Lee, 18,000., making a total of 75,700 lb. Yesterday (Tuesday), was a good day for wool men, and the remainder of the week will doubtless be very woolly. It is estimated that a little more than half of the clip has been sold. Prices not materially changed for a few days.

We were unable to accept the kind invitation to that picnic, extended to us by Beacon Lodge, but we are glad to hear that it proved a success. Quite a number were present from Lowell, and they reported a "glorious time." A profit of \$50 was realized to the order, we are informed. As the "Beacon" is pretty good at this sort of business, we suggest that when grapes and peaches show a tempting check it might do to try it again.

The distance from Kalamazoo to Hastings is almost thirty miles, and from Hastings to Lowell, a trifle over twenty and one half miles, according to the surveyed railroad route. The entire cost per mile for a narrow gauge road from Kalamazoo to Lowell would not exceed \$12,000, while the cost for a standard gauge would be over \$20,000 per mile. These estimates include the cost of road bed, iron for rails, fish bolts, &c., and rolling stock.

An interesting game of base ball was played last Friday afternoon between a picked nine, called the "Grangers," and the "Green" club of this village. The "Grangers" consisted of nine of our most promising young men with moustaches and side whiskers, and the Green club (of school boys, ranging from ten to seventeen years of age. The Grangers led for a few innings, by unanimous consent of the Greens, as the latter did not want to do all the batting; but when the game was about half through the little chaps quit their fooling and commenced playing. When the game was finished, the result stood—Greens 53, Grangers 38. The Grangers were whitewashed three times, and Greens once. The "picked" nine came away badly picked, and the little fellows kicked up their heels and really wished they could find somebody to play a game of ball with.

JAMES THOMPSON, Esq., who died in Grand Rapids township on the 28th of May last, was one of the early pioneers of Michigan. He came to this State in 1836, and located on Flat river, on what is now called the O'Harrow farm. He also took up a large portion of the land which now includes the western portion of this village. In 1836 he built a log house on the site now owned by Mrs. Olcott, and came near seeing it pulled down over his head by the Indians, who were then somewhat troublesome at times. Mr. Thompson was an industrious and useful citizen and had many warm friends. About ten years ago his health began to fail, and since then he has been a great sufferer, gradually wasting away under the gnawings of consumption. His sufferings were ended on the 28th of May, and he was ready to meet the future. Mr. Thompson was 68 years of age.

THE County Convention of Woman Suffragists held at Grand Rapids on the 16th inst., was well attended, nearly two hundred delegates being present. A county organization was effected with Hon. E. L. Briggs as President; Hon. Julius Houseman, Mayor of Grand Rapids, as Vice President; D. N. Foster, of the Saturday Evening Post, as Secretary, and Hon. S. L. Fuller as Treasurer. The Rev. Dr. Fisk of Grand Rapids, was appointed chairman of the executive committee of the association, with Jas. W. Hine, of Lowell, J. H. Maze, of Cedar Springs, and Mrs. Z. E. Bliss, of Grand Rapids, as members. The association raised about \$200 for county campaign expenses. Able and earnest speeches were made by Giles B. Stebbins, of Detroit, Rev. Dr. Fisk, of Grand Rapids, Mrs. Hindman, of Pennsylvania, and Miss Eastman, of Massachusetts. Township associations will be organized in every town in the County.

Although unable to attend the convention, we are informed by several who were present that many of the most intelligent and influential citizens of the county were there as delegates. And we need only to look over the names of some of those who are actively engaged in the suffrage movement to become satisfied that a great share of the intelligence of Kent County is decidedly in favor of granting equal rights to all.

"IMPORTED TALENT."

Nearly all the anti-woman suffrage papers in the State deplore the action of the association in procuring speakers from abroad. They say these imported speakers will do the cause more harm than good and they want them to stay at home.

GRAND HAYEN Mich., June 18, 1874.

In view of the submission to a popular vote the coming fall of the Woman's Suffrage amendment to the constitution of Michigan, the Secretary of the Executive Committee of the State Woman's Association invites correspondence from all persons friendly to the movement, and who will undertake the circulation of documents and assist in providing for public meetings; and the formation of local organizations in their respective localities.

Speaking of the political outlook, the Manistee Times says: The Allegan Journal brings forward this sterling citizen (E. G. D. Holden, Esq.), and staunch Republican, as a candidate for Secretary of State, in which we heartily concur.

