TO SUBSCRIBERS.

In a few weeks the JOURNAL will enter upon its tenth year, and with the first number of Vol. X., I shall commence sending the JOURNAL to those subscribers only who have paid in advance, and shall adhere strictly to the advance pay system as long as I continue to publish this paper. It is possible that some of my patrons may not approve of this new departure, but a word of explanation, I trust, will be sufficient.

The publisher of a country paper has four classes of persons to deal with. The first class is composed of those who always pay in advance for their paper, and in this connection I am glad to say that the JOURNAL has a greater number of first-class subscribers to-day, than it had one year ago. The second class is composed of those who do not always pay in advance, but who generally pay when they agree to. Now, if the publisher had only these two classes to deal with he could get his share of what little peace and contentment there is on earth, and be able to own a horse and buggy in forty or fifty years, but the end is not yet.

The publisher cannot always tell who are and who are not "good pay." He takes the verbal "promise to pay" from six subscribers, when four out of the six may possibly "lie like blazes;" (this is a borrowed quotation), and if those six subscribers are strangers, the publisher has no more right to doubt the word of the four who don't mean what they say, than of the two who never told a lie. But we come to the third class. In this class we find those who mean to pay sometime, in the dim future, but are eternally "hard up." This is a bad investment for the publisher, but it takes a year or two for him to find it out. The fourth class is composed of shysters, exclusively. They look like men; talk, act and dress like men, and the publisher, taking it for granted that they are men, sends along the paper. It takes time to find out that these subscribers are no better than common thieves; but "time" invariably tells that story.

Now what I propose, is, to simply do away with the second, third and fourth classes, by putting all subscribers into the first class; serve them all alike, show no partiality, give them a better paper, and myself better pay. Can you find any fault with the proposition? I think not, and believe most of the subscribers to the JOURNAL will heartily endorse it. They certainly cannot give any good reason why they should not be required to pay for their local paper in advance as well as for their State paper, or any other periodical.

Remember then, that the first day of July, 1874, is the last day of grace on unpaid subscriptions. All who are in arrears, desiring to have the JOURNAL sent to them after that date, are respectfully invited to attend to the matter in person, or by letter, as soon as possible.

Regular meeting of the Common Council. Present, full Board.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The committee on the opening of Amity street, were, upon motion, granted further time.

The following persons were granted saloon licenses in answer to their petitions at One Hundred Dollars per year each: Marshal McLaughlin, Dennis O'Brien, John Walsh, Cormick McGee, Geo. Behler, Theodore Mueller, Eugene Mathewson.

A remonstrance against the action of the Council in the matter of a sidewalk on the south side of Main street from the south-west corner of Hudson street west was received, and, upon motion laid on the table.

A petition from R. Bourzutschky asking that an alley be opened through Block No. 4 of R. & W. Plat, was received, read, and upon motion laid on the table.

On motion, J. M. Mathewson was retained as counsel to the corporation for one year from May 4, 1874.

The following bills were presented and audited in full: Bill R. Marshall, street fund, \$ 1.50 C. Bias, st. and gen'l fund 16.50 H. E. Hogan, fire fund, 8.00 J. M. Mathewson, gen'l fund, 13.00 Board adjourned until Tuesday, May 12, 1874.

Pursuant to a call signed by many of the most prominent citizens in Lowell, a railroad meeting was held in Train's Hall, Monday evening, for the purpose of reviewing the work already done on the line, and devising ways and means to finish up the work that must be done before the first day of June. The meeting was called to order by A. M. Elsworth; O. H. Look Esq. was chosen chairman; Jas. W. Hine, Sec'y. Dr. Elsworth was called upon to give some statements and exhibits, which he proceeded to do in such a clear and forcible manner that no one could fail to know the exact situation along the line. Dr. Dodge, agent for the company, then addressed the meeting at some length, and spoke a good many plain unvarnished truths.

Hastings has filled her quota and stands ready to join hands with Kalamazoo and Lowell. Kalamazoo, on the first day of June, will report her full amount of stock and be ready for business. Lowell to-day wants a few thousand dollars to fill her quota. The amount to be raised between here and Hastings ought to be raised in three days. It must be raised before the first day of June, for the last day of grace is here. Facts were clearly set forth by Messrs. Elsworth and Dodge that cannot be ignored. Remarks by others were offered, urging prompt and earnest action. The following persons were appointed to assist the solicitor in securing stock and right of way in Lowell, and along the line between here and Hastings: Dr. Elsworth, J. C. Train, Jas. W. Hine, E. J. Booth, F. King, D. L. Eaton, G. W. Parker, S. C. Bradfield, D. Driscoll, R. D. Winegar, O. H. Look. Of these Dr. Dodge selected five persons to solicit stock in the village and township of Lowell, as follows: E. J. Booth, Jas. W. Hine, Rev. D. L. Eaton, F. King, S. C. Bradfield. These committees realize that their work must be done now. No more folding of the hands gentlemen until Lowell can say with Hastings and Kalamazoo, "we have raised our money, secured the right-of-way and are now ready to join hands with you in the building of this road."

A small amount of stock was taken before the meeting closed. The Lowell Silver Cornet Band, ever ready to stir the people up in a good cause, furnished excellent music in abundance. The band added much to the interest of the meeting and received many compliments, besides a vote of thanks from the audience. The meeting adjourned to assemble again at the same place on Saturday evening of this week. At that time it is hoped that every person in Lowell and vicinity interested in this work will be present, and we earnestly hope that it may be an occasion of great rejoicing. We shall all be satisfied if the report tells us that the required amount has been obtained. It is left with us to say what that report shall be.
