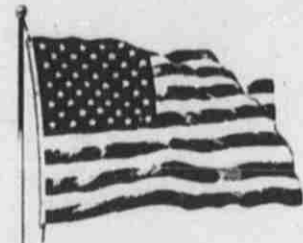

Does another youngster really have to lose a hand to some "harmless" fireworks? Do we really need another drowning? Is it really necessary for another family to be wiped out this weekend on the highway?

An Editorial

Policemen and people who work in hospital emergency rooms have come to regard July 4th as "a very busy weekend in the middle of a very warm summer." Does it really have to be that way?

INDEPENDENCE DAY has got to be something more than a relaxing break in a routine workweek.

And this year, you can make it more than just another holiday by trying two things.

You can ponder your country as it goes into its 196th year. Its beginnings. Its problems. Its promises.

And you can live. A lot of people who don't make a definite effort to this weekend, won't.

Those two things will make this July 4th worth remembering.

Okay, Fellas, Quit Stalling

I don't know about the rest of you, but it's my opinion that the time has come to let our peers in Washington and Lansing know that things had better change for the better—and fast.

What gets me is that our people in the legislative halls are inclined to point the finger of blame at "the other guy" when certain pieces of legislation fail to win approval.

The other guy, of course, refers to the opposition party.

It's a shame to see so much wasted effort that goes with the stop-and-go-tactics of the legislators.

I WONDER how many "tentative budgets" have been written by school administrators over the past eight months while they awaited (and still await) the outcome of the school aid bill for 1970-71.

The taxpayers are entitled to fulltime use of their school administrators' time and talents . . . yet they wind up with less than that because so little can be done until Lansing gives the final school aid figure.

The school situation in Michigan is just one example of such wastefulness. The bureaucracy that is Washington is loaded with similar situations . . . and the encroachment on the tax dollar by bureaucrats in Lansing is only slightly less repugnant to The Smythy.

You're probably saying to yourself, "Boy, that guy sure got out of the wrong side of bed this morning." And you may be right.

WHAT BRINGS ABOUT a lot of this resentment is the fact that Richard The Lion Hearted pledged, before taking over the top seat in Washington, that he and his administration would bring about a halt to inflation and its attendant difficulties.

So what happens? Things are getting progressively tougher . . . while his economic advisers simply throw up their hands and mutter something to the effect that times will get worse before they get better. The Smythy doesn't need somebody in



Washington to tell him that! All I have to do is look at the grocery bill . . . the electric bill . . . the milk bill . . . the clothing bill . . . and a few assorted other bills.

What is sorely-needed right now is leadership capable of facing up to the most pressing issues. These leaders should forget all the penny-ante nonsense that has dominated their thinking of late and get down to the basics.

In this election year, it's something to think about long and seriously.

A 23-year-old fisherman drowned in the Flat River just north of the Burroughs Road Bridge in Vergennes Township.

He is Neolin Craig, 610 College, S.E., Grand Rapids.

Kent County Sheriff Deputy William Dice said Craig apparently lost his balance and fell into about 15 feet of water east of Lincoln Lake Road.

A friend, Joseph Williams of Flint, who was fishing not far from Craig, made an effort to reach him, but failed.

Mrs. Trenton Geldersma, who was working with her husband in their garden near the scene of the accident, at 12885 Burroughs Road, called Lowell Police.

Using the city's new recovery boat, Deputy Dice, Police Chief Barry Emmons, Sgt. James Hudson, Arthur Farley and Al Eckman of the Lowell Police Department spent more than an hour dragging the area before they located Craig's body.

3,051 of Us - Now, Lowell's Just Cozy

The population of the City of Lowell has increased by 506 people in the last 10 years. The preliminary figure was released to the Ledger-Suburban Life by the Department of Commerce field office in Detroit this week.

In 1960, the Bureau of the Census counted 2,545 people in the city and this year's figure is 3,051.

The final tabulation and census counts for Alto, Ada and Cascade townships will be released in the fall.

TB Society Lists Breathing Hazards

Summer time is a good time to protect plants from insects, paint the house or refinish a piece of furniture. A helpful item for these tasks, and many others, is the aerosol spray can. They can be found in almost any home and most everything is packaged in them.

