In the preaching of dogmatic theology where there is a tacit admission of authority on the part of the preachers, this may do, but not in the practical reformation of politics. It is very much like the sanitary reform of a man who should preach the cleansing of a city, but refuse to do anything toward keeping the clover away unless the citizens bought his patent disinfectant.
