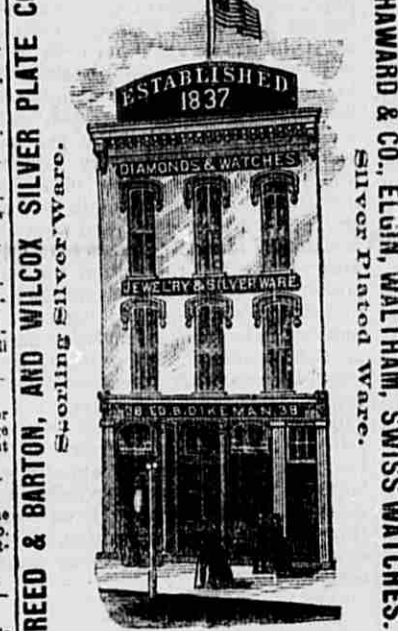

CHRYSTAL AIR is an extensively distributed condition. Civil war is raging in Khokan against their king, Khudoy Khan. The Turcomans of Desots, around Khiva, are obstinately fighting the Russians. A CRUZZER 238 tons high in the village of Northford, England, fell, on Friday, killing five persons and maiming a dozen others.

A DISPATCH from Carthage says the insurgent frigates were not injured during the bombardment of Alton, and none on board were killed. They are being taken to coal and making preparations to attack Valencia.

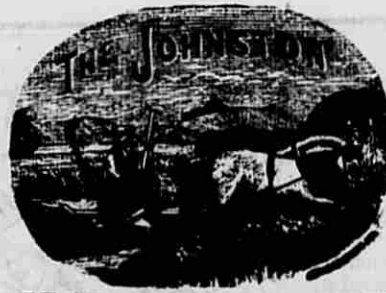

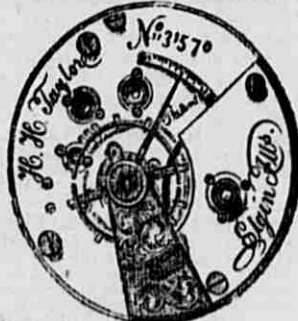

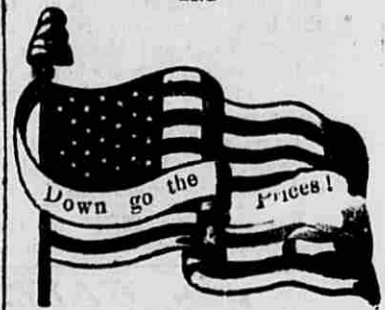
