Religion In The University. We have received from the author, S. B. McCracken of Detroit, a pamphlet containing a review of the above subject, as agitated before the Legislature at its last session.

Our readers will remember that a memorial was presented to the Legislature last winter, by Mr. McCracken, charging that the University was sectarian in its religious character and teachings. This memorial was presented to the Senate by Senator Emerson in compliance with the wish of Mr. McCracken, accompanied with the request that it be ordered printed in the Senate Journal.

Mr. McCracken, in his review says that "it was ordered printed in the Journal without objection and referred to the committee on the University." He says further, "that on the coming in of the Senate in the afternoon, those opposed to the object of the memorial, went to Senator Emerson and represented to him that there was some doubt as to whether it was ordered printed in the Journal or not and suggested that in order to relieve the doubt, he should make a motion that it be printed. He accordingly did so, and the motion was lost on a rising vote, eleven against ten."

Mr. McCracken makes a serious mistake in this giving his version of the reception and treatment of the memorial. It was presented by Senator Emerson with the request that it be ordered printed, as Mr. McCracken says, but we distinctly remember that it was received, read and referred to the committee on the University, but not ordered printed.

To assure Mr. McCracken that we are correct we will say that just before the opening of the afternoon session of that day, Lieut. Gov. Holt, President of the Senate, asked us [Ass't. Sec'y.] if we understood that the memorial presented that morning, was ordered printed in the journal.

We replied that we did not order it printed and did not desire at any time, to take the responsibility of putting upon the journal any document of such important and unusual character, without the action of the Senate.

These may not be precisely the words he spoke, but they express just what he said. Some Senators perhaps thought the memorial was ordered printed by the President, but most of them knew that the contrary was true, and a vote taken in the afternoon to determine whether it should be printed or not, was lost.

Certainly Mr. McCracken must see his mistake. If the President had ordered the memorial printed, the subsequent action of the Senate would have ignored the decision of the President entirely, or been equivalent to an appeal from his decision. This was certainly not the case, for the vote was taken directly on a motion that the memorial be ordered printed; the action of the Senate thus showing clearly how the question was understood.

For Mr. McCracken to insist and publicly announce that his memorial was ordered printed by the President and that the Senate subsequently ignored his decision by taking action on the question, is certainly an unjust reflection (unintentional, we trust) upon the worthy presiding officer, as well as the members of that body.

We have not space this week, for further review of the "review." We think, however, we shall notice it more fully in some future issue, not because of the memorialist's peculiar religious tenets, but because we think his representations concerning the action of the Senate University committee, unfair.

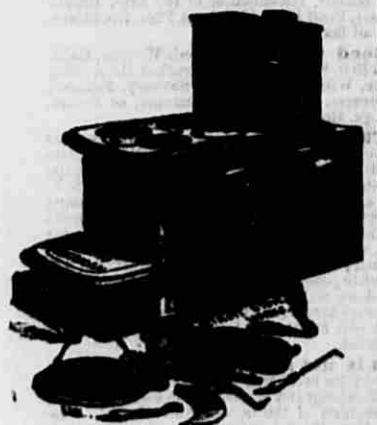

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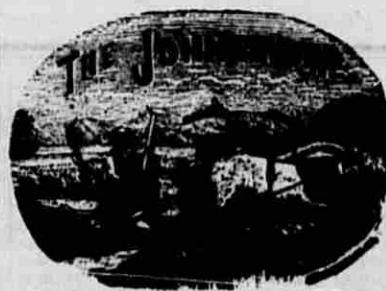
