How to drive the Hog.

It takes a man of experience, moral culture and more than ordinary ability to drive a hog successfully. The first thing you must do is to get behind the hog. The hog should, under no circumstances be permitted to get behind the driver. This would involve an extravagant loss of time, besides being extremely annoying to spectators, whose sympathies are always with the driver.

The immoral or profane man is not a proper person to drive a hog. He is liable to forget himself and speak unkindly before he gets through with the job. Never say "whoa" when driving a hog. If you do, ten to one that that hog will "right about," say through between your legs, and by the time that you are picking yourself up out of the mud, the porker will be under somebody's gate, trying to squeal the hinges off.

He (permit us to use the masculine gender) knows he has the best of his driver every time. A close observer of hog-nature can readily tell this from his great triumphant. You can never get hold of a hog's affection by getting hold of his tail. We saw this tried on Monroe street the other day, and were convinced that the driver made a mistake. He thought so too, when brushing the mud off his face and shirt front.

We started out to give some practical suggestions on the subject of driving hogs. We close by suggesting the only method we ever knew to prove successful. Sever his jugular vein; bathe him in a barrel of hot water until he can be shaved with a clam shell; open him longitudinally; place him in the bottom of a lumber wagon, and, if you have a good team, you can drive that peaky hog to the end of the earth, and he can't help himself.

RAILROAD.—A meeting of the directors of the Kalamazoo, Lowell and Northern Mich. Railroad was held in this village on Friday, the 9th inst., at which it was decided that the stockholders of the above named company should meet in joint convention, with the stockholders of the Rockford and Alpena R. R. Co., in the city of Grand Rapids, on the 17th of July next, for the purpose of effecting a consolidation of the two companies. A proposition to consolidate with the R. & A. Company, the specifications of which seem fair and unobjectionable, has been made by Mr. Shippard, President of that company, and following this, the directors of the K. L. & N. M. railroad company have thought best to give the same, due consideration, and submit it to the stockholders to be ratified by them in the convention above referred to. We understand that the directors of the K. L. & N. M. regard the proposition with favor, and think it will be a judicious move to accept it. In the meantime, remember that the assessments must be paid in promptly, as much time will be saved by having the money ready when wanted.

Section 1. The people of the State of Michigan enact, That section 2097 of the compiled laws of 1871 be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

(2097)Sec. 1. The people of the State of Michigan enact, That it shall not be lawful hereafter at any time to use with seines, trap-nets, pound-nets, or any species of continuous nets...

Provided, Nothing in this act shall be construed as prohibiting sole owners of fish ponds from fishing therein as they may think proper.

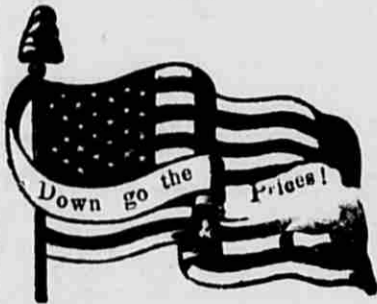
