AN ORDINANCE Relative to Side-walks etc.

The Common Council of the Village of Lowell do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That whenever any side-walks shall have been constructed, or repaired in said village, or whenever any grading, paving, planking, or repairing of streets in said village, shall have been done by the Marshal of said village, in pursuance of any order or Resolution of said Common Council, it shall be the duty of said Marshal of report to said Common Council the expense thereof, and the expense of so much thereof as lies next adjoining said street or side-walk within twenty days from and after the completion thereof.

SECTION 2. That if the said amounts or any of them shall remain unpaid for the period of thirty days, from and after the time of making the report aforesaid by the Marshal, the same shall be assessed on the lot, lots or premises adjoining said streets or side-walks, and it shall be the duty of the Recorder of said village, whenever the assessment roll shall have been completed each year to assess any such expenses as aforesaid on the lot, lots or premises adjoining said streets or side-walks same as other taxes that have been levied by the Common Council adding thereto not more than four per cent for collecting expenses; and said Recorder shall carry the same out in a separate column from the other taxes in the last column of said assessment roll for the purpose of showing the total amount of taxes, all of which shall be done before the warrant shall be annexed to said assessment roll as provided by Section twenty three of the Charter of the said village.

SECTION 3. The collection of all such expenses and assessments as aforesaid, shall be made in the same manner as other taxes of said village, according to the provisions of the Charter and ordinances of said village, except as herein otherwise provided, and shall have same effect from the time of said assessment upon the premises aforesaid as any other legal tax of said village.

COMMON COUNCIL.

From the minutes of the proceedings of the Common Council, Aug. 11th we take the following

PETITIONS: Petition signed by 24 citizens asking that a drain be dug from Washington street, west, along the south side of Suffolk st., to the west line of Amity st., from thence southerly along west line of Amity to Elizabeth st., to intersect the drain leading into the Flat river; also a short drain from north side of Howard st. running northerly along the west line of Amity street.

By M. N. Hine and 43 others; a petition asking that a good and substantial sidewalk 16 feet wide, be built along the south side of Bridge and Main streets, from the east line of Water st. on Avery's plat, to the west line of Water street on R. & W's Plat.

By J. W. Hine and 78 others; a Memorial, representing to the Common Council that the fire apparatus belonging to this village is at present kept in a locality inconvenient and not sufficiently central to be reached readily, or operated advantageously, and asking the Council to cause the construction of a good and substantial building to be located in a more central part of the village, and on ground to be purchased and owned by the corporation, as for instance on Bridge street, the lower side of Flat river dam between the Forest Mills and the Axe Factory. The petitions will be reported upon at the next regular meeting.

The following bills were allowed in full: E. Spencer, street fund 7 50; A. J. Dresser 0 83; B. Terwilliger 2 10; Morris Johnson 24 60; C. C. Stiles 4 50; E. Marshall, st. & gen. fund 27 13; J. H. Weeks, fire fund 4 00; J. W. Hine, gen. fund 30 65

The Council voted to raise a tax of 1 of one per cent of the aggregate of all the property within the corporation of the village, according to the assessment roll for the year 1873, for the General Fund.

Also, a like tax for the Fire Fund; also a tax of 1 of one per cent for the Street Fund.

On motion, the village attorney was requested to draw up ordinance relative to the assessment and collection of taxes for grading, paving and repairing streets or sidewalks in the village of Lowell, which was accepted and adopted by the Council at its meeting on the 19th inst.

The village attorney was also then instructed to draw up ordinance relative to the preservation of the public health.

On motion, an order of seventy-five dollars was voted to the Recorder to apply on his salary for the present year.
