CORRESPONDENCE.

BOULDER, COLORADO, June 30th 1873.

FRIEND HINE—I have been suffering for the past week with what all pilgrims to this country usually do, or I should sooner have made good my promise to write you what I have seen and heard since leaving Michigan.

Nothing in the way of novelty attracts the attention of the traveler reared in the States until he reaches a point about three hundred miles west of Omaha.

Population, which at one time contained a population of 6,500, with three daily newspapers, banks, theatres, etc. now consists of four or five miserable little shanties.

Cheyenne is a place of considerable importance in a business point of view, but it is built for present use, slight and unsubstantial.

Denver, the capital of the Territory, is handsomely situated on a gently rolling plain, well laid out, and abounds with imposing business blocks and churches.

Another big lot of wool was also recently sold by Hon. A. S. Stannard. This was a 2,000 lb. batch and brought 42 cents.

The distance from Floyd's Hill to Georgetown is made by stage, at twenty-five cents per mile.

This village is about the size of Lowell, 8,700 feet above the sea, and is surrounded by lofty peaks.

The law prohibiting the carrying of concealed weapons is evaded, and every other man you meet has a huge Colt or Navy dangling at his hip.

One occurred the first night I was there, but "only one man shot" was considered a slight affair.

The Vigilantes take him in hand and his troubles them no more.

But the climate did not agree with me; the air is too light, and the arguments used too heavy.

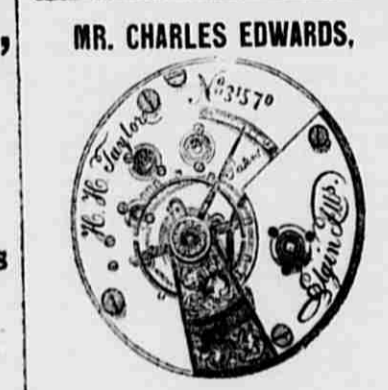
