The Largest Diamond.

The English papers announce that a diamond weighing 288 carats has been found at the Cape of Good Hope. Its color is a bright yellow, and its shape is good, though a few slight scratches are noticed on the surface. What value experts will assign to the jewel still remains to be seen, and depends mainly on the manner in which it can be polished Its weight is greater than any known diamond. The great Russian diamond weighs only 193 and the Pitt only 136 carats.
