Hints to Greenbackers

The Nationals or Greenbackers ask that the Government "create" and usue money. They demand that the Government issue paper money stamped to represent a certain value for which it shall be "full

legal tender."
Now if by stamping and enacting the Congress can confer upon a piece of paper a certain absolute value for trade purposes, it can do the same thing by enacting without stamping.

If it can make a piece of paper three inches wide and five inches long worth one dollar by a single enactment that it shall be a dollar and full legal tender, it can by the same method make a similar piece of money worth one thousand or one

million dollars. If the Government has power to legislate such value into a piece of paper, it has the right to put calue into any other article or thing the same way, and may make every for-

est leaf money by the same means. What, then, is the use of talking about stamping, which costs money or labor, when it is just as easy to enact that every maple leaf shall be a dollar, and every poor man can go into the forest and gather himself riches by picking up leaves? The leaves, in fact, have an advan-

tage over paper for dollars, if mere enactments will make either of them enactments will make either of them dollars. The paper money can be counterfeited to any extent; while the most expert rogue in the world would find himself overmatched in attempting to counterfeit a maple attempting to counterfeit a maple well filled hall testified to its excellence.

The Greenback inflationists say that the currency legislation and finaucial management of the administration has been wrong all the time. That is a charge that all our administrations and all our Congresses have been dishonest or incompetent. Yet they demand that into the hands of that same central power

which they thus condemn shall be put the supreme authority to "create," issue and control, expand, in-flate, or contract, all the lawful mondevised or imagined.

The national banks more than two

thousand in number, and representing perhaps twenty, thirty or fifty thousand individuals in their management, are distributed all over the United States, each locality being supplied according to its demands.
All of these, and every stockholder in them, are identified each with the interests of its own home section. and locality. Hence it is morally impossible that they should form a combination detrimental to the general interest or in favor of the con

centrated capital in any one section.

But the Greenback inflationists demand that this diffusion of bank centrated in a Governmental ring at gaining his old time vivacity. A burden has Washington.

The concentration involves putting side. the power into the hands of those who are denounced by the Greenbackers as a set of financial asses, or fools, or knaves, to pinch the whole country at pleasure by the applicascrew pressure. If that is judicious or a safe experiment, pray what would be unwise or unsafe? The "Nationals insist that Gov-

ernment bonds and notes should be taxed. For any Government to taxed. For any Government to thus tax its own notes, would be to sit down on and destroy its own credit, and to depreciate its own money. The end of it would be square regulation, without a redeeming feature. The Government that would so act could not again berrow money. Its only resources.

That also supposes the abolition of any and every standard for "a dol-lar." With the value of the dollar to be determined and measured by a piece of paper, or the stamp upon i there would no longer be any fixed meaning to the word "dollar." The money, instead of being the representative of value, would represent

uno specific value.

Under that theory, silver would in the he as objectionable as gold in the currency. Neither of the metals has any practical use in the system where the word "dollar," and not an actual dollar, is depended upon as

the measure of value. If such a thing were practicable, there might be one condition on which it might be worth while to give the plan or plans of the irredeemable paper money advocates a trial—namely, that they should have the exclusive benefit of the resulting injury .- Grand Rapids Eagle.
