Isaac P. Christianey was born in Johnstown, N. Y., March 12, 1812. He received an academic education. In 1836 he removed to Michigan and settled in Monroe, where he complet ed his legal studies with Robert Me-Clelland, afterwards governor of Michigan.

From 1841 to 1846 Mr. Christiancy was elected by the Democracy as prosecuting a torney for Monroe county and took high rank as a criminal lawyer.

In 1848 he became interested in the Free-Soil party and attended the Buffalo convention which nominated Van Buren and Adams. In 1849 he was elected State senator by the Democrats, Whigs, and Free-Soilers, and sorved two years with distinction. In 1852 he was the candidate of the Free-Soil party for governor. In July 1851 he was a prime mover, in connection with Kinsley S. Burgham and others, in the organization of the Republican party, at the famous convention held at the city of Jackson. At this time he was chairman of the State Central Committee TAKE IT! of the Free-Soil party.

In 1856 he was a delegate to the Philadelphia convention which nominated Fremont for the presidency, and supported him for that office; and during the campaign purchased the Monroe Commercial, which had previously been Democratic, and made it a Republican paper.

In January 1857 he was a caudidate of his party for U. S. senator, receiving 33 votes in the canons to 53 for Zachariah Chandler, who was elected. In the spring of that year Mr. Christiancy was elected a judge of the supreme court, which office he has held up to this time.

As a jurist he has become eminent in his own State, and his decisions have commanded the attention of the bench and bar throughout the Union. His decisions have been marked by a strict adherence to law and the

In 1865 he wrote a leading opinion, concurring with the majority of the court, holding the soldiers' voting law of Michigan to be unconstitutional, although he thought soldiers ought to be privileged to vote, and then had three sons in the Union army. This decision gave rise to much adverse discussion, and led to an amendment of the constitution. At the subsequent election Judge Christiancy was nominated by the Republican party for re-election, and the Democratic party declined to make a nomination. He was therefore elected a thout opposition. In 1873 he was again mominated by the Republicaus and also by the Democrats, and elected by a unanimous

During the rebellion Judge Christiancy was an earnest supporter of the Union cause, and has since advocated the principles of the Republican party, although he differd in some leading measures from the ad-

While our public debt remains, he recognizes the fact that tariff is necessary for revenue and incidental purposes of protection.

Judge Christiancy is tall and well termed, enjoys good health, possesses a clear and unimpaired mind, added to life-long habits of industry and application; and while we have supported Mr. Chandler for re-election we hope and believe that Judge Christiancy will make a worthy and honest senator .- Lansing Republican