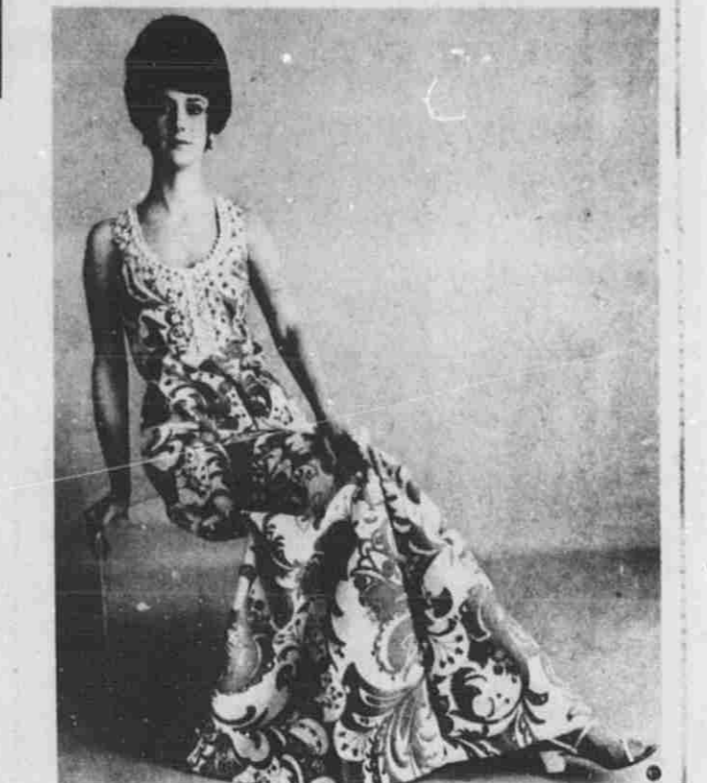
Too often they are used and stored improperly and they can then become a potentially dangerous breathing hazard.

Your TB, Health & Emphysema Society would like you to remember these tips. Before using the handy, time-saving spray can, read the directions. Use them only in well ventilated areas. Hold the can away from you and pointed in a direction away from people. When you are finished spraying, replace the top and store the spray can in a cool place, well out of the reach of children.

Mr. Kenneth Duncan, Assistant Director of the Society said, "Parents should be reminded that children who play with aerosol spray cans may be only a breath away from serious damage to their health."

"Children are bound to be curious," Mr. Duncan said. "Parents should be extra careful to remove items which are potentially dangerous breathing hazards." "In addition to aerosol spray cans," Mr. Duncan went on, "Other dangerous items include plastic bags and plastic wrap that can suffocate an unsuspecting child in an instant."

"We feel compelled," Mr. Duncan said, "to warn the Kent County citizens about the possible respiratory damage that can be caused by careless use and storage of aerosol spray cans and plastic bags and wrap."

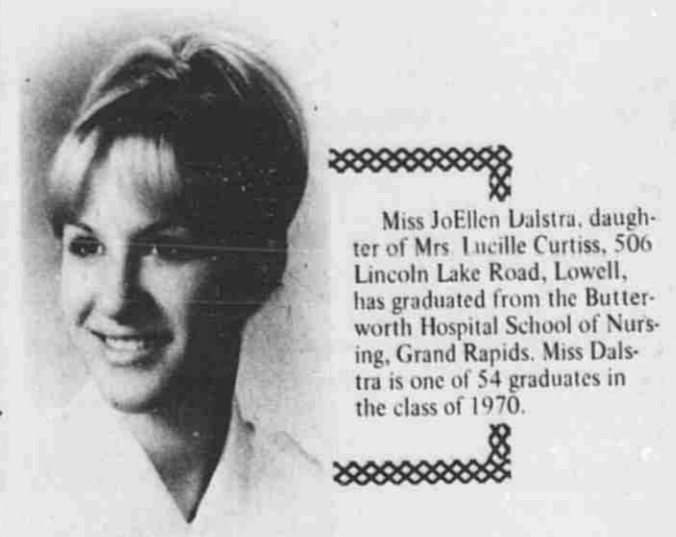


Members of the Lowell police force are shown cleaning up one of two newly acquired recovery boats.
