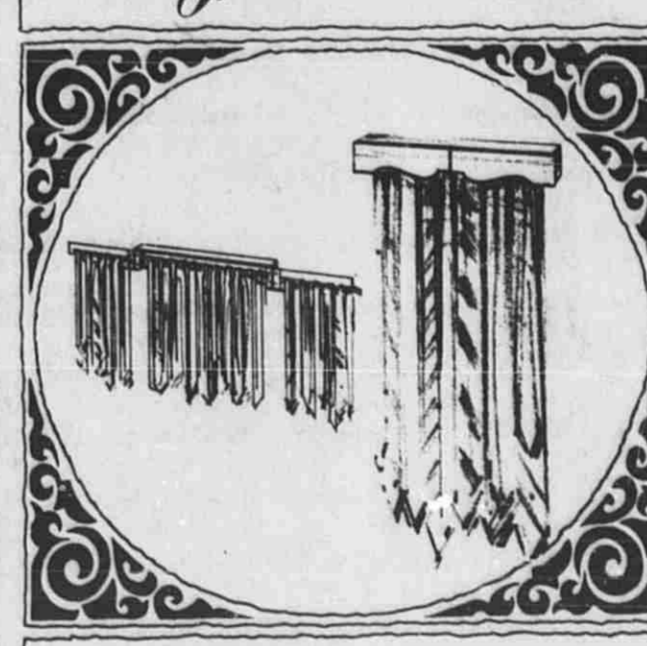

# AN OPEN LETTER TO ALL CASCADE TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS

On June 10, 1970, a letter was mailed to certain areas of Cascade Township, to the exclusion of certain other areas. The letter refers to a pending application for rezoning of a portion of Section 17 to permit the development of a mobilehome park. The letter is vague in particulars and misleading. We offer the following statement of facts in a sincere effort to inform all the concerned residents of Cascade Township.

For the past several years, the Cascade Township Planning Commission has had before it several applications in one form or another to rezone a portion of Section 17 to permit the development of a Mobilehome Park. Entrance to the property is at approximately 6200 28th Street and is legally described as:

East 1/2, east 1/2, northeast 1/4, Section 17, Town 6 north, Range 10 West except the north 1,000 feet and the south 300 feet of the east 345 feet and the west 1/2, east 1/2, northeast 1/4, of said Section 17 except the north 750 feet of the east 200 feet and except the north 400 feet of the east 393 feet of the west 459 feet, all in Cascade Township, Kent County, Michigan.

The preliminary design of the proposed development is as shown herewith. The pending application is the only substantive request on record.

On several occasions, applications concerning the subject parcel were denied. In each instance, the Planning Commission processed these applications according to State law and withheld their approval on the basis they were improper as to form, lacked sufficient data or failed to conform to the major aspects of the guidelines set down in ordinance by the township. The Township Board concurred in these several denials.

The current application by Garner Corporation, in conjunction with the Foremost Insurance Company, has demonstrated to the satisfaction of a majority of the Planning Commission and the Township Board that the proposal as now submitted is proper as to content, is realistic in concept and in accord with all the fundamental objectives of the ordinance provisions. The application has received the approval of the Kent County Planning Coordinating Committee. In many respects it exceeds the highest

standards which the Township Planning Commission itself established prior to the filing of the pending application.

At present, in close consultation with the Township Attorney, portions of the Mobilehome Park Ordinance and the related sections of the Township Zoning Ordinance are being modified. The primary purpose in making these changes is to strengthen the enforcement of the present ordinances and to adjust upward the already high standards the Township desires to maintain.

Contrary to the June 10th letter, which stated this is being done "apparently for the convenience of the developer", these changes are made possible because of the willingness and desire of the applicants to develop a far more modern and luxurious park than State law requires and above that which the Planning Commission itself had hoped to achieve.

After several years of study of all aspect of mobilehome park operations, including the radical change such housing has undergone in recent years (the need for housing the elderly, etc.), the Planning Commission, in 1969, prepared and the Township adopted an excellent ordinance to regulate the orderly development of such land use in Cascade Township.

In contrast to some who now erroneously suggest that they were told "over and over again, that Cascade Township MUST have a trailer park", it is better said that on several occasions the conclusion has been reached, with advice of counsel, that Cascade Township cannot upon a review of Michigan Case Law exclude this type of housing.

