TAXATION AND PROHIBI TION

The prohibitory liquor law o this State has been on our statute books twenty years. It makes the vending of alcoholic spirits illegal traffic. The prohibitionists have used every means in their power to put this law into effect, and to day there 6,444 places in the State which are daily and honrly, openly and defiantly, violating it. If a law is passed prohibiting arson, an aggressor is proscented and made t pay penance; but it is not so with the man who deals in liquor. Pros ecutions have been instituted, and eases carried to the Supreme Court. and the decisions rendered have proved, beyond a doubt, that the law is a prohibitory liquor law, as it purports to be, and were it enforced every dram shop would be closed and every drunkard would be re claimed or compelled to change hi residence. But as we see the e forcement of it is an impossibility And now, notwithstanding this amply demonstrated fact, the problibitionists are clamoring for amendments, making the keeping of bottles evidence and fixing greater penalties on con victions.

Could they obtain the passage of a law which would make the selling of whiskey a crime punishable, by imprisonment for life it would be observed not one whit more. Prohibition, in any way shape or manner you may fix it is a failure. The manufacture, sale and drinking of rum is going to continue despite everything and everybody.

And now it would seem that taxation must needs affect it tantamount in ratio with the tax Were a tweaty-five or fifty dollars tax to be imposed upon every seller of the ardent, it would rather aid than hinder him, and any man who could raise fifty dollars could pay the tax, get trusted for a stock and start in business with flattering prospects of prospering, and the traffic would be enlarged.

Put the tax at \$1,000, and it would amount to prohibition, and would be just about as good as the present prohibitory law, for it would be disregarded entirely, as very few country dealers could pay it.

Senator Gray has presented a bill which about meets our views on question. It levies a tax of \$100 on the retailer of cider, ale and beer; \$200 on the retailer of alcoholic spirits; and \$300 on the wholesale dealer.

So the \$300 man can sell any thing and any quantity of it. 
