LEGISLATIVE.

The general acts for the incorporation of cities and villages are the product of much labor and time, though the Legislature itself spent comparatively little time on them.

Probably the expediency of these bills had much to do with the fact that there were fewer special acts of incorporation this session than usual.

A large number of cities and villages also had their charters revised, and Jackson received substantially a new charter.

The woman's suffrage amendment received an unexpectedly large vote in both Houses, but failed of the requisite two-thirds.

The northern counties of the Lower Peninsula acted generally as a unit and exercised great influence upon legislation.

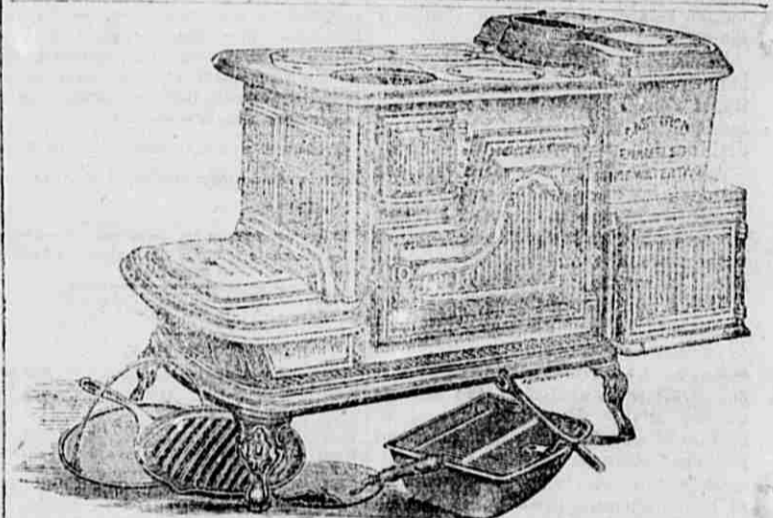

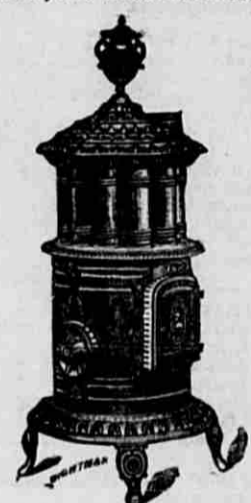