In the letter which came to only certain residents of the community, dated June 10th, it was claimed by the writers that several features of the Township Ordinances are minimal in their requirements, although they neither specify which they are nor do they offer any suggestions for change. Fact is, the ordinances of Cascade Township, in combining the best parts of those of other municipalities, go far beyond most. Township ordinances are carefully and realistically drawn in recognition of the confinements and limitations of the authority of government to restrain.

Given sufficient opportunity at any time, the Township Board, without recourse to vague dialogue, is willing to openly discuss every aspect of the matter to this date; it cordially welcomes the questions of any resident as to the reasoning which led to the "straw vote" which the Board conducted in order to treat the applicant fairly and that all might know the Board's position at this time, particularly the several objectors.

As laymen, and without wishing to appear as legal experts on this question, we make the following observations bearing on the pending Mobilehome Park application.

Some years prior to the Garner application, the Township Board and the Planning Commission sought legal counsel on the entire question of mobilehomes. Not only was it concerned with licensed parks as such. The Board requested advice on regulating the use of mobilehomes on private acreage. On the latter point, the Board was astonished to learn of the apparent limitations there existed in the absence of a licensed park within the township's boundaries.

There is at hand a copy of an opinion prepared by the legal counsel which serves the Michigan Townships Association. The opinion, dated September 15, 1969, was given to a neighboring township concerning the legality of regulations of mobilehomes.

A lengthy review of the several Public Acts concerned was made. On the specific question of the situation wherein the township has no areas zoned for mobilehome parks, the opinion stated that "this would make the township vulnerable to a mobilehome developer who wished to locate a park within the township and had a logical and reasonable area within which to develop the same". The opinion further stated that "in such latter situation, the Circuit Court might well order the township to grant a permit for the development of such a mobilehome park."

As to denying any and all applications for a mobilehome development - and for the subject parcel in particular - it being relatively undeveloped open land, the Planning Commission and the Township Board concluded the Court in all likelihood would require issuances of permits even if the permit would be in contradiction to the Zoning Ordinance. The Township Board states that it is aware of the fact the Court (Circuit Court of

Kent County) in a fairly recent ruling established that a Mobilehome Park development is residential in nature and in fact; the Board is aware and invites a close review of Act 243 of the Public Acts of 1959, State of Michigan.

It is public knowledge that the Supreme Court of Michigan in 1956 compelled the issuance of a permit for a mobilehome park in Plymouth Township when the record disclosed the exclusion of mobilehome parks from the township. The Court rejected the township's argument that the exclusion bore a reasonable relationship to public health, safety, morals or general welfare.

For a long time the Planning Commission and the Township Board has been aware of the Warren Charter Township Court decision, in which the facts disclosed that even though the township amended its ordinances to provide a mobilehome classification, the township continued to resist all efforts to establish a mobilehome park. The Court held the township to be arbitrary and capricious in its refusal to approve such requests and was hiding behind a facade of an ordinance designed to conceal their purpose.

There is much information at hand concerning mobilehome parks and their operation. We urge all interested residents to acquaint themselves with such material as:

- The Macomb County Planning Commission study of Mobilehome Parks;
- The Fact Sheet on Mobilehome living developed by the Metropolitan Community Research Fellowship - University of Michigan - 1968;
- The letter written by Mayor Gerald N. Donovan of the City of Sterling Heights, Michigan, dated June 10, 1969;
- The Fact Sheets prepared by the Mobilehome Manufacturers' Association, dated June, 1969
- The Study Report of the Kent County Bureau of Equalization, dated March 9, 1970.

In particular, we call attention to the response received by our Planning Commission in reply to their inquiry to Professor C. M. Edwards, Family Housing Specialist at Michigan State University, dated April 28, 1970. Mr. Edwards gave a thorough