The opposition paper having said everything else about President Grant they can think of, are now trying to elect him for the third term. If Mr. Grant should decline to run, and he doubtless will, these papers will call him a coward; if he should consent to a re-nomination, and he doubtless will not, they will howl "Cassarianism."

The Romeo Observer, the Reed City Clarion, the Adrian Times, and Escanaba, and many other papers copy articles commending Mr. Holden as a candidate for Secretary of State, and second the motion.

Congress seems to have but little brotherly love. The Senate wants publishers of newspapers to pay four cents a pound on all papers sent through the mails out of the country where published. Another instance of temporary insanity at Washington.

G. R. Sayles, Esq., of Keene, informs us, that while grass is hardly up to the average this year, wheat is No. 1.

Capt. J. M. Weatherwax, of the firm of Parker & Weatherwax in this village, has, at his large saw mill in Stanton, lath, lumber, shingles, etc., for sale.

A railroad meeting was held at Kalamazoo last (Tuesday) evening, Dr. Elisworth, by special invitation, went down there to give them some railroad talk.

Several of our State exchanges favor the nomination of Judge Campbell for U. S. Senator, and other, urge Hon. Z. Chandler's re-nomination. The prospect is good for a warm senatorial fight.

The Bankrupt bill has passed both houses. It provides that a voluntary bankrupt may be discharged upon the payment of 30 per cent, of his indebtedness, with the consent of one-fourth of the number of creditors, representing one-third the value of the indebtedness.

The Smaller Towns in Nebraska. All along the line of the Burlington and Missouri River Railroad, in Nebraska, market towns are springing into existence. Some of these will rise to the rank of considerable cities; others probably will never get beyond the chrysalis state of a village. All of them, however, are so located as to command the trade of a fertile and well settled back country. One of the little towns of Nebraska, with a good prospect before it, is De Witt, in Saline county, located in the fertile valley of the Big Blue river. The town was laid out only a little over a year ago, and is now contains over 65 houses and 150 to 200 inhabitants. There are stores for the sale of farm implements and general merchandise; and from the beginning of July, 1873, to the end of February, 1874, 250 car loads of wheat and 15 car loads of live stock were shipped east over the line of the B. & M. R. R. The Good Templar's lodge in the village number 70 members; and the Methodist denomination is just about to build a church. All this may appear a "day of small things" but it is by the processes which have resulted in the starting of De Witt that the whole western country has been dotted with towns and cities.

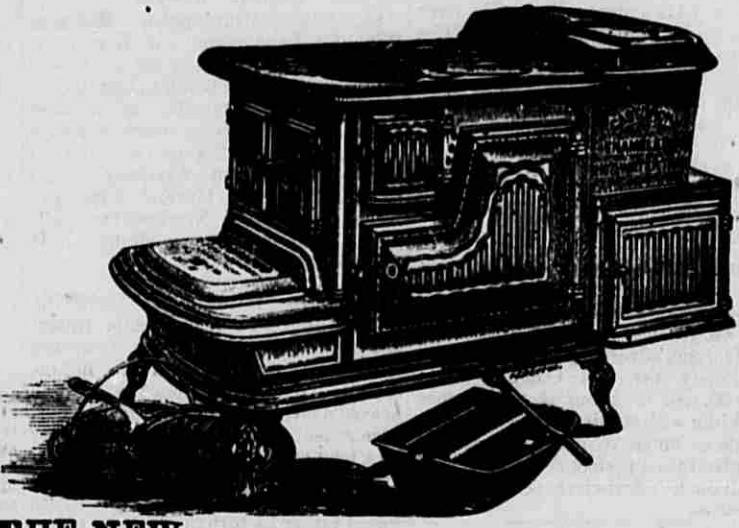

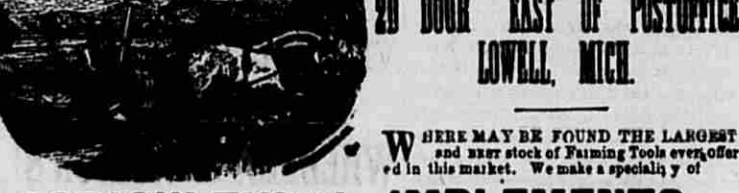
