

## Rapid Growth.

A correspondent of a western paper writes the following relative to the rapid growth of Black Hills towns. He says:

The growth of towns is wonderful Custer City went up in two months from three or four cabins and about a dozen miners to 600 houses and 1,-800 inhabitants. Deadwood rose from nothing in one month to 10,000, which population it has maintained. which I passed in November last, where there were not twenty miners all told, now there is a population of 3,000, three towns, stores, hotels, etc. So, too, Gaysville, above Deadwood. In Central City, above Gapville, I could have purchased lots for \$1. They are now selling for \$500 to \$800. In Deadwood I was offered a house and lot last fall for \$125. It was sold this spring for \$2,000 cash. Rents in Dead-wood run from \$40 and \$75 to \$100 per month for small, inferior buildings, and few can be had at these

## Profits of Michigan Sheep.

The Farmer has taken some pains to keep track of the wool business in Michigan. We are glad to be able to say, also, that the local press of the State have given much attention to the same subject, and never before has the wool business of Michigan, and its importance, been more appreciated than it is at pres-

There is a fact about the sale wool that cannot have escaped no-tice—It sells for eash, it is easily marketed, and it sells and brings the mency just previous to harvest when money is needed by the farmers.

We wish now, when the subject is fresh, that every flockmaster would take pains to sort out from his flock every sheep that does not produce wool enough at 35 cents to bring from \$1.75 to \$2 per head. We know that this is putting the average product of wool at a high figure, but certain it is that at a less amount wool production does not pay in this State. Unless a man can see at least \$1.75 per head for wool he had better knock his sheep on the head. All experienced wool growers agree to this. The additional profit is in the lambs, the manure and the in-creased weight of carcass. Every tarmer should look this matter over and see that his sheep pay. There is, we believe, more profit in small flocks than in large ones, and sheep in small flocks are less liable to disease, and we therefore commend the propriety of of keeping at least a

small flock of sheep to every farmer.

The quality of Michigan wool has advanced somewhat during the past year or two. This has been brought about by the selection of the best breeding rams and by the introduc-tion of improved and thoroughbree rams. This work of selection should go on until every flock is brought to its highest state of perfection. We hope to see a lively inquiry among flockmesters for improved ewes, and especially for thoroughbred rains,-
