Wool
The market is getting lively in this state, and the competition among the buyers has given the wool growers an opportunity of which, we see they are taking advantage. At the West prices have gone up to 36 and 38c, but at the central points such as Jackson and Albion, the buyers have kept cooler, and the rates have not exceeded 33 to 36c. In our own travels during the two past weeks, we note there is a general disposition among the farmers to place their wool on the market as soon as they can get it ready, and we found a good many in Oakland and Macomb counties who had sold already at 34 and 35c, with one or two lots of delaine, or half-bleached longwools, at 60c. The stocks of wool are low at the east, and the manufacturers are laying in supplies, which gives the sellers a considerable advantage. It will be seen by the reports of sales taken from the local press, that all over the State the buyers are full as active at this season as at any time known, and it would be seen that it was best that the clips should be placed on the market while the steam is up, and before there is any time to let it blow off. In the Boston and New York markets there are very light sales of domestic wools. In Boston we note 70,000 lbs. of Michigan, Wisconsin, New York, and other western wools have been sold at 37 to 44 cents, while combining the delaine wools washed have sold at 49c, and unwashed have ranged from 28 to 40c. In New York there is reported to be 15,000 lbs of old XX Pennsylvania fleeces at 40c. The transactions in California have been very large, and comprise very considerable amounts from 25c to 34c, with the balance of low grades selling at 19c to 24c. The prospect is that the most of the wool of this State will be sold by the 4th of July, and that our wool growers will realize all that is likely to be obtained for it during the next three or four months. At the present eastern prices, there is very little margin left for the handling of wool by the dealers.—*Mich. Farmer.*

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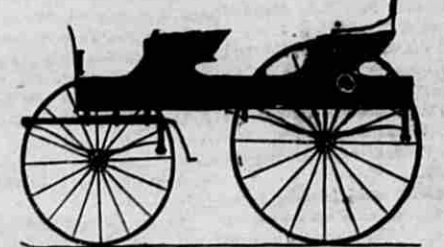
