GENERAL BURNSIDE HEARD FROM. Gen. Cutcherson then read a dispatch just received from Major-General Ambrose E. Burnside, sending greetings, saying "I wish I could be with you to-night."

Gen. Cutcherson then spoke of the long programme and suggested brevity in the speeches to follow.

Great applause by the reporters. "The Army and Navy—the strong arms of our civil authority."

Col. Mc Reynolds responded in a tone of eloquent appreciation.

Sixth Toast—"The heroes of rank and file—they bore the brunt of the battle."
