

There is, perhaps, very good reasons for farmers destring to overcome the conclusions arrived at by the millers. Clawson wheat is notoriously one of the most productive wheats raised, often giving an average of from forty to fifty bushels to the acre, and being at the same time remarkably free from ravages of insects, etc. It has been largely raised in New York and Michigan, while in several other States and in the Dominion it seems to be finding rapid favor with cultivators. Millers have almost uniformly condenned Glawson at almost uniformly condenned Glawson after giving it a trial. At the National Convention every miller who related his experience with it, stated that for milling purposes it was one of the worst varieties grown. One gentleman said that the bread made from the flour it produced became at hard as stone the day after it was baked; and the condemnation of the wheat is general. 