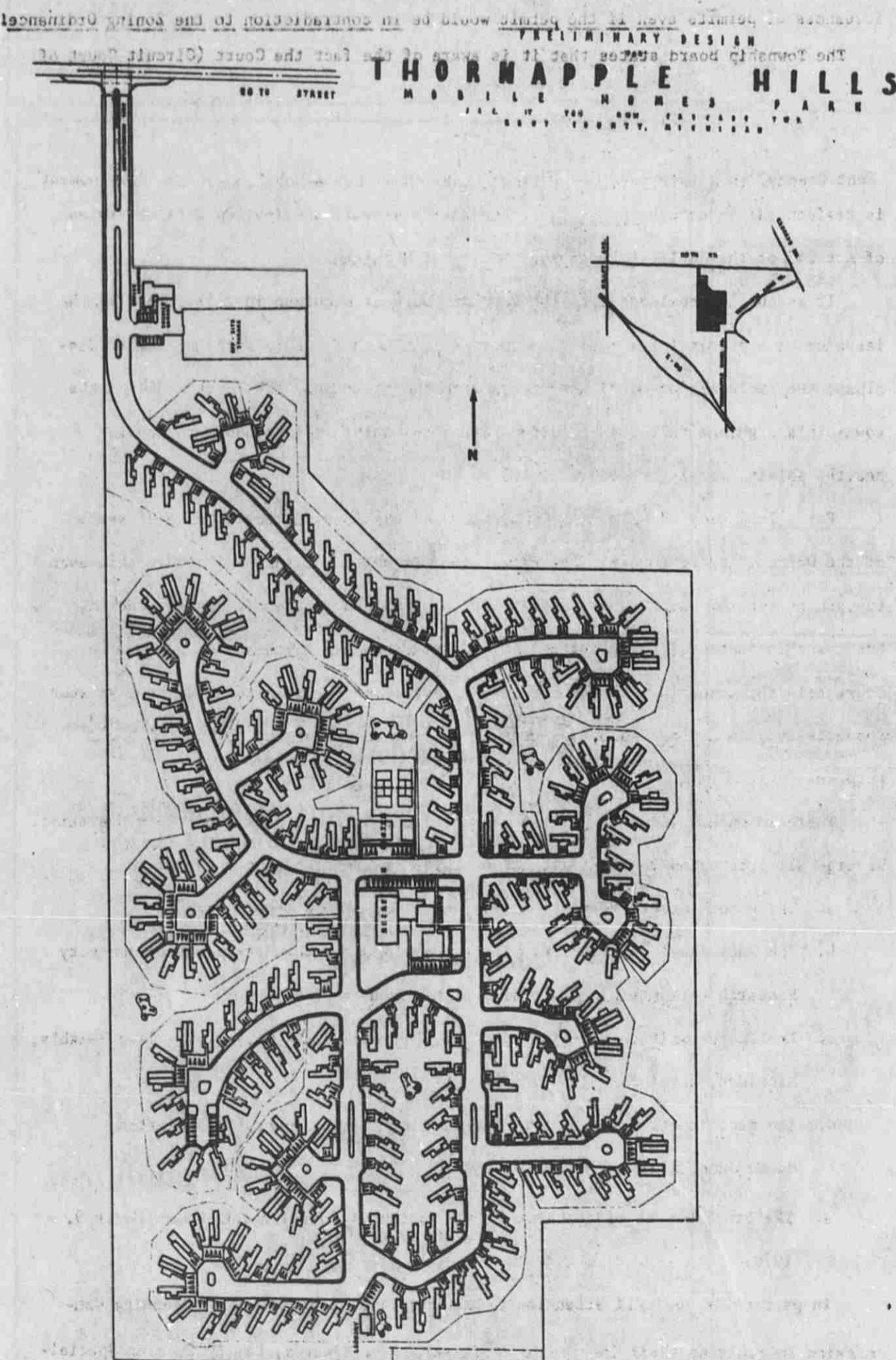
review to all aspects of the pending application and he was fully complimentary. His letter concludes as follows:

"I have viewed the plans for the development proposed by the Foremost Insurance Company, and I regard it as an exceptionally fine and outstanding design, which will not only be a credit to the township in which it is located, but it will serve as a model for the state of Michigan, which is one of the fastest growing and developing states in the use of mobilehomes. I am frequently called upon to make presentations to prospective developers and local officials, as well as planners in states joining Michigan and far removed from Michigan also. The old image of the trailer park is a handicap to developers getting acceptance for the new site development for mobilehomes. People tend to look at the old developments and fail to realize that new designs and developments are going to be quite a different place for people to live than the old mobilehome parks. This development proposed by Foremost will serve as a model which will be copied in neighboring states."

