that Fisher, the local angler of the Eagle was dashing off his daily squibs regardless of the future or the cost of plumbago; that everybody seemed happy, up with the times, and perfectly willing to turn an honest penny.

The citizens of Ionis are fully awake to a sense of their duty in the work, and we trust that Lowell will join them in their effort to make the experiment a successful one.

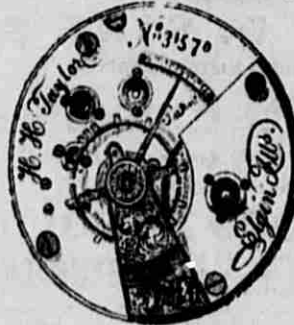