The Cascade Township Planning Commission and the Cascade Township Board in their long and deliberate proceedings on the pending application have on three separate occasions held open public hearings on the land use request of Garner Corporation to permit the construction of the Thornapple Hills Mobilehome Park. The conclusion is reached no further delay in rendering a response to the applicant is justified and that the best interests of the Township will be served by favorable action to grant the permit. The Township Board believes it has acted in the interest of proper development of our community.

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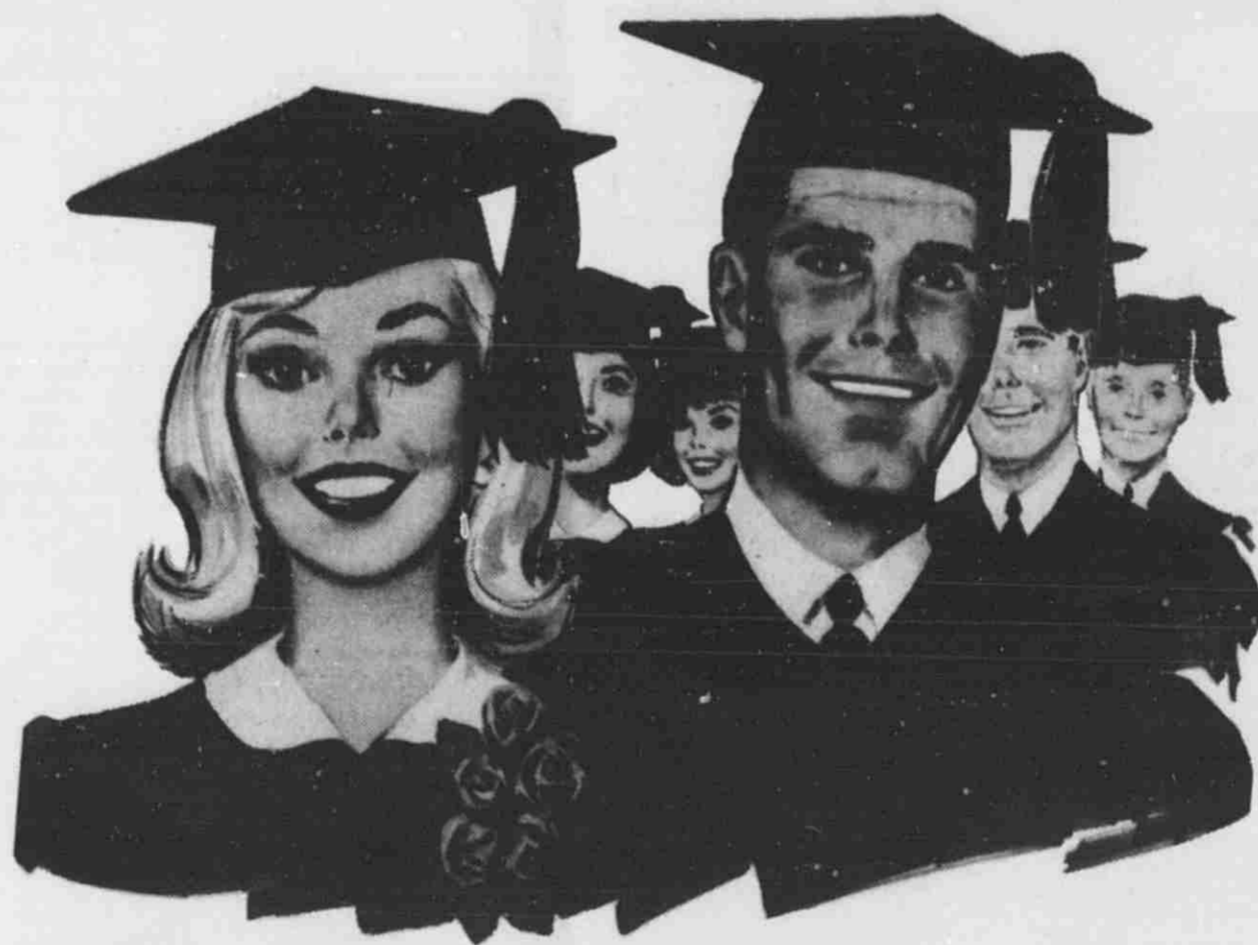
